Edith Locality Gets 4-Inch Rain

Generous rains amounting to 4 inches and more in some sections fell in the central and southwestern parts of Coke county last Friday.

The Edith community which hadn't received a good rain all year got from 2 to 4 inches. J. T. Thetford said he measured over 4 inches at the Edith store. Rains continued on over the Divide with better than 2 inches at the Leddy Ranch and elsewhere in that section.

Heavy rains, estimated as much as 5 inches, fell west of Robert Lee in the vicinity of the Bryans, Russells and Marvin Simpson ranches. Frank Bryan said a small windstorm blew his tractor shed into the river and tore off part of the barn roof.

Robert Lee had about 3 inches. Good rains fell south of town but missed Sanco and Silver where moisture is badly needed.

Sun Starts Test West Of Edith

Sun Oil company this week began a wildcat test 4 miles west of Edith on land owned by P. W. and Chris Millican. Rotary equipment owned by Crudoil Drilling Co. was moved to the location by H & L Truck Co., after being released from No. 1 Central National Bank (Blanks Estate) across the river south of Silver. Crudoil also brought in the No. 1 John B. Walker discovery for Sun south of the river. Johnny Auton is the tool pusher in charge.

Location of the new test is 660 feet from the north and east lines of Section 230 Block 2, H&TC Ry Survey. It is in the middle of the east side of Sun's block of 8 sections in that locality. Section No. 231 adjoining on the east is also owned by the Millicans and is under lease to Plymouth. It is understood that Plymouth and Stanolind will share costs of the test. Will Millican's land lies to the south of Section 230.

The location was staked close to the site of a new residence recently completed by Ples Millican. It is a mile west of Pecan church and 2 miles west of Green Mountain school house.

Sun's No. 1 P. W. Millican is 6 miles south and 3 miles east of the J. B. Walker discovery in the south Jameson field at Silver.

The preliminary plans were accepted by the court and they expect to have final plans and call for contract for construction within the next two or three weeks.

Ruby L. Pettit New Red Cross Chairman

Mrs. Ruby L. Pettit, county treasurer, was elected chairman of the Coke County Red Cross chapter, at a meeting here Tuesday night. She succeeds H. A. Springer of Bronte who served seven years.

Another meeting is scheduled here next Thursday night, July 8, when other officers will be elected and committees appointed. Everyone interested in the Red Cross program is urged to attend. There will be special moving pictures.

At Tuesday night's meeting a report by Treasurer Douglas Sneed showed the local chapter has a cash balance on hand of \$1,380. During the past year Coke county exceeded its quota by raising \$931.73 during the annual fund drive, and of this amount \$496 went to the national headquarters. The sum of \$405 was spent in the county in aid to needy persons, principally for doctor and hospital attention.

Robert Lee Youths On Caribbean Cruise

Arlin D. Simpson, son of Mr. and Mrs. V. H. Simpson of Robert Lee, and Dale Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Brown, also of this city, have sailed from New Orleans on a Naval Reserve training cruise aboard the destroyer USS Lind, which will engage in maneuvers in the Caribbean. Both are seaman recruits in the U. S. Navy reserve.

More than 400 Reservists are taking their annual training cruise aboard modern destroyers of the four-ship squadron bound for Guantanamo Bay and Santiago, Cuba. The Reservists will be given gunnery drills, battle problems, and lectures to refresh their previous training and acquaint them with the latest developments in Naval equipment.

Planes, submarines and destroyers will practice under simulated war conditions during the two-weeks cruise.

Crewmen aboard the 2,200-ton Lind will see the harbor where the Spanish Admiral, Cervera, was trapped during the Spanish-American War. When the seagoing Don Quixote's force attempted to make a dash from the harbor it was annihilated by the intercepting U. S. Navy.

H. E. Ivey, Jr. was brought home Sunday from Shannon hospital and is well on road to recovery from complications following a recent appendectomy.

Sun Leases Sites For Gas Plant And Housing Units

Further progress toward Sun Oil Company's gas reconversion plant at Silver include leasing of sites both for the plant and a camp which will house the workers and their families.

A 40-acre tract for the gas plant has been leased from Fred Jameson and is in the center of the field. It is 1 1/2 miles south of Sun's main camp at Silver and lies between Fred Jameson wells Nos. 6, 3, 8 and 9.

W. I. Tubb last week leased 40 acres for the camp site and the location is about a half mile to the north and west of Silver school house. It is predicted 20 or more men will be employed in the employed in the plant which will process the wet gas now being flared and inject the remaining dry gas back into the ground.

