## Top Calf Brought 38 Cents Pound At Livestock Auction

A 960-pound Hereford won grand champion baby beef honors in the Coke County Livestock Show here Tuesday. The animal was entered by Melva D. ne Gartman, 12 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Gartman of Sanco.

Marvin Simpson, well known Robert Lee ranchman, paid 38c per pound for the animal at the auction.

Grand champion lamb was shown by J. B. Arrott, while Le-Drew Arrott had the reserve champion lamb. Wayne Arrott took first honors in both the light and heavy weight barrow classes.

The show was highly successful. In the auction sale Tuesday afternoon five calves sold at an average price of 32c per pound. The price on the top 20 lambs averaged 34c, while six barrows brought an average of 31c per pound.

Holder of the lucky ticket on calf drawing was Carrie Katherine Rabb, who was awarded a 368 pound calf by the association. The drawing brought in \$360 which was used as prize money in the stock show.

Glenn Tennis of the San Angelo Auction company cried the sale and did a fine job.

The Observer will print a full list of the prize winners next week.

### Sanco-Silver Election

A special election will be held Saturday, March 6, on the proposal of consolidating the Sanco and Silver school districts. Elections will be held in both districts and the proposition must carry in each district if a consolidation becomes effective. An election a few weeks ago to consolidate the Robert Lee and Sanco districts resulted in a tie vote of 35 for and 35 against. Petitions asking for a Silver-Sanco vote were filed immediately thereafter.

## Reed Wildcat To Spud; Shamrock Will Test, Too

Arrow Drilling company has been rigging up the past week and is expected to spud in by Saturday on the Reed location, 10 miles southeast of Robert Lee. The joint wildcat test is being made by Seaboard Oil company and Southern Minerals Corp. on a block of 8,500 acres.

H. G. Wendland said in San Angelo Wednesday that he had assurance from Shamrock Oil company that they would be moving in equipment for their test on the Wendland lease within another week.

The Shamrock location has not been definitely staked, but is in a block joining Seaboard and Southern Minerals on the north.

## Man Killed When Air Plane Crashed

A Hot Springs, N. Mex., man was killed and his grandson seriously injured at noon last Thursday when their light plane crashed in a field six miles north of Robert Lee.

W. M. Ashcroft, 67, died enroute to the Bronte hospital.

Marion Dempsey, 26, the pilot, Hot Springs garage mechanic, was taken to a San Angelo hospital with severe fractures of both ankles.

The two were flying back to Hot Springs after a visit with relatives near Brownwood. They had intended to go down to Harlingen, but abandoned that portion of their trip because of poor flying weather.

The crash occurred on the Curtis Byrd ranch, about 200 yards from the home of Mrs. L. W. Service. Other near neighbors are the Bill McCutchens and John Gunnells. Folks in the neighborhood said the Cessna 140 came over the area about noon, racing the engine, and appeared to be about to land.

As they watched, the plane flew out of sight in low clouds toward Robert Lee. A few minutes later it returned, circled over the field as though heading into the wind for a landing, and then suddenly fell out of the air.

Mrs. Gunnells called Bruce Clift who rushed to the scene with the ambulance, accompanied by Deputy Sheriff O. B. Jacobs. Neighbors helped remove the victims from the wreckage.

Ashcroft was crushed about the chest, had both legs and one arm broken, and received serious cuts and bruises about his head and face.

Both of Dempsey's ankles were broken, the left one being badly crushed. He was also bruised about the body. He is still in the hospital and reports indicate he is recovering. Dempsey said his motor stopped and he was coming in for a landing in an oat field on the Byrd farm. When he got within 200 feet of the ground he was caught in a down draft which caused the crash.

### Home Destroyed When Oil Heater Explodes

A four-room home in the south part of town owned by Floyd Smith was totally destroyed by fire Tuesday. The blaze was caused by the explosion of an oil-heating stove.

Floyd and his family had returned home just before 6 o'clock in the evening and he immediately lighted the heater. Within a few minutes the stove exploded, spreading oil flames all over the living room. Smith was burned about the face and one hand, but succeeding in getting four children, who had accompanied them home, out of the house safely.

The house was soon enveloped in flames, and although the fire truck made a quick run to the scene, it was impossible to save the building. All of the family's household goods and clothing burned.

Floyd is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Smith, and has been working in the oil field. He is a young war veteran and the couple have an 8-months-old daughter, Mary Pearl.

No insurance was carried on the house or its contents.

