## Sun Oil Gets 9th Producing Well In Coke County Field

 With completion this week on Willie I. Tubb, Sun Oil company now has nine producing wells in the Jameson field near Silver. No. 2 Homer Jameson flowed naturally 327.39 barrels of 47 gravity, pipeline oil through a quarter inch choke in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was $1,573-1$. Flowing pressure was 1,490 pounds on the casing and 823 pounds on the tubing. Production is from open hole pay between 5,805 feet and 6,392 feet. Five and one-half inch casing was cemented at 6,090 feet and 2 -inch tubing run to 6,383 .No. 2 Homer Jameson has an elevation of 2,048 feet. It is 660 reet from the south and east lines of Section 316, a quarter mile outh and quarter mile west of Sun No. 3 Fred Jameson, largest wel 610 barrels.
Sun No. 2 Willie I. Tubb flowed 81.27 barrels of 47 gravity oil plus 3.2 percent wash water in 24 hours ending Wednesday. Gas-oil ratio was $1,567-1$. Production is from open hole between 6,177 feet, where $51-2$ inch casing was cemented, and drilled out depth of 6,265 feet The well drilled to 6,350 feet and plugged back. Since the well is not
