## Voters Approve Tax Raise School

By a vote of 112 to 77 the proposition of raising the Robert Lee Independent School District tax levy from \$1.00 to \$1.50 was approved at a special election Wednesday. The school board submitted the matter to the voters when state officials warned that the district was in danger of losing some of its state aid and accredited standing, because it was not raising sufficient taxes to meet necessary maintenance costs.

The school board was scheduled to hold its regular monthly meeting last night at which time finances will be discussed and plans made for opening of the new term Sept. 1.

The increased levy means that the district will collect approximately \$4,500 more in taxes the coming year, all of which can be used in paying off bank loans and provide for badly needed repairs to the school building and equipment. Lack of funds prevented the district from purchasing any new equipment or making repairs the past few years, and the situation had become critical.

Patrons of the district met at the court house Monday night when they were given an insight into school matters by Supt. M. G. Hannaford and board members. Total receipts of the district since last Sept. 1 were \$18,664 in state aid, while \$9,598 was derived from local taxes. It was pointed out that some additional funds are yet to be received as transportation aid and state and county apportionments, leaving the district owing about \$5,000 in addition to the bonded debt.

Among the biggest expense items the past year were \$1,023 for fuel, lights, etc.; gas, oil and bus repairs, \$2,389; bus drivers wages, three drivers at \$45 per month, \$1,215; and six oil heaters in the lower rooms, \$600.

Monroe Parker was in charge of the special election and his board included Roy Taylor, Bailey Russell, Mettie Russell and Mrs. Ethel Green

## County Education Board Meeting

A regular meeting of the county board of education was held here Monday. S. E. Adams was re-elected chairman and Judge Bob L. Davis is chairman, exofficio. Other members of the board are Will Fikes, Will Millican, Frank Keeney and L. Y. Harrell.

A budget for the new year was approved including \$1,600 salary and \$450 traveling expenses for the county superintendent, \$1,500 deputy's salary, and \$240 per diem salaries for board members. A new law raised the superintendent's salary from \$900. All administrative expenses are paid from state funds.

The county superintendent's office has set up a new system of accounting and records for the six common school districts which will prove highly valuable.

Homer Jameson and Russ Mathers were appointed members of the Silver school board to fill vacancies.

Baylor Walker was appointed trustee at Wildcat to succeed Henry Childress, resigned.

A vacancy caused by the resignation of Steve Devoll at Sanco was filled by the appointment of B. D. Gartman.

Guy C. West, state auditor of the Department of Education, was in Robert Lee two days the first of the week assisting school boards with their accounting records. Mr. West was accompanied here by his wife and they were house guests of Judge and Mrs. Bob L. Davis.

## Raise City Property To One-Third Actual Value

More than 250 owners of city property had their renditions raised by the board of equalization at its recent session. Members of the board were Gerald Allen, Frank McCabe and Cortez Russell.

Realizing that the city of Robert Lee was badly in need of more funds to get its operations on a current basis, the board decided to set tax valuations at a figure of approximately one-third of the actual property value.

The board is made up of men who know the true value of Robert Lee property and they put in a long session going over every piece of property in the city. Some vacant lots which have been rendered at ridiculously low figures were boosted substantially, while many dwellings as well as business properties were raised.

Property owners will be notified this week if their renditions have been raised, and a date will be set when they may appear before the board for a hearing.

## Sun Tax Valuation Listed at \$233,560

Coke county commissioners met late Thursday to wind up its business as a board equalization. During the day renditions were approved on oil and public utility properties aggregating more than a half million dollars.

Early this year the board contracted Thos. Y. Pickett Co., valuation engineers of Dallas, to handle assessments of this nature. The work has been in charge of Pete King, who assisted the board at Thursday's hearing.

Sun Oil company agreed to a rendition of \$233,560 for 1947 taxing purposes. While they had but one producing well on Jan. 1, the company rendered other wells which were developed up until July 1. The first producer was valued at \$69,000, and each location at \$35,000.

Representatives of Humble and Stanolind suggested a rendition of 50 cents an acre on their leases in the county, but the figure was raised to \$1.00 per acre.

San Angelo telephone company agreed to a raise of \$3,000, making their total rendition in the county \$18,6000.

The assessors office is now compiling a complete list of the assessments and the county levy will be set in the near future. Indications are that the assessed valuation will show a considerable increase this year.

## Fred Jameson No. 3 Makes 610 Barrels In 24-Hour Test

Flowing 610 barrels of 46.9 gravity oil, with no water, on a 24-hour Railroad Commission gauge ending at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, Sun Oil company No. 3 Fred Jameson became the sixth and largest completed producer in the Jameson field of northwestern Coke county.

The well marks a southwest extension to production from the crinoidal of the Strawn section of the Pennsylvania. It is one-half mile west of No. 2 Fred Jameson and one-half mile south and a quarter mile west of No. 1 Fred Jameson, both completed producers.

No. 2 Fred Jameson heretofore was the largest well, with a 24-hour flow of 433 barrels of oil through a quarter inch choke.

No. 3 Fred Jameson was gauged through a quarter-inch choke on 2 inch tubing set 6,212 feet and 544 perforations of 6,133-75 and 6,220-45 feet in 5 1-2 inch casing cemented at 6,258 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,440-1. Flowing casing pressure was 1,085 pounds.

The Baker-Taylor rotary rig was released Sunday and moved a quarter mile south and one-fourth mile west. The new location is Homer Jameson No. 2, and is located one-eighth mile from the Mathers line. The new test spudded in at 2 p. m. Tuesday and was ready to set surface pipe after reaching 1,475 feet Thursday noon.

Sun No. 1-A Willie I. Tubb, northwest outpost to the Jameson field was swabbing yesterday following more than 900 perforations between 6,310 and 6,470 feet. Operators indicated last night that the well would be acidized.

Following their release on Tubb 1-A, Ray-Harris Drilling company will move their rotary equipment to Fred Jameson No. 4, a south offset to Homer Jameson No. 1.

Sun No. 2 Tubb was drilling ahead Thursday below 4,200 feet. It is a west offset to Homer Jameson No. 1.

Operators stated this week that equipment will be moved in soon to work over Allen Jameson No. 1, the discovery, and Homer Jameson No. 1. The pool opener was completed after penetrating only 20 feet of pay, and production has slowed down considerably. The Homer Jameson well has not been making half its allowable. Both wells will probably be acidized.

### At Coaching School

Jiggs Hudson is in attendance this week at the Texas state coaching school at El Paso. High school coaches from all over the state are taking part in the week's training. Highlights of the event will be the all-star football game Friday night. Jiggs has been working on a drilling crew in the Jameson oil field the past two months, but during the remainder of the summer will devote his time looking after athletic affairs of the Robert Lee high school. Material is on hand for constructing new bleacher seats with a capacity of 600 persons.

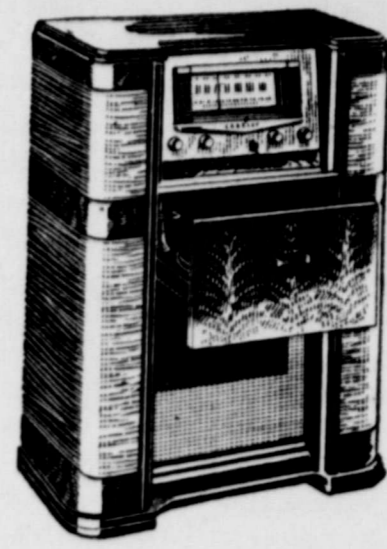
Roy Tinkler has gone to Mereta where he will help relatives with farm work for a couple of weeks.
