## Good Telephone Service IS DEPENDENT UPON ADEQUATE INCOME

The greatly increased cost of providing telephone service has made it necessary for this Company to adjust its local telephone rates. We want our customers to know the reasons why this is necessary.

## Costs of Providing Service Much Higher

The cost of almost everything necessary to provide telephone service is much higher. Since 1940 prices of staple items as telephones, cable, switchboards, poles and wire have greatly increased. For example, copper wire has gone up 65 pct., poles 60 pct. and switching equipment 53 pct. The cost of other necessities is correspondingly more.

## Payroll More Than Doubled

Since 1940 our labor cost, which represents about 70 per cent of our expense, has gone up 153 per cent. We are serving more telephones, but despite this fact the labor cost of each telephone in service has almost doubled in the past 6 years.

## Expenses Have Gone Up Faster Than Income

Every effort has been made to operate economically and, at the same time, to meet the service requirements of our customers. We are taking in more money now but expenses have gone up much more than have revenues. The result is that our net operating income (after deducting expenses from revenues) is less now than it was 10 years ago and only slightly more than during the worst years of the depression. It is entirely inadequate to sustain a rapidly increasing investment needed to handle a greatly increased telephone load.

General Rate Structure Decreased In 1930
Our general rate structure for the Robert Lee exchange was decreased in 1930 and has remained unchanged from that date

## Good Telephone Service Is Our Aim

Telephone requirements during the war and in the period following have greatly increased the demand for service. Operating restrictions and shortages have made the task of meeting this demand more difficult. Many customers are still on the "waiting list." Considerable progress has been made. But much work remains to be done. During the first part of 1947 we propose to extend and improve our plant to the extent necessary to provide good telephone service. All of this, of course, must be done in the face of greatly increased costs in both labor and materials.

Rate Adjustmentment The Only Solution
Efficiency and economy of operation have always been foremost considerations in the management of this Company. Much study has been devoted to the problem of making ends meet. However, income must be sufficient to pay our employees fair wages, meet expenses and fulfill service requirements of our customers.

## Notice To WATER SUBSCRIBERS

The City of Robert Lee is unable to hire extra help to go out and collect water bills each month, and present city employees have other work which requires their attention.
Because of this situation the following rules guverning the payment of water bills will become effective April 1, 1947:

A representative of the Water Department will call on business firms one time only between the 1st and 10th of each month for the collection of water accounts.
All residential subscribers must pay their water bills at the office in the City Hall not later than the 15th of each month.
If water accounts are not paid by the 15 th of the month, service will be discontinued and a $\$ 1.00$ service charge will be added for turning the water on again.
