Performing community service is now a requirement for every person on probation. It's a new state-


On the first Saturday of the new program, five local probationers cleaned up the city park, cut weeds and painted tables, benches and trash cans. Good.

Hospital chief calls new lawsuit 'scary'

"What is scariest about this law- seeking payment of \$26,006.15 for suit is the precedent it sets. It has the potential of taking every cent of tax money we collect, and that could close this hospital," said Joe Stevens, administrator of Plains

Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt. Stevens was commenting on a lawsuit filed last week by the Amarillo Hospital District against the Castro County Hospital District, treatment given to three indigent patients from Castro County.

The suit, along with separate suits against two other rural hospital districts, was filed in Potter County's 47th District Court. It alleges that the Castro County Hospital District is obligated to provide health care services to qualified indigent residents because that is

the purpose of the hospital district tax levy.

"These are patients that are qualified indigents of those hospital districts," said Kevin Gross, president of Northwest Texas Hospital, where the services in question were provided. Gross made his comments in an interview with the Amarillo Globe News.

"They (the patients) were treated here for services those hospitals could not provide, just as we pay High Plains Baptist Hospital for cardiac services that we do not provide," Gross continued.

Stevens said that NWTH is "getting greedy."

"This has never been tried before. It could close a lot of small hospitals in Texas," Stevens said. "If they win this case, the other hospitals we transfer patients to will say 'pay us,' and we could be called on to pay the doctors, too. This runs well beyond the \$26,000 in this suit."

Stevens said that from 1989 through May 5 of this year, the local hospital has transferred 172 patients to NWTH, with 105 of those having some form of insurance and the remaining 67 listed as "self-pay." Stevens said some of the "self-pay" do pay the bill, but some are indigents who are unable

"We transfer far more paying than non-paying patients," Stevens said. "That hospital profits from the paying patients sent by all of the surrounding counties."

He added that he felt NWTH should be willing to accept some of the non-paying along with the paying patients.

"As far as I'm concerned, the hospital (NWTH) has taken the first

step to kill the goose that lays the golden eggs," Stevens said.

He commented that Amarillo merchants ought to be "infuriated" with the hospital.

"When patients are transferred to Amarillo, money is spent in a lot of places other than just the hospital. We could transfer them to someplace besides Amarillo. Lubbock has better facilities overall than Amarillo," Stevens said.

Concerning the suit, Stevens said the matter would be discussed at the Wednesday night meeting of (Continued on Page 12)

"Race relations are worsening. . . . We see people killing and fearing and hating one another still.

"There's the drug problem.... Some of us are going to retire in less than 10 years, and as I look at you, I realize that you're going to have to take over and see that the crack babies are somehow gotten through school and into the work forceand their attention span, they tell me, is two minutes. . . .

"Then there's AIDS. You know it's present here in Dimmitt, Texas. Any young person who has been sexually active in Dimmitt has a good chance of already having AIDS. "We have left you a legacy of fear and horror, haven't we?

What are you going to do? "But listen to the words of St. John the Divine: 'Do not fear

what you are about to suffer. Don't be afraid.' "He knew that fear is self-defeating.

"You are going to suffer. . . . But remember, evil is always self-defeating. With patience, with endurance, and holding to the right and the true and the good, you're always on the side of victory-always.

"So do not fear what you are about to suffer. Equip yourself. Don't be afraid to fail. Be afraid, rather, to not try.

"There are things you'll fail at. But any success you may have in life will be the result of your failures as much as your

successes, if you let those failures develop character and will. You're going to get bloody out there. But be willing to risk everything for the right and the good, and in the end, God will give you the 'crown of life'."


Band members presented Johnson with the gift of a CD player for the band hall stereo system, and gave Assistant Director Becky Allen a ceramic figurine.


We just don't look at golf-or life, for that matter-in the same light.

Since its inception in 1990, nearly 450 4-H Club members and members of Future Homemakers of America have undergone training to be service providers and companions for senior citizens. During the six hour orientation session, the youth are taught constructive citizenship skills and how to communicate with their elderly friends.

To date, youth providers have devoted over 2,500 volunteer hours to assisting over 200 senior citizens in their communities.

The youth service providers enhance the independent life style of rural senior citizens by performing such tasks as basic gardening, running errands, and small household projects like vacuuming and light bulb replacement.

In return, the young people acquire insight into the life experience of their elder friends that help them to set personal goals such as attending college and career choices. Friendships have developed between the youth providers and their senior companions during these weekly visits. The generation

gap is also bridged through community projects. Opportunities such as landscaping, painting the local post office, and sponsoring rock-athon, a fundraiser to benefit the senior citizen center, have created better understanding and camaraderie among all the participants.

