## Voters Approve County Hospital By 162 Majority

At a special election Saturday
Coke county voters approved the construction of a county hospita by a vote of 744 to 582 . The
proposition authorizes the commissioners court to issue up to
$\$ 50,000$ in time war rants to $\$ 50,000$ in time warants to buil
and equip a hospital in the county and eq
seat.
 contest between the east and west
sides of the county. Each of the seven voting boxes in the wes
part of the county were ove part of the county were over-
whelmingly in favor of the hos-
pital, while six boves in the eat pital, while six boxes in the east
side were just as strongly opposed Hayrick, situated in the middle Robert Lee turned out a record vote of 534 to 6 to overpower
Bronte with its opposing strength Bronte with its opposing strength
of 380 to 17. Residents of Robert Lee and the entire western section of Coke county have been without
the services of a physician, and they were determined to do something about it. Bronte's need
along this line were taken care last year by the construction of privately owned hospital and the arrival of Dr John Harris.
Canvass of the vote will be made at the regular commissioners cour
session Monday, April 12. At that session Monday, April 12. At tha time steps will be taken to pro-
ceed with the hospital plan. Already a number of inquiries have been made concerning purchase of the $\$ 50,000$ in time warrants, and it is
likely that an interest rate of likely that an interest rate of less
than 4 per cent will be bid by in vestment firms. The warrants will
ver will be paid off during a 10 -year period.
A site for the proposed hospital must be secured and an architect engaged to draw up plans and
specifications. According to state law the commissioners court must appoint a board of managers, to
consist of six persons. They will consist of six persons. They wil have general management and con-
trol of the institution and will
serve without compensation, except for actual expenses. Offers have already been made to donate complete furnishings of three hospital
rooms, and additional offers of this rooms, and additional
nature are expected.
While the hospital issue has been hotly contested, it is belived every
one will now lend support in seein that a creditable institution is provided. The Observer is positive
that extreme care will be taken so that extreme care will be taken so
that there will be no injury to the excellent Bronte hospital and Dr.
