

Cattle Grubs Cause Heavy Losses

Over two million head of Texas
cattle are slaughtered each year. There are 840,000 head of grubby cattle slaughtered annually. On account of grubs each animal lost an average of two pounds of meat, a total of 1680,000 pounds of meat lost in Texas. This total lost an nually is enough to feed 4,600 sol diers for one year.
The foregoing figures, compile and released by County Agen Travis B. Hicks, should make cat tle raisers sit up and think, es pecially so when approximately 15 per cent more feed is required for grubby cartle, and reduction in milk flow is about 25 per cent The total loss to Texas livestock growers approximates five million dollars,
Through Mr. Hicks' efforts Coke county livestock producers have bought a high pressure spray to combat cattle grubs in this county Those desiring the use of this spray should see Gerald Allen or Mr Hicks.
Those having just a few animals, the County Agent suggests that they be dusted on the back with
equal parts of $5 \%$ rotenone and equal parts of $5 \%$ rotenone and
wettable sulphur. It should be wettable sulphur. It should be
rubbed in well. In using the high pressure spray, the solution should consist of 5 pounds of $5 \%$ rotenone and 10 pounds wettable sulphur to 100 gallons of water

# Despite Viciory Used Fat Saving Must Go On! 

## Every woman in America should know that our country continues to face a serious fat shortage. And victory over Japan won't solve the problem immediately. We

 must keep on saving used fats in our kitchens!If you have any thought that saving used fats is one of those wartime chores we can drop, now that Victory is here, please consider these facts and tell them to your neighbors.

America still needs salvaged fats. Not even at the peak of our war effort, when fats were required for mountains of shells and bombs and medicines, in addition to the ever-present need for soap, were our needs for salvaging fat greater than now. Our stocks have been drained by four long years of war, and there isn't enough on hand to meet all requirements.

Don't let "Victory psychology" blind you to this national need! If housewives stop saving fats now, the sho
more critical.

Don't let a single drop of used fats go to waste! Little trimmings of fat left on the platter at the table, scraps left on plates, and even the skimmings of soups and gravies are important. It is the consistent saving of even these small amounts that counts.

Don't turn in fats that can be re-used! But some fats, such as those rendered from lamb and mutton, are not suitable for re-use. Put them immediately in the salvage can. And, with other fats, after you've got all cooking good out of them, there is always a little left. No matter how little it is, save it.

Your butcher will still give you $4 \varepsilon$ and 2 red points for every pound you turn in. Save consistently - save every drop you can-every day-until Uncle Sam says the job is done.
