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Soft Corn Requires Special Attention Several Methods Given
For Profitable Feeding For Profitable Feeding
Saying soft corn will be prob

cribs, built in east and west direce-
tions, took best advantage of prevailing winds.

Two carloads of phosphate, a total of 70 tons, have been purchased by Coke county farmers and ranchman during recent weeks Orders were placed through the county agent's office.
Phosphate is being used principally with winter cover crops of grain and legumes. The main legume being used here at present is hairy vetch. Farmers who qualify under the Triple A program will be reimbursed $\$ 21$ a ton on he phosphate, and they are also chase of legume seed as a soil building crop.
County Agent T. B. Hicks says the principal benefit of phosphate as a fertilizer is that it assists in the fruiting of grain and makes heavier yields. It also liberates the calcium in the soil for plant
