When a group of Dimmitt women, or for that matter any group of women whether they are fortunate enough to be from Dimmitt or not, tells you to write something about a community center building, to be used by all groups of the community especially the young folks, then you had better start writing. Some of the young mothers of the community have been beating the drums for a youth center for the past year or so, and they seem to be as enthusiastic now as they were at the beginning and chances are that they will keep up the clamor until something is done about the matter. Dimmitt is getting large enough that a municipal or community center building of some type is going to be on the must list. The village size town can depend on its school auditoriums or other small improvised housing facilities for its center of recreation, and which will be adequate in most cases. As towns grow to a certain size, and show all indications of continued growth, special arrangements must be made for facilities adequate for town-wide social and recreation activities. While the ladies of the city are primarily interested in an adequate youth center building, and the youth of our land should be our first interest, there are many other divergent reasons why Dimmitt should make provisions for a municipal building that will be adequate to take care of the recreational and cultural needs of the community. As Dimmitt grows, and there are no indications that its growth will not continue for a number of years, its trade area will naturally expand in proportion bringing into its sphere of responsibility many who are not actually residents of the immediate community. A little foresighted planning now could be of immeasurable value in the future while at the same time filling a present need. There are many types of entertainment and recreation that could be induced to appear in our city if we had the facilities to accommodate large numbers of people and then the same building could be used for the many annual events of a townwide and countywide nature. The actual needs for a municipal building would make a list too long to try to enumerate in this space. Just a few of the activities that it would encourage and accommodate would be a youth center, Town Hall and other special educational and amusement programs, special gatherings of all types, old settlers meetings, musicals, cooking schools, agricultural meetings, athletic events, square dance clubs, etc. Dimmitt can't expect to develop to the fullest extent as a trading and business center unless it is willing to assume its social and cultural responsibilities. The need is here, the ladies of the community are calling attention to the necessity for a movement of this type and their request deserves and merits the consideration and cooperation of all of our citizens. The proper approach to the filing of a need of this magnitude will require careful planning and thorough research by interested citizens of the community. The need for a municipal building is apparent, the question is how or by what means to approach the proposition. The News would be happy to publish letters from any of our readers with suggestions, pro or con, regarding the proposition of securing a municipal building for the use of the general public, especially the youth of the area.

Dimmitt's all-electric cooking school will be unveiled at the Carille Theatre Tuesday, February 26 when the first of the afternoon sessions gets under way at 2 p. m. The second days cooking program will be held on Wednesday, February 27.

Dimmitt's electric appliance dealers, C & S Equipment Company, Dimmitt Motor Company, Hays Implement Co., Umberson Electric Co., and White's Auto Store are cooperating with the Southwestern Public Service Company in presenting the all-electric cooking clinic.

The Dimmitt appliance dealers are offering a \$200 electric merchandise certificate as a grand prize for those attending and it will be awarded at the conclusion of the last session of the cooking school. Small door prizes of electric merchandise will also be given by the electrical merchandise dealers here both days. All of the food as prepared by the Southwestern Public Service Company' Home Service Advisors, Miss Clydia Little and Miss Patricia Stearns, will be given away at the conclusion of each session. Miss Little promises some delicious steaks and a complete over meal among the prepared food to be given away. Frozen pies will be added to the list of food each day.

Miss Clydia Little, Home Service Advisor for the Public Service Company, with headquarters in Clovis, will conduct the school. She will be assisted by Miss Patricia Stearns, Home Service Advisor of Southwestern's Plainview office. Miss Little is well known in Dimmitt and the Castro County area. In cooperation with Miss Stearns, she has presented electric cooking schools at many Plains communities in recent months.

Local Farmers Show Interest In Irrigation and Soil Fertility Meet

Approximately 50 persons attended the irrigation and Soil Fertility meeting that was held in the Carille Theatre, Wednesday, February 13. Even though the attendance was smaller than expected, the information received by those present was certainly informative, practical and something they could use in their farming operations.

Marty stated that this was one of the best meetings of this nature ever held in Castro County. Persons appearing on the program included Fred Dines, wheat marketing specialist for the Extension Service; Andy Rogers of Childress, and Representative from the 121st Legislative District; Willis Hawkins of Hart and one of the Directors of the Underground Water District; Mr. John Box of Lubbock Experiment Station; Johnny Jordan, Texas Employment Service of Littlefield; Norris P. Swanson of Amarillo Experiment Station and from the Division of Irrigation and Water Conservation Research; and Mr. Robert Thurmond, Irrigation Engineer with Extension Service in Lubbock, Texas.