## Allen Jameson 3 Has Strong Show; Arledge Near Pay

Sun's No. 3 Allen Jameson showed one of the strongest drillstem tests ever made in the Coke county field this week. The 58 minute test on Monday resulted in gas coming to the surface in 5 minutes and the well flowed from the top in 58 minutes. Recovery included 6,080 feet of oil and 210 feet of oil cut mud.

A schlumberger survey from 1,445 feet to 6,312 feet showed the top of the lime reef was reached at 6,290 feet, with the top of pay from 6,305 to 6,312. Casing was cemented Wednesday to 6,290 feet with 600 sacks. Operators plan to deepen the hole to 6,472 feet.

Location is 1,900 feet northwest of No. 1 Allen Jameson, Sun's Coke county discovery producer.

Sun No. 2 Arledge is coring and testing this week, latest depth being 6,604 feet. During a one-hour drillstem test Tuesday from 6,552 to 6,593 feet, 190 feet of gas cut mud was recovered. Operators have kept a close check on formations above the Marble Falls section which was reached at 6,598 feet in the No. 1 Arledge wildcat discovery.

Location is a northwest offset to No. 1 Arledge. Operators plan to explore the Ellenburger.

No. 6 Homer Jameson has set 7-inch casing and was waiting on cement Thursday. The test will be deepened to the Ellenburger probably below 7,000 feet. The sixth drillstem test Wednesday from 6,145 to 6,177 feet resulted in gas coming to the surface in 39 minutes and 50 feet of slightly gas-cut mud was recovered. A Schlumberger survey was made before setting casing.

No. 3 C. E. Mathers struck a heavy gas pocket which gauged a surface pressure of 500 pounds in a drillstem test Wednesday from 5,782 to 5,815 feet. The tool was open only 14 minutes. Gas came to the surface in 5 minutes. Recovery included 20 feet of gas-cut mud and 25 feet of distillate.

No. 6 Fred Jameson was swabbing Thursday after acidizing with 4,000 gallons. The hole had been plugged back to 6,391 feet because of water.

No. 1 Central National Bank, offset to J. B. Walker's discovery producer, south of the river, was drilling Wednesday at 5,921 feet in shale.

No. 1 Elwood estate, Sun's wildcat location on the Spade Ranch in Mitchell county, was expecting drilling equipment this week. Morris-Hamilton is the contractor and a brand new \$210,000 rotary rig is being shipped from Houston. Russell Campbell is the tool pusher.

**SCIENCE IN SURGERY**  
**Complicated Device Photographs Perfect Camera—The Human Eye**

Most people understand how the X-ray is used by the medical profession, and many have heard that photography is being used in the medical field. However, it is difficult for the average person to visualize just how photography can be used to advantage in medicine.

A visit to the New York Eye and Ear infirmary, the oldest specialized hospital in the western hemisphere, where people from all walks of life have been treated for more than a century in its numerous eye, ear, nose and throat clinics demonstrates the value of the technique. This hospital is staffed by the great and near-great in the fields of ophthalmology and otolaryngology. Surgeons with Park avenue practices come daily to diagnose and treat the 35,000 people who pass through its clinics each year.

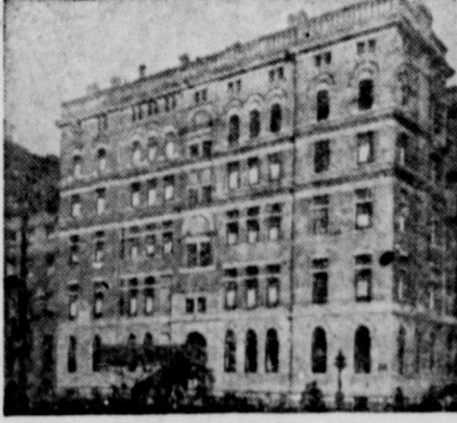
Here medical photography has become a recognized and established service in the treatment of many eye diseases.

**Explains Techniques.**  
 This department was organized and is run by Mary R. Brown, one of the few women in this country who specialize in the field of ophthalmic photography. She is a pretty, quiet woman whose own son is just completing his medical education. Mrs. Brown explained some of the scientific techniques she uses daily in her diagnostic research and medical record work for surgeons at the New York Eye and Ear infirmary.

In addition to the small and delicate cameras that photograph the outer sections of the eye, there is the Fundus camera used for photographing the retina of the eye—the area deep within the eye itself. This complicated camera uses the lens of the patient's eye as part of its optical system and the resulting pictures are in color. They have great diagnostic value; the surgeon's decision depends many times on these true-to-life photographs.

