## UCRA To Come

 Into Active Status Beginning Sept. 5(San Angelo St.-Times)
The Upper Colorado River Authority will assume official life next Friday, Sept. 5.
That is the effective date of legislation passed by the 50 th Legislature clarifying the water authority's financial structure and powers and turning it loose officially as an operating unit of the state government.

## \$144,000 Due Now

State Comptroller George Sheppard has been supplied with an attorney general's opinion which construes the new law and releases an accumulated fund of about $\$ 144,000$ to the agency, including a special $\$ 5,000$ allocation for immediate operating expenses-the latter an item which has been met in recent years by the UCRA board members themselves and civic groups here and in Bronte Robert Lee and other towns in the immediate upper Colorado area

Aside from the $\$ 500,000$ commit ment on the north Concho dam here, the authority has a $\$ 1,000$ 000 obligation to the Bureau of Reclamation for a larger reservoir project on the main Colorado around Robert Lee, with a 58,000 acre irrigation project extending to the Ballinger vicinity and into the northeastern corner of Tom Green County and the northwest
corner of Concho.
Two-County Set-Up
Under the attorney general's
ruling, the Tom Green and Coke collected taxes each month to the
river agency after Sept. 1, 1948. At present the taxes go to the state treasurer and vouchers will be payable through him. When the authority will assume full control of its own accounting will be deter mined during the impending Ausin visit of the UCRA board mem-

## YOUR RDA

Most of us don't think about planting strawberries until October, but the battle to grow strawberries largely won through soil preparation before the plants are set out.
Here's how they do it. First they take care of drainage-to be sure that water wont be standing around the plants during the winter when they are growing. Then there's the question of soil fertility. Two or three hundred pounds of compost or ripe barnlot fertilizer to each 100 feet of row space takes care of that fertility. Six to eight pounds of 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer in that 100 feet of row will improve your chances. Mix these materials in the soil and plow Leave the beds in this shape until ust before you're ready to plantwhen you'll want to grab a rake they'll be about a foot wide. Then they'll be about a foot wide. Then your plants will go into moist soil