He pointed out that under average conditions you store moisture now and plant cotton around the 15th of May, irrigate when first white blooms appear or about the 15th of July and you can expect to make a good cotton crop. He stated that normally the cotton that the farmer hauls to the gin is put on from July 15 to August 15 and stressed the fact that during this period water requirements are higher and irrigation water should be applied to carry the crop through this period. He also stated that 65% of the cotton forms put on during the growing season can be expected to fall off.

Mr. Box pointed out that pre-planting irrigation for grain sorghum is not as essential as that for cotton, however he does recommend it. Since grain sorghums are natives of the tropics he stressed the fact that they do grow better when the days and nights are of equal length and recommends June 10 as desirable planting date. He states that the root, bloom and dough stages of milo are the periods when water is needed most and every effort should be made to supply water at these times. He pointed out that as the maturity date of milo increases so does yield, i.e. Martins will mature faster than Plainsman, caprock and other, but can be expected to be somewhat lower in yield. Redbine 60, 66 and Combine Kaffir 60 are three promising new varieties that Mr. Box recommends.

Mr. Thurmond states the biggest problem of the irrigation farmer is getting water into the soil at a uniform depth from end to end. He emphasized that one thorough irrigator is more valuable than several shallow irrigations. He suggested that more farmers carry a soil auger so they could determine the depth that they are wetting the soils.

To end the program, the farmers present were asked to give their ideas on how to make the meeting for next year more interesting and informative. Several suggestions were made and it is hoped that through these suggestions the 1953 irrigator and soil fertility meeting can be even more successful.

Mr. Knox Parr of Amarillo and District I Agricultural Agent was present for the meeting.

The Castro County Chamber of Commerce served this group a noon meal at the Fair Building and are to be commended for their interest in the agricultural activities of Castro County.

Rev. D. W. Breahears welcomed the group to Dimmitt and stated that 80% of the income of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce will be used for agricultural purposes.

EXTENSION OF BENEFITS UNDER THE SERVICEMEN'S READJUSTMENT ACT TO KOREAN VETERANS: The hearings have commenced in the Veterans Affairs Committee on legislation designed to extend to Korean veterans the educational, on-job training, housing and other benefits granted and extended to World War II veterans under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act. The benefits under this act are extended to Korean veterans, but are in my mind perhaps greater or more important than those benefits extended to World War II veterans. It is my opinion that these benefits should have been extended to Korean veterans during the first session of this Congress. This would have been done except for an investigation of some immorality, not illegal practices and abuses that are being carried on under the original act. The committee investigating this immorality is the purpose of imposing on veterans and making the public treasury. Such vicious and shady schemes were not only an imposition on the World War II veterans, but were the basic cause for the delay in the extension of the benefits to the Korean veterans. These hearings are being expedited up so that this legislation can be presented to the entire House of Representatives for immediate action.

During one of the recent hearings an argument arose between a witness and several members of the committee as to whether or not the Korean action was a "war" or a "police action." It was my observation that this was a question that could be answered unequivocally by some of the boys who have been over there. No matter what you call it, the weapons used are the same and are capable of dealing the same kind of death, the same kind of maiming, the same kind of destruction. Actually, we are in it and I say, "Call it whatever you want, but for the sake of humanity, let's get it over with." If we were not in Korea, but merely contemplating entry, there would be ample justification for the continuing debate, simply because the difference between a war and a police action is this: In order for this country to engage in war a formal declaration of war by the Congress is required. A police action merely means that troops, equipment and arms may be committed to certain sectors by executive order without a declaration of war by the Congress. Our responsibility at the present time is to get this Korean conflict



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of humanity when they say that they have ceased to be communists. It is rather odd that they do not denounce communism until just before they are caught. It is also odd that after they have denounced communism for the obvious purpose of saving their own skins they refuse to divulge the names of the sinister vermin and rodents (rats and lice in plain Texas English) with whom they were associated. This to me is the proof of the pudding, and I say that this kind of human vampire should be cast from our shores along with the whole kit and caboodle of his associates. Here are the names of some of the productions with which he was associated: "Sign of the Cross"; "Thunder Below";

"Whom the Gods Destroy"; and a favorite of many movie goers, "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington". He should have written "Mr. Buchanan Goes to Moscow" and confirmed his own actions to the title. One of his later productions was "To The Ends of The Earth", a rather fitting title for what the communists stand for.