Mrs. Brown relates that, "Only recently, a young lad who had his eye hurt playing basketball was brought into the hospital. A growth had formed on the retina and retinal pictures were ordered. These were airmailed to a famous eye specialist in England to corroborate our own surgeon's diagnosis. With nothing but these colored slides, magnified and thrown on a screen, he recommended preserving the eye, as our own men did. In time, the growth went away, just as the specialist said it would, and today this boy has his sight."

**Recalls War Case.**  
 "Back in November 1945," Mrs. Brown recalls, "a young G.I. bride,

whose husband was still in the South Pacific, was brought in for photographs. Her record, when she entered the hospital, stated that a tumorous growth, thought to be malignant, had formed in the iris of the right eye and therefore the eye should be removed. The surgeon in charge at the New York Eye and Ear infirmary was not in full accord with this diagnosis and did not feel that this patient should lose an eye without further study. He ordered photographs taken of the condition every month, carefully measuring the size and comparing with the previous plates. At the end of a year the growth had not expanded in any direction, these measurements proved. During the following year pictures were taken every two months and careful checks were made against the first plates. It has been fully determined, up to the present time, that the growth is not malignant, and this grateful young woman still has her eye today."

Movies taken in color and used for teaching purposes are a part of Mrs. Brown's daily work. These films of rare and delicate operations performed at the infirmary are being used to guide and teach a new generation of eye surgeons throughout the Americas and as far away as India and the Philippines. In addition to routine work, classes in medical photography are conducted for graduate students in ophthalmology. Thus the young specialists who train here can take with them to the small communities throughout the country a knowledge of ophthalmic photography that will help them trace the progress of eye diseases and their treatments, thus many times saving the sight of an eye otherwise lost.

**No Track or Train But Railroad Pays Regular Dividends**

**ADRIAN, MICH.** — Although it hasn't operated a train or collected a fare for nearly a century, the Erie and Kalamazoo railroad again is making its semi-annual payment to stockholders.

Now forgotten by all except historians and its fourth and fifth generation stockholders, the Erie and Kalamazoo ranked as the oldest railroad west of Schenectady, N. Y. Although the railroad has long been inoperative, it derives a regular income from lease of its original right-of-way to the New York Central railroad. The present dividend amounts to \$9,000 after deductions for taxes and expenses. Last year the E. and K. paid \$19,500 in dividends.

Incorporated by the Michigan territorial legislature on April 22, 1833, the E. and K. was capitalized for \$1,000,000 but only \$300,000 in stock was issued.

It originally was authorized to operate between Lake Erie and "the navigable waters of the Kalamazoo river," but it was destined to run only between Port Lawrence (now Toledo, Ohio, but then part of Michigan) and Adrian, a distance of 35 miles.

By 1836 track had been laid from Port Lawrence to Adrian and the first horse-drawn train clattered over the wooden rails in October.

**Methods Suggested For Treating Lice**

**Second Application is Generally Necessary**

The poultry grower has a choice of several effective methods for treating lice. Which one he uses will depend on his preference or the availability of remedies, according to Washington State college. Whatever method is used, birds should be examined 10 days to two weeks after treatment to see if any lice still are present.

Louse eggs are not always destroyed by the treatment used, and these will hatch later. A second

treatment usually is necessary and should be applied about two weeks after the first treatment.

One method is to fumigate with a 40 per cent nicotine sulfate solution. In this case directions of the manufacturer should be followed.

Lice powder also is effective. These may be DDT, nicotine sulfate or commercial sodium fluoride or sodium fluosulfate. These may be applied by the pinch method. It consists of placing on the skin of each fowl about 10 pinches, rubbing into the breast, each thigh, below the vent, on each side of the back, on the neck and head and on the underside of each outspread wing. The fowls also may be dusted, sprayed with dusting material or dipped in a solution. In some parts of the country louse ointments are widely used.