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



County gets good news on jail

Castro County Commissioners voted Tuesday to authorize the annual audit, hired an assistant county agent, and agreed to have changes made at the jail.

The auditing firm of Davis, Kinnard and Associates of Abilene will perform the annual audit at an estimated cost of \$9,800. A letter from the auditing firm said, however, that the audit would still not be a total guarantee against fraud or questionable practices, since they would not be able to examine every county transaction.

Danny Newton of Newton Electric in Dimmitt told the commissioners that the Texas Commission on Jail Standards clarified the ruling it made on the Castro County jail at its last inspection.

Newton said that at first the TCJS had said that the entire jail area needed to have a constant temperature in the range of 65 degrees to 85 degrees.

But Newton said a letter from the commission clearly pointed out that the problem is restricted to the womens' cell area of the jail, which will bring down the cost of the project considerably.

Newton estimated the cost of the installation of a heat pump cooling and heating system to be approximately \$4,941. He said any removal or reworking of the current water circulating system would be in addition to that. He said it could add as much as another \$1,000, if no difficulties come up.

Newton also recommended that the county use a larger power input line than is needed now, so that other units could be added later, if required.

The new assistant county agent will add another \$8,000 to the annual budget, with \$4,000 allowed for the couty's portion of the agent's salary. Bryan Reynolds was selected, as recommended by County Extension Agent J.D. Ragland and district Extension Supervisor Bob Robinson.

In other business, Joe Crespin appeared before the commissioners to talk about the county's redistricting plan. He said he feels the county needs to accept the US Justice Dept.'s ruling that rejected the county's submission and go forward in seeking a more suitable

"The redistricting means a lot to the Hispanic community. Just give us a chance to be a part of (the political picture)," Crespin said. He said he felt the county's plan diluted minority voting strength.

Crespin asked why the essential

data could not be entered into a computer and let an impartial machine redraw the lines fairly.

Castro County Judge Polly Simpson replied, "That's what Bob Bass is doing."

Bass is the Austin attorney who is representing Castro County in the redistricting process and is the county's authorized negotiator.

County Attorney Jimmy Davis said that Bass informed him that he is waiting for word on the county's request to consolidate lawsuits in the district on similar matters. Authorization for consolidation has not been given yet.

Davis also told the commissioners that he did not think any federal court would rule to invalidate the results of the March primary elec-

Davis said the Justice Dept. had requested a higher percentage of minority population division for Castro County than had ever been requested before.

"It is not being applied fairly to all," Davis said, adding that other counties in the area had plans that were approved with much lower percentages.

Davis said part of the delay in forming the county's case in the pleading is a refusal by the Justice Dept. to release information on figures that were used in determining the department's decision. Davis said Bass is preparing to sue for the information under the Freedom of Information Act.

"They tell us about groups of illegal residents, but they cannot show us any statistics on that," Davis said, referring to the department's letter saying why Castro County's plan was rejected.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Jeff Robertson told Crespin one of the difficulties in dividing the precincts is that the population of each of the four precincts must be as close to 25% of the county's total population as possible.

Pct. 1 Commissioner Harold Smith said he thinks different boundaries could be used for voting precincts and for road precincts, after the other commissioners expressed dismay at a plan Smith had proposed earlier that would make the percentage of road miles in the precincts lopsided.

Smith said the county should let the State Attorney General's office draw a new plan and "terminate" Bob Bass.

County Judge Polly Simpson said she was told by Bass that the attorney general's office would not undertake such a project.

In another matter, the commissioners vote unanimously to pay \$300 to the Sparsely Populated Entities Coalition to continue its efforts in securing variances for small landfills in the drier parts of Texas. The variances are sought to bring relief from costly regulations being imposed on landfill operations by the federal government.

The commissioners also agreed to look into establishing the position of a litter control officer for the county. Simpson said it would need to be filled by a law enforcement officer. She suggested they might approach County Constable James Dobbs about taking on the duty.

All of the commissioners had complaints about trash being dumped illegally in their precincts along county roads. The trash has to be removed by county employees if the dumper cannot be

FmHA delinquency notices alarming to TFU president

Joe Rankin, president of the cient family farmers got squeezed," Texas Farmers Union, said this week that "an ominous signal about the rural economy is being sent to which forced the agency to write the nation" with the delivery of 37,311 notices to delinquent Farmers Home Administration borrowers, beginning in June.

3,967 of the delinquency notices will go to Texas farmers, Rankin

FmHA began the notification process last week after a 1-1/2 year hiatus from loan restructuring caused by congressional reforms in the agency's operations.

