Tube Setting Contest Added to Big Three-Day Festival Here

An irrigation tube setting contest, under the supervision of the Hart American Legion, will be held in conjunction with the Castro County Fair and is expected to rank as one of the top feature attractions of the three-day festival, according to an announcement this week by County Agent Charlie Hudson.

This all-important contest is slated to be held Saturday, the last day of the fair, at 2 p. m. near the Dimmitt ball park. There will be competition in a junior and senior division setup with the dividing line established at age 14. Those under 14 will be eligible for junior division competition while those over this age will be classified in the senior or adult division.

Bands to Spark Colorful Fair Parade Saturday

The snappy 70-piece Dimmitt School band, along with bands from Hereford and Friona, will provide a lively tempo for the colorful fair parade to be unfolded here Saturday at 11 a. m. Announcement was made this week by Bruce Woodell, parade committee chairman, that all three bands have accepted invitations to participate in the parade.

The Hereford Riding Club and a number of other riding outfits in the area reportedly have agreed to be in the parade. The parade will begin at the Cooper Implement Company in southwest Dimmitt; turn the corner at Gene's Service Station; continue down Broadway; turn again at West Bedford Avenue; circle the block; and then proceed around the square. The various units will disband at the fair grounds.

The local Lions Club as well as several other area clubs will have floats in the parade. Working on floats this week that will be entered in the parade were members of the Dimmitt Garden Club, Flag Progress Club and Ethel Progress Club. Most of the communities in the county are expected to have floats in the parade.

Trophies will be presented the first three winners in each division of the parade. The divisions are commercial, organizational and riding club units. The parade is billed as a top feature of the three-day festival and will draw spectators from many neighboring towns and communities.

Conservationists See Soil Practices on Castro Farms

The Castro County soil tour conducted Friday afternoon in the Flagg and Cleo communities attracted some 20 farmers and businessmen from over the county and was termed by planners of the event as "a very excellent tour."

After the tour, County Agent Charlie Hudson, who helped to plan the event, stated, "It was one of the most educational and beneficial tours ever held in the county."

The tour, sponsored by the extension service in cooperation with the Running Water Soil Conservation District and the soil service, began on the Tom Lewis farm in the Flagg Community. Here the group saw Lewis' soil building practices which included the use of legumes, crop rotation and the use of commercial fertilizers.

Lewis has 70 acres of cow peas which he planted on land that he had originally planned to summer fallow. He decided, however, that he would have the soil building crop in which he could sow wheat and actually do more in the way of soil building than by summer

The victory inched the shamesniff playoff series for the local team, enabling them to win the title of champions for the Central Plains League.

The new champions were not sure of the outcome of the seasaw battle until the bottom of the 11th inning, however, when they managed to break a 10-10 tie and push across the winning marker. Conrad Clark was credited with the all-important win. Alvin White started the game and was relieved in the sixth inning by Clark with the local team trailing 6-7.

Fair Entry Records Topple

Some 145 livestock entries plus 200 individual agricultural exhibits and ten community exhibits are among the principal reasons why the Castro County Fair this weekend is being forecast as the "largest on record".

County Agent Charlie Hudson disclosed Tuesday that a record 100 head of dairy and beef cattle had been entered in the fair judging. Also entered are an estimated 25 lambs, 20 swine, 200 individual exhibits and ten community exhibits.

Among the early entrants and one of the features of the 1954 county fair will be the annual Sears gift show. Owners of gilts this year are Jon Pveatt, Bruce Odom, Phillip Brockman, Greg Venhaus, Fred Acker, Gary Cleaver, Joe Ed Pohlmeier, Norman Nelson and Lewis Acker, who will show a Sears boar. These gilts are all of excellent quality and will probably make this the best gilt show staged in the county, according to Hudson.

Dimmitt Lion Club members unanimously endorsed a broom sales project designed to benefit the blind of Texas at their Tuesday noon meeting in Fellowship Hall at the local Methodist Church.

The club voted to sponsor the project after Lion Joe Benson explained the purpose and the importance of such a worthy cause. Members agreed to set the date for the sale on Sept. 28 and a committee will be appointed by Benson to direct the project.

The load tested 14.36 percent for moisture content, which makes it ineligible for government loan. The new ruling by U. S. D. A. makes milo ineligible for government loan if it contains in excess of 13 percent moisture.