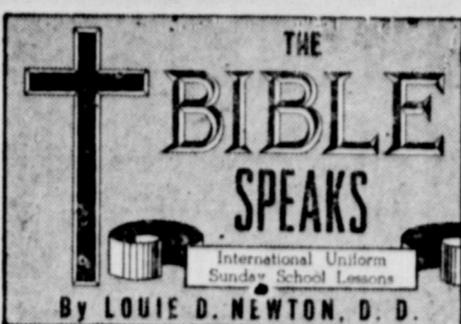
**Corn Production**

Many things are required to produce 100 bushels of corn per acre. The growing crop must have plenty of nitrogen, phosphate, potash and other plant nutrients. A shortage of any will hold down yields and lower the quality and feeding value of the crop. So the use of fertilizer is vital. For high corn yields, the soil must store water for drouth periods. The accompanying chart shows how much of these it takes to produce 100 bushels of corn. Organic matter is especially important. While not a



Nitrogen, phosphate and potash are the most important plant nutrients for growing corn.

plant food, it is essential to crop production. Organic matter improves tilth and keeps the soil loose and open. It is a sponge that soaks up water readily for crops to "drink" in dry spells. It allows air to reach roots and soil bacteria. Organic matter can be built up by growing deep-rooted legumes and grasses frequently in the rotation. To get good stands, liming based on soil tests and a generous feeding of phosphate and potash are needed. Organic matter can be replenished, too, by returning barnyard manure, straw and corn stalks to the land. When plant food, good tilth, organic matter, and other soil conservation measures are combined into a team, maximum corn production per acre is assured.

**The Personal Witness**

Lesson for March 7, 1948

DR. ALBERT SCHWEITZER, described by Hermann Hagedorn as "Prophet in the Wilderness," is a living example of what Sunday's lesson is undertaking to portray, namely, living for Jesus where you are.

But to the people of Equatorial Africa, he looks and acts like our Saviour Jesus did.

The lesson passage is found in Acts 8:26-39, and is the story of Philip, leaving his very successful evangelistic campaign in Samaria to follow the lead of the Holy Spirit into the way that goeth down from Jerusalem unto Gaza, which is desert. There he found a man in search of God, and through his witness the man was saved.

**THE STORY OF JESUS**

THIS man was not of Philip's race. He was an Ethiopian. But he was a man. And God loves every man of every race and of every condition of life. Jesus never did meet an unimportant person, nor will any true follower of his. Jesus said, "As the Father has sent Me, even so send I you," John 20:21.

This man was reading in the Book of Isaiah, where the prophet was foretelling how Jesus would suffer for the sins of the whole world. He could not understand the wonderful words. And the Spirit directed Philip to go and join himself to the eunuch. Philip ran to the chariot in which the rich man rode, asking, "Understandest thou what thou readeest?" He was quick to give his witness.

**AND THE MAN LISTENED**

WHEN we faithfully obey the Holy Spirit, he enables us to effectively witness for Jesus. We cannot be effective witnesses if we rely upon our own wisdom and our own judgment. The boy in your street who does not know Jesus will listen to your story if you go in the same glad obedience to the command of the Spirit of God as did Philip.

A lad told me this story. He had a neighbor who had never been to Sunday school, and he wanted to enlist this friend. He thought about it seriously. But he was not quite sure of himself. And then he prayed, asking God to direct him. The next day the boy asked him, "What are you doing Sunday morning?" With this opening the lad invited his neighbor to come along with him, and the result was that the little neighbor, of another race, accepted Christ.

**TO WHOM SHALL WE WITNESS?**

THE question now emerges, To whom shall we bear this witness? We cannot all go as missionaries, as did Dr. Schweitzer.

But every Christian can witness. First, to those immediately about us. In every community in our beloved country are people who do not know Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord. We can witness to them, not to all of them, but to some of them, perhaps to one of them.

Second, we can share in the sending of the missionaries to earth's remotest bounds, through our gifts. I delight to think that I am in partnership with many great men and women on foreign fields, through my gifts and through my prayers.

Third, we can witness through personal correspondence with people in other lands. The present far-reaching media of relief for stricken peoples of the world affords a wonderful opportunity for this very witness. Ask your pastor for the name of some person your age in one of the lands to which your church is sending relief, and write that person a letter, telling of your joy in serving God.

The eunuch went on his way rejoicing. Why? Because Philip had taught him the way of salvation. He had been used as an effective witness in leading a man of another race to experience the peace that passeth all understanding.

And Jesus is saying to us today, "So send I you."

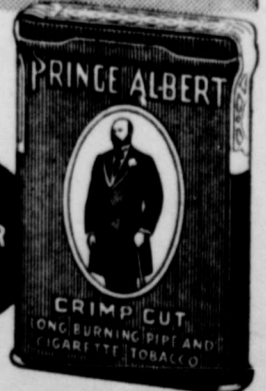