There is quite a bit of talk around Congress for a resolution calling for disbarment proceedings against his attorneys, Pepper and Siegel of New York City, for questionable and sharp practices allegedly indulged in by them before the committee. The dander of the Congress is up, and the likes of Sidney Buchman and his associates can expect to be dealt with accordingly.

Farm Workers and Household Employees Need S. S. Card

Regularly employed farm workers, and household employees who came under Social Security last year need social security account cards, according to John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office.

"If the worker does not have an account number, or has lost his original card," Sanderson says, "he should get one from our office."

Sanderson points out that farm and household workers who became covered under Social Security now earn Old-Age and Survivors Insurance benefits along with other workers in business and industry. "Benefits are based on wages and the worker needs to get credit for every dollar he earns up to \$3600 in a calendar year. So that he may obtain proper credit for his wages, the worker should show his social security account number card to his employer the first day he goes to work," Sanderson concluded.

1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup sour milk
1 1/2 cup whole-wheat flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 1/2 teaspoon spices
1/4 teaspoon ginger
1/4 teaspoon salt

THE LAW AND YOU
by Robt. (Bob) Kirk

DO YOU KNOW whether or not you may sue the State of Texas?
The State of Texas may not be sued without its consent. In many cases suits may be brought against individuals holding office under the State of Texas, and acting as agents of the State of Texas where the State of Texas is not the principal party to the suit, without first gaining consent of the State to the suit. There are numerous situations in which suit may be brought against an individual officer, affecting the duties and functions of his office, and in which the State of Texas is not directly or substantially a party in interest.
The Legislature of the State of Texas by a proper action may permit certain general types of suits to be brought against the State of Texas, under certain conditions and restrictions. Then if a special situation arises, which is not covered by the general rules, the Legislature of the State of Texas is authorized by proper legislation to permit the suit to be brought.
If a suit is brought against the State, and a judgment secured against the State, then it becomes necessary for the Legislature to appropriate the necessary money to pay off such judgment.