Bobcats Trounce Silverton Team; Prep for 2nd Non-Conference Clash

Fresh from a convincing 31-0 victory over Silverton, the Dimmitt Bobcats started prepping early Monday morning for their second non-conference clash of the season against the Lockney Longhorns. This game will be played at Lockney with gametime set for 8 p. m.

Assistant Coach Alvis Fuquay was busy over the week-end scouting the Lockney aggregation. According to Fuquay, the Longhorns employ the wing T formation and are a pretty snappy outfit, despite their 41-6 drubbing at the hands of Hale Center on Friday night. This is not considered a disgraceful score as the Owls were pre-season ranked fifth in the state in Class A.

The Lockney backfield will average about 150 pounds and the line will be just a little lighter than the Bobcat line, according to Coach Leo Fields. Lockney Coach Rudy Hale has a pretty young crew but a team of surprising calibre at times, Fields indicated. The local team is expected to be at full strength against the Longhorns.

"We looked better than I thought we would against Silverton. Our boys blocked and tackled hard and the line did a good job," Fields remarked. "Even though Lockney lost to Hale Center by a top-sided score, we will have a battle on our hands Friday night," Fields added. As no men were injured in the Silverton game Fields will have about the same starting lineup against Lockney Friday night.

Quarterback Edgar Dennis accounted for a major share of the scoring against Silverton. Dennis scored three times while his team mates, Richard Wood and Alton Whitworth, pushed across one score each. Wood had one TD called back about midway of the second quarter.

A recap of the scoring in the Silverton game follows: After the first seven plays of the game, Dennis went off tackle for seven yards to chalk up the first touchdown of the 1954 season. Try for extra point failed and the Bobcats went out front 6-0. The second score of the game was also made by Dennis late in the first quarter. The hard running quarterback streaked around right tackle for 35 yards and a TD. Failure to convert made the score read, Dimmitt 12 and Silverton 0.

Tickets have gone on sale for the big barbecue that will be served at the local ball park immediately after the fair parade Saturday morning, according to Glenn Younts, Castro County Chamber of Commerce manager. Tickets may be purchased at any business house in Dimmitt or at the main fair building. Adults will be charged \$1 while children through high school age may purchase a ticket for 50 cents.

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Judging the poultry division this year will be Kenneth Smith, vocational agriculture instructor at Kress High School. The poultry

division is rapidly becoming an important phase of the county fair with entries increasing each year. Entries this year will occupy their largest space in the east wing of the livestock barn. J. V. Westcott, Hart High School Ag instructor, is superintendent of the poultry division.

Quarter horses will not be brought to the fair grounds until Saturday morning where they will be judged beginning at 9 o'clock. As in all the Southwest, the quarter horses are always the most popular exhibit of the entire fair as indicated by the large number of spectators that turn out for judging. Herbert Williams of Hart is superintendent of this division and will be assisted by Pepper Martin, also of Hart.

Band Trip Fund Boosted to \$930

Members of the Dimmitt Band Boosters Club got down to the serious business of raising some \$1750 for the forthcoming band trip to the State Fair in Dallas by summing up the present status of their fund raising campaign and mapping new strategy at a meeting in the high school band room recently.

Through donations from parents of band members, a total of \$350 has been raised, boosting the current campaign fund to \$930 or about half of what is needed. The club received a shot in the arm when it was learned that other parents who failed to attend the meeting had indicated a desire to contribute to the fund.

Pie and cake sales have helped the club to raise needed monies and the dunking board at the fair, which will be operated by band members, will also boost the trip fund.

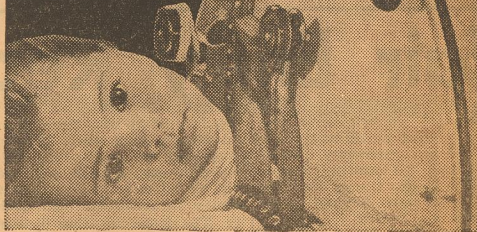
**PLANS ARE MADE FOR FLOWER SHOW**

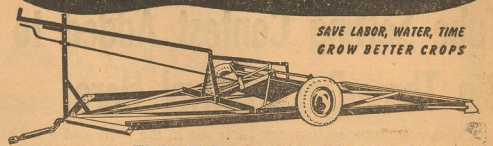

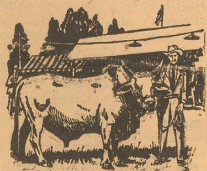

**Huseman Bull Is Qualified as Tested Sire By Jersey Club**

A registered Jersey bull, Signal Bravo Captain, owned by Frank Huseman, Nazareth, Texas, is announced by The American Jersey Cattle Club as having qualified as a Tested Sire.

