Frank Percifull, Former Sheriff, Dies Suddenly

Robert Lee and Coke county citizens mourn the death of Frank Percifull, former sheriff, who passed away suddenly Tuesday night at 10:45 from a heart attack

He had been afflicted with a heart ailment for two years and the past winter spent several weeks in the hospital. This spring he had been taking things easy but was up and around every day. He spent a normal day Tuesday and visited among friends in town until he went home for supper.

He was stricken a short time after he had retired for the night Doctors were summoned immediately, but he passed away before he could be removed to a hospital.

Hundreds came for the funeral services conducted at the family home here Thursday morning at 10:30 o'clock, in charge of the Rev. Fr. John Meister of Sacred Heart Church, San Angalo. Remains of Frank Tubb to be Buried In Nat'l Cemetery

Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Tubb have been advised by the War Department that the remains of their son, Frank M. Tubb, who lost his life in World War II near Hongkong, China, would be shipped back to the United States and interred at Zachary Taylor National Cemetery at Louisville, Ken.

Frank was a radio-gunner on a B-25 which bombed an enemy ammunition ship in the harbor near Hongkong. Fragments from the explosion damaged the light bomber which later crashed into a mountain and exploded.

The American Graves Registration Service exhausts every possible clue which might lead to the individual identification of deceased personnel, however, if further research fails to establish their individual identity, the remains of the group are returned to the United States for final interment in a national cemetery.

A later communication said the remains of this group would be returned simultaneously to the United States within the next few months for final burial in Zachary Taylor National Cemetery, Louisville, Kentucky.

The War Department letter stated further: "This plan for the disposition of groups, with respect to which only the collective identity is known, is in keeping with the provisions of Public Law 383, 79th Congress, as amended by 80th Congress. We believe that you will agree that the burial of this group of honored dead in one of our national shrines, where perpetual care can be given their graves, is both fitting and proper.

"In due course, the superintendent of the above National Cemetery will communicate with you in regard to burial arrangements. Information as to the time of interment will be furnished sufficiently in advance to afford attendance by you and other members of your family desiring to participate."

The late Corporal Frank M. Tubb was born and raised in Robert Lee. He was born March 26, 1923. He graduated from Robert Lee high school in 1940 and was active in school athletics. Frank attended junior college in San Angelo during the 1940-41 semesters and enlisted in the Air Corps in 1942. He took special training in radio while stationed at Scott Field, Ill.

He married Miss Dorothy Jacobs of Festus, Mo., on Christmas Day 1943, and was transferred overseas in October 1944. Frank was stationed with the 500th bombardment Group on North Luzon and was on his eleventh mission when he was killed March 15, 1945.

Following the tragedy the legal next of kin were informed that no bodies could be recovered. They were shocked but happy to have the preceding information forwarded to them recently by their daughter-in-law, who continues to reside at Festus, Mo.