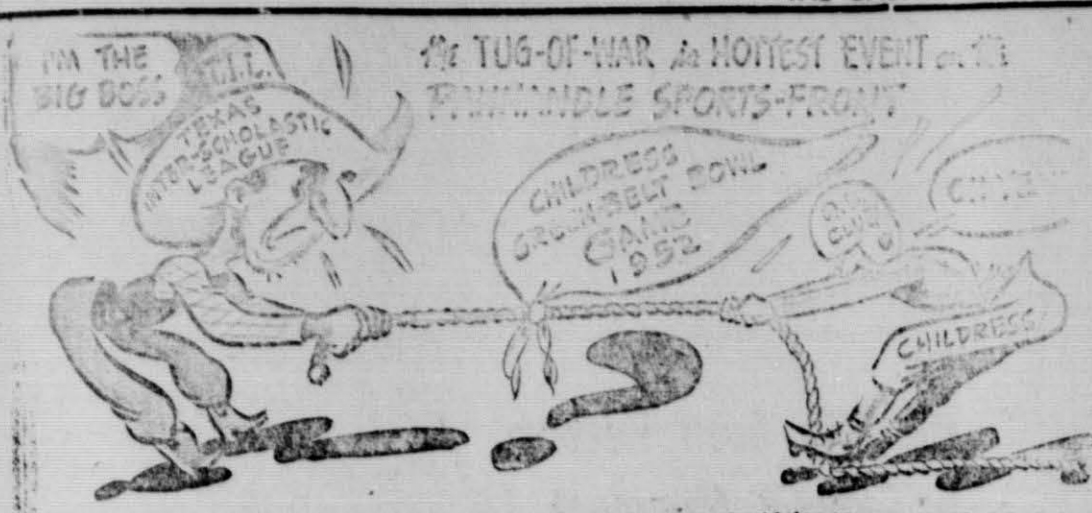

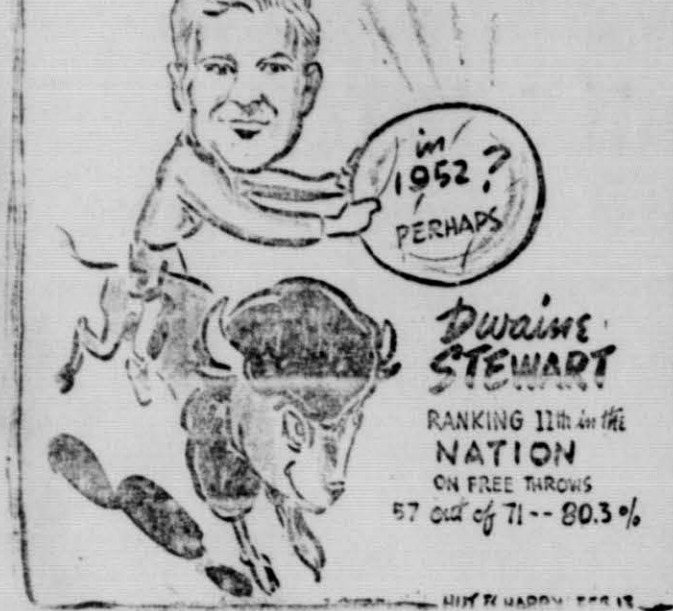

2. Any policy holder may request VA in writing to apply his 1952 dividend as an advance payment on premiums falling due after the 1952 anniversary date of his policy.

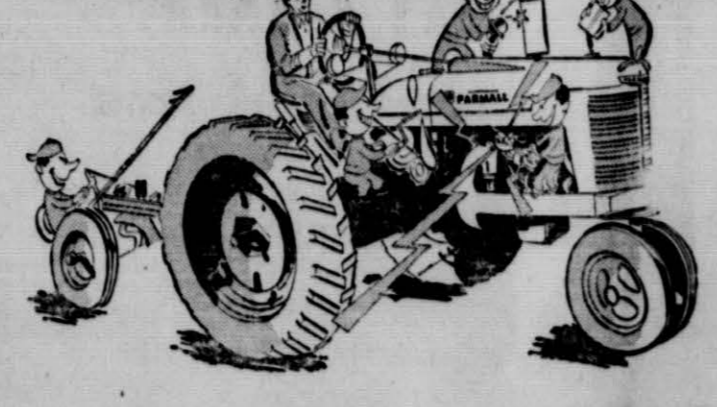
The latter two options apply for the first time because the 1952 dividend is the first regular dividend declared on NSLI. The two previous dividends were special dividends.

For all of these questions, VA stressed that policy holders should write to the VA office in which they are paying their premiums.

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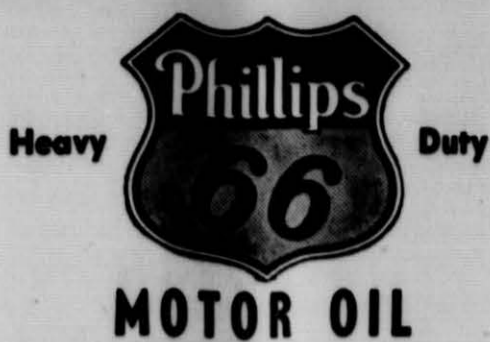

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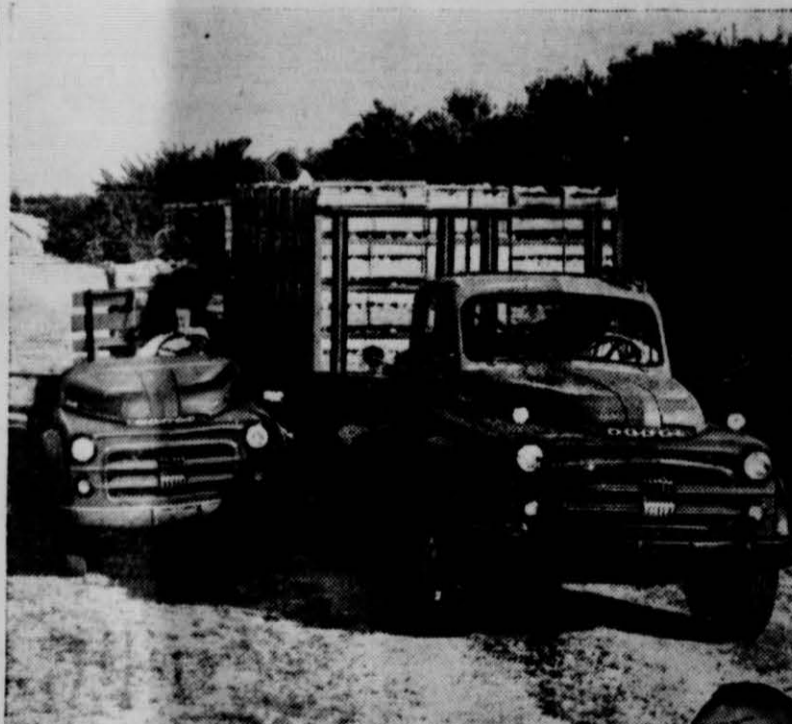
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