Dewey Smith, superintendent of Sun operations in Coke county, says pipe for use in building the gathering lines will start arriving next week. R. E. Vickery, superintendent of Sun's gas field at Carthage, is here this week testing No. 10 Homer Jameson which will be one of the gas injection wells.

Sun's No. 3 J. B. Walker topped the reef this week at 5,908 feet, 170 feet higher than No. 1 J. B. Walker, the discovery producer south of the river. No. 3 is a north offset toward the river. Drilling is continuing in lime.

Fred Jameson No. 9 drilled to 2,651 feet and was fishing for junk basket and bit.

J. S. Walker No. 2 was still swabbing with very little oil show and some salt water.

No. 5 C. E. Mathers was drilling in shale at 2,103 feet.

No. 7 Mathers set 9 5/8 inch pipe to 670 feet and was waiting on cement.

No. 1 Tubb-Omega was drilling at 5,632 in shale and sand.

No. 1 Calla Cargile was drilling in shale at 3,080 feet.

No. 1 Elwood on Spade ranch in Mitchell county had reached 7,787 feet in dolomite and chert, with very little show.

No. 1 Emil Schattel, Sun's wildcat 7 miles southwest of Snyder, indicates good production. A drillstem test from 6,823-52 feet with tool open two hours, showed a good blow with gas to surface in 23 minutes. Recovery was 1,777 feet of clean oil and 60 feet of oil and gas-cut mud. Bottom hole pressure open was 500 to 750 pounds and 3,000 pounds closed.

Ends 13 Years As Postmaster

Mrs. Melrose Russell was checked out of the Robert Lee post office Wednesday, resigning a position she has held the past 13 years. She has made a splendid official.

Miss Myrtle Hurley took over as acting postmaster and will serve until a permanent appointment is made. Persons who desire to take the examination for postmaster here must have their applications on file by July 15.

Miss Hurley was postmaster for 9 years prior to Mrs. Russell's tenure, and then served 7 years as assistant. Mrs. J. S. Gardner will remain in the office as assistant clerk.

Fisher Reviews Work of Congress

The strong peace-with-security policy the Administration has been following got strong bi-partisan backing from the 80th Congress, reported Congressman O. C. Fisher, in a campaign speech in Robert Lee Saturday evening. The congressman is just back from a busy six months in Washington and will devote the next three weeks to his campaign for re-election.

While expressing hope our stepped-up preparedness program will deter the Russians and prove to be a positive force for peace, Fisher warned against complacency at a time when the Soviets are building up a tremendous military machine and have been gradually extending the iron curtain.

"We know from experience that strength is the only language the dictators understand," he added.

Congressman Fisher is making a series of reports to the people on the highlights of the recent session and expects to visit in each county in the district in the near future.

Representative Fisher listed some of the highlights of the session as follows:

1. The doom of the isolationists and appeasers was spelled out.
2. The Reciprocal Trade Act was extended.
3. More was done for expansion of rural electrification than has been done in a similar period in history. Soil conservation, so vital to our Nation's economy, received further encouragement.
4. Highway aid was continued for two additional years. About

one-third of this is earmarked for farm-to-market roads.

5. The agriculture program was extended for another year.

6. A number of bills were enacted to improve the rehabilitation program for war veterans, including an increase in subsistence allowances for students, an increase in the ceilings for on-the-job trainees, and an increase in benefits for widows and orphans of deceased veterans. The Courts Martial system was overhauled, designed to improve equal justice and assure fair trials.

7. A housing bill, giving veterans preference in the purchase of war housing units, resuming the insurance on home mortgage loans, and authorizing RFC to set up a secondary market for GI loan obligations, was enacted.

8. Government costs for the next year were cut by nearly \$2 billion under budget requests.

Representative Fisher expressed disappointment over the failure of the Senate to act on the Tidelands bill, the Mundt-Nixon bill to further curb Communism, and the measure to repeal Federal taxes on oleomargarine. All of these passed the house, he pointed out.

He opposed the so-called Civil Rights bills, and said they pertain to subjects the States, and not the Federal Government, should deal with.

Bronte Water Supply Is Low

BRONTE, July 1.—Limited use—and boiling—of Bronte water is strongly recommended to residents here.

Boiling of drinking water as a safety precaution was recommended by the State Department of Health.

The action was taken after four samples of water were examined at Austin. All four showed the presence of gas and two contained green bile and coliform organisms.

In a special called meeting this week the Bronte city council went on record with an urgent request that all residents curtail their use of water.