The TFU president questioned the agency's timing in sending the notices now.

"This is the busiest time of the year for farmers," Rankin said. "Now, they're faced with a 60-day deadline to put together a plan for their loan restructuring."

Noting that the 37,311 delinquent borrowers represent one fourth of all FmHA borrowers, Rankin said, "That tells me that we have a serious income problem in the farm sector and in rural America. While a credit problem definitely exists, it exists because there's no profitability for these family farm operations."

Families receiving the notices, if unable to restructure their loans, may face foreclosure, he said. "I don't know what could give us

a clearer example of the fact that our country's federal farm policy simply is not working," he added.

FmHA came under criticism in recent years when investigators found that the agency had forgiven multimillion - dollar agribusiness loans while declaring a number of smaller farm borrowers ineligible for such treatment.

"Inefficient agribusinesses got expensive writedowns while effiCongress then passed reforms

new regulations limiting writedowns and buyouts to \$300,000 and limiting the number of times a borrower could be eligible for restructuring.

"This whole process is just devastating to farm families and their communities," Rankin said. "We're seeing a net loss of over 31,000 farmers a year as farm income continues to drop. The continued mismanagement of our federal farm programs must stop or the trend won't end."

Rankin specified a course for farmers who receive the delinquency notices to take.

"It is imperative that producers respond to these notices because there is nothing to be gained and much to be lost," he said. "If a producer receives a notice of delinquency from FmHA and does not respond by submitting an application for restructuring, FmHA will start the process of foreclosure.

"The Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program at Texas Tech University has been designated by the Governor's Office and certified by USDA to assist agricultural borrowers and lenders in resolving delinquent and distressed situations throughout the state.

"In this role they have arranged with the Texas Tech Agricultural Financial Analysis Project to furnish financial analysts to assist producers involved in the mediation process."

Rankin said producers should call the Ag Loan Mediation Program at 806/742-1949 for additional information regarding this source of assistance.





Cotton farmers have high hopes for season

A new planting season is in full swing in the nation's biggest cotton patch, and Texas South Plains cotton farmers are exuding high hopes tempered with the wariness of experience.

The high hopes reflect the generally good soil moisture and temper-

The wariness comes from seasons such as last year's, which saw drought, untimely and prolonged rains, heavy insect problems and an early freeze take a heavy toll on crops and pocketbooks.

Planting projections for the 25 counties surrounding Lubbock stand at 3.2 million acres, reports Dr. James R. Supak, cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Statewide, cotton planting, originally projected at 6.1 million acres, now stands about 5.8 to 5.9 million, Supak said.

"A lot of the early-planted cotton got up to a stand in seven to 10 days-that's faster than normal."

So far there are no serious problems with seedling disease or blowing sand and wind.

"That doesn't mean we're out of the woods," Supak noted. "A couple of days to a week of cloudy, rainy weather could create problems."

Last year's crop, battered by weather and insects, yielded planting seed of marginal quality, the Extension specialist said.

"Many growers opted to put on seed treatments to minimize seedling disease problems, but money's tight; people are watching their expenditures."

Area growers who irrigate have been planting at a rapid rate to get seed in the ground during the optimum time window of May 5 to 20. The Rolling Plains, which also has good subsoil moisture, can extend that window to June 1.

Supak said a lot of growers planted early this year because they had good subsoil moisture and because last year they waited for rain which they didn't get until mid-June.

But the majority of this year's South Plains dryland crop, which makes up some 60% of the area's acreage, hasn't been planted yet.

"It could be (planted) if people are willing to bust down to the moisture," Supak said. "But that means planting down in the furrow. You can get a stand that way, and some have; but then you're in danger of getting washed out when it rains."

Dryland growers have three options-they can wait for rain, go down to moisture or dry plant.

"Most will wait it out through the 15th before choosing option two or three," Supak said.

"What we'd like to have now is a gentle, warm rain across the area for a few days, have that move out and leave warm conditions."

"Part of that reduction is because of good wheat conditions in the Rolling Plains and because of wet weather in central and south Texas," he said.

The Lower Rio Grande Valley got off to a good start. The Coastal Bend area got a bad start because of too much rain, which made



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planting later than the farmers like, the agronomist said.

Good subsoil moisture and good soil temperatures, needed to give cotton seeds a good start, have South Plains producers smiling cautiously. Across the area, soil temperatures at planting debth reached the desired 60 degrees about April 15.

"What was unusual was that the temperature stayed there," Supak said. "Normally we have a (storm) front or two come in and knock the soil temperature back down.

