down and Herron failed to convert the extra point from placement.
The second touchdown resulted midway in the third period. Bronte had been stopped in three plays

a 15 yard clipping penalty on Robert Lee gave the Longhorns first down on the Steer 25. From then on the Steers seemed to lose heart, and Bronte put over three more touchdowns.
LeDrew Arrott and Billy Thomas were the mainstays in the Long-

School Boards Discuss Plans For Annexing Districts
A movement was launched he will result in a vast improvement to the public schools of the west half of Coke county. Responding to an invitation from Robert Lee school authorities, board members of Wildcat, Green Mountain Sanco and Silver districts gathered here to discuss the possibility of annexing the outlying districts to the Robert Lee independent dis trict.