Ten tested daughters of Signal Bravo Captain produced an average of 8,145 lbs. milk containing 455 lbs. butterfat on a twice-daily-milking, 305-day mature equivalent basis, which is more than two times the butterfat production of the "average" dairy cow in the United States. All records made under official supervision of The American Jersey Cattle Club, which has national headquarters in Columbus, Ohio.

Signal Bravo Captain has been officially classified for type by the Club and given a rating of Very Good, equivalent to a score of 85 to 90 per cent when compared to the breed's type score card allotting 100 points to a perfect animal.

This sire was bred by R. J. Shipman, Shelbyville, Ky., and purchased in 1947 by Huseman.

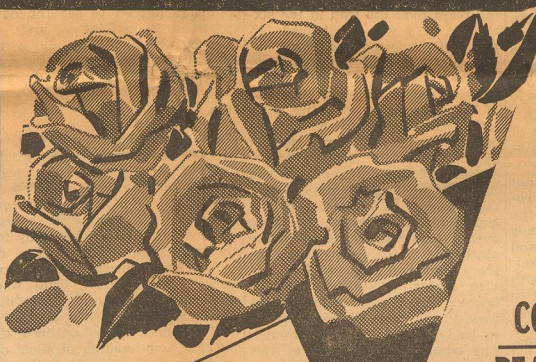

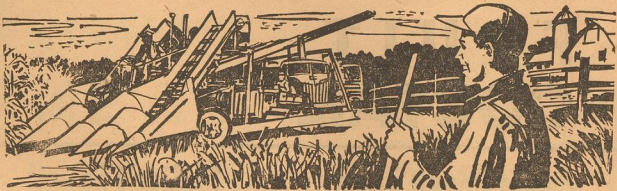

HOME PURCHASE BRINGS LEGAL PROBLEMS

With "National Home Week" being observed September 19-26 many people will be thinking at least casually about the purchase of a new home. Those who become seriously interested should proceed cautiously when making a deal, as many important legal problems are involved in such a transaction.

Possibly the first legal problem you will meet will be when you are asked by the seller or his agent to sign a contract of sale or earnest money contract. In connection with the latter, you will be asked to deposit a sum of money which would be forfeited to the seller and agent for damages in event you do not fulfill the contract. Although no forfeit money may be required with the former, you may still be legally liable for damages if you renege. Be sure, therefore, that you know exactly what your obligations are.

The next legal problem would probably be to determine the status of the title to the property. Many persons become confused during this stage, thinking that securing possession of an Abstract or Title Insurance Policy will afford them complete protection against title defects. This is not necessarily true in either case.

Keep in mind that an abstract is merely an outline of public records on the tract. Any person may purchase an abstract covering any piece of land, whether he owns it or not. A Title Insurance Policy indemnifies you only up to a certain maximum sum of money, and contains various exceptions to the specific coverage.

Following this would be the problem of transferring the title from the legal owners to you, as purchaser, in such manner that no legal question might arise later concerning your sole and exclusive ownership.

Incidental to your title problems is that of ascertaining what restrictions exist upon the lot you are buying and upon the neighborhood generally. Municipal zoning ordinances and restrictive covenants placed upon the tract by previous owners or developers of the subdivision may prove a protection or a hindrance, according to the plans you may have for future use or improvement of your property.

Other legal questions may arise in arranging the method of payment for the house. The fact that most people need years in which to complete such payment makes this a matter to be considered carefully.

These are some of the major legal problems you are likely to encounter in purchasing a home.

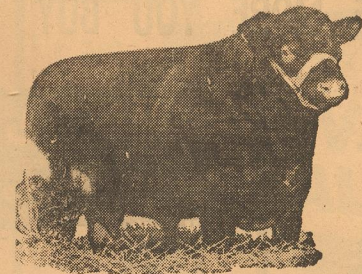
Of course, a number of others may arise in some cases due to peculiar individual circumstances.