"Cotton seed needs about 100 hours at or above 60 degrees down where they live" to germinate, Supak said.

The new crop is responding well to warm temperatures.

adverse effects on soil, air, surface and ground water, and wildlife. Rising environmental concerns have prompted policymakers to curb those effects through legislation.

To help preserve the nation's natural resources, the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) was authorized by the Food Security Act of 1985 (commonly known as the 1985 farm act). Under this voluntary program, USDA pays farmers to retire highly erodible or environmentally sensitive cropland from agricultural production for 10 to 15

Cropland enrolled in CRP is planted with grass or trees, or converted to other conservation uses, such as permanent wildlife habitat, filter strips, and windbreaks. The next opportunity for farmers to sign up for enrollment in the CRP program will be June 15 through 26.

"Reducing soil erosion by wind and water was the primary goal of the original CRP," explained Tim Osborn of USDA's Economic Research Service. "But more recently its focus has largely shifted to improving surface water quality and protecting ground water." Osborn's comments came in a recent issue of the Agriculture Department's FARMLINE magazine.

The Food, Agriculture, Conservation, and Trade Act of 1990 (usually referred to as the 1990 farm act) revised USDA's operating and bid acceptance rules, and also broadened CRP, giving it wider eligibility but more targeted

acreage acceptance criteria. "Consequently, farmers who reviewed the CRP provisions before 1990 and decided it wasn't for them may want to reconsider participating in the program," Osborn

"Intensive agricultural production on highly erodible or environmentally sensitive land can impair surface and ground water quality, reduce soil productivity, and heighten off-farm damage from wind erosion," Osborn said. "The CRP has produced benefits in each of these areas and has increased wildlife habitat."

Soil sediment, nutrients from chemical fertilizers (mainly nitrogen and phosphorus), and pesticide residues are often carried into surface water bodies by runoff and erosion caused by rainfall. Fertilizers and pesticides can also move into ground water through a process known as leaching.

"Erosion that exceeds soil formation reduces crop yields by lowering the soil's water-holding capacity and by removing plant nutrients," Osborn explained. "Con-

Agriculture production can have serving soil holds down longrun yield losses and helps contain fertilizer costs."

> Wind erosion in the Great Plains and Southwest can raise maintenance and cleaning costs for households and businesses, damage machinery, and adversely affect health by contributing to particulate air pollution.

> The CRP was established to achieve the following goals: reduce soil erosion, protect soil productivity, reduce sedimentation, improve water quality, improve fish and wildlife habitat, curb production of income support for farmers.

The CRP requires participating farmers to plant permanent (perennial) vegetation on the enrolled cropland. It establishes and maintains better soil cover and wildlife habitat than could be achieved through annual acreage reduction conservation plans on such landprograms, Osborn notes, because or risk losing eligibility for other the CRP acreage is covered by program benefits," Osborn said. long-term contracts and is therefore less likely to be disturbed.

Under the provisions of the 1990 farm act, total CRP acreage will be expanded to no less than 39 million or more than 44 million acres by 1995, including the 34 million acres that had already been enrolled before the legislation's passage.

Land currently enrolled in the CRP will remain out of production at least until 1996. At that time, contracts covering land enrolled in 1986 will expire, and USDA's annual rental payments will end.

"Because farmers will not be required to maintain the CRP conservation covers after the contract expires, a lot of CRP land will likely go back into crop production if prevailing prices and commodity programs make this option financially attractive to far-

mers," Osborn said. In the 1990 farm act, Congress made three significant changes in the CRP that could affect the future of the acres currently enrolled. First, it gave the Secretary of Agriculture authority to extend contracts. Second, it authorized the Environmental Easement Program to establish long-term or permanent land easements. And third, it stated that farmers will continue to have their crop acreage protected, provided the land remains in conserva-

Over the next few years, policy- the agenda. makers will consider ways to preserve the environmental gains achieved through the CRP-such as contract renewals, land purchases, and long-term or permanent easements.

"Many of the questions will be addressed in the 1995 farm bill," Osborn said. "The provisions of the 1990 legislation indicated a trend toward long-term easements and a desire for a more permanent solu-

But concerns for the environment will be tempered by budgetary constraints. The current CRP costs about \$1.7 billion a year in rental payments.

Extensions of existing CRP contracts will mean that policymakers and others in government must take a serious look at what tracts of land surplus commodities, and provide need extended or permanent protection most.

"On the positive side, conservation compliance provisions apply to highly erodible cropland enrolled in the CRP, so all farmers participating in USDA crop programs will be required to devise and implement














