Wildcat Staked On Fred McCabe Land

Southern Minerals Corp. has staked location for a southwestern Coke county wildcat to be drilled 7,500 feet if necessary to explore the Ellenburger.

The test will be No. 1 Fred McCabe, 1,980 from the south, 660 feet from the east line of section 25, block Z, D&SE Ry. Co survey, on the Divide 10 miles southwest of Robert Lee. It will be in the center of a 14,500 acre block acquired early in 1947. Operations are expected to start by Aug. 15.

Included in the block are large holdings of A. N. Counts and Fred McCabe, M. L. Leddy (former Ashurst ranch), also J. F. McCabe and Mrs. A. B. (Pearl) Sheppard. The location is a half mile north of the old Ashurst gin site, and 2 miles east and north of the old J. Q. McCabe ranch house.

No. 1 Lassiter Flowing

No. 1 Jack Lassiter, recent wildcat discovery 3 miles west of Sanco brought in by Allen Guiberson, flowed 206 barrels of oil in a 24-hour test Tuesday. The well had recently been worked over, but water has not been entirely shut off.

Longhorn Drilling Co. was rigging up to start No. 1 B. D. Gartman, west offset to No. 1 Lassiter. Longhorn had also moved in equipment to drill No. 2 Lassiter, a northeast diagonal offset to No. 1.

No. 1 Ralph Harris Estate, Al Hill's wildcat on the upper end of the Harris ranch, was waiting on orders Wednesday night. Sulphur water was encountered after penetrating the Ellenburger 12 feet to a depth of 7,120 feet. The hole was plugged back and pipe set to 5,900 feet. Little oil was recovered after perforating sand from 5,808-20 feet. In case the test is abandoned another location is expected to be staked closer to the river.

Seaboard and Southern Minerals No. 2 M. G. Reed, 11 miles southeast of Robert Lee, was drilling at 6,365 feet in lime after topping the Ellenburger at 6,207 feet.

Shamrock No. 2 Herman Wendland, 8 miles southeast of Robert Lee, had passed 5,650 feet in Strawn lime. No. 1 Wendland, Ellenburger discovery, was pumping 22 barrels of oil daily and a small amount of water.

No. 1 C. E. Rawlings, wildcat 1 mile west of Bronte, was swabbing after perforating the Palo Pinto at 4,348-75 feet.

War Hero Brought Home For Re-Burial

Funeral services for Jack Parker, Robert Lee's first war hero to be brought home for re-burial, were conducted Thursday afternoon at the Baptist church. All stores and offices closed at 2:30 for the funeral.

In charge of the rites were the pastor, the Rev. Fred Blake, assisted by the Rev. Ross Welch, Methodist minister. Burial followed in the family plot at Valley View cemetery five miles south of Robert Lee. Clift funeral home was in charge and the following cousins of the deceased served as pallbearers: Cleo and Basil Havins of San Angelo, Jack Cowley, Roy Casey, Turney Casey and Mike Casey of Robert Lee.

Jack was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Parker and was born in Robert Lee April 16, 1925. He grew up in this community and was one of five Parker brothers who served during World War II.

He joined the army Nov. 9, 1943, and went overseas the following May. He served as a private in an infantry machine gun unit and took part in the European invasion. On July 9, 1944, three days after the invasion started he was killed by enemy fire at Saint Lo, Normandy. Almost his entire company was wiped out in the assault.

Prior to being prepared for shipment home his remains had been buried in a U. S. military cemetery in France. Sgt. Alvin Allen of Ft. Sill, Okla., accompanied the casket to Robert Lee Wednesday, coming from Ft. Worth to Bronte by rail.

He is survived by his parents; five brothers, Steve and Fagan of Robert Lee, Jesse of Bronte, Dave of Fort Ord, Calif., and John of Pocatello, Idaho; and four sisters Mrs. Josephine Rose of San Angelo, Mrs. Nadine Webb of Bronte, Mrs. Bessie Bowman of Stamford, and Mrs. Frances Varnadore of Robert Lee.

All were expected for the funeral, but his brothers, Dave and John had not arrived Thursday morning.

Light Vote Cast In Primary Election

Last Saturday's Democratic primary passed off quietly in Coke county, with less than 1,400 votes cast. The only county contest was for judge in which Jeff Dean, former Bronte school superintendent, defeated Bob L. Davis, incumbent.

County officials re-nominated without opposition where Clerk Willis Smith, Sheriff Paul Good, Treasurer Ruby L. Pettit, Frank Dickey was nominated as county attorney in a clear field.

Some good scraps over commissioner jobs resulted in two runoffs. In Precinct No. 1, H. C. Varnadore, incumbent, ran 20 votes behind J. W. Service. In the Bronte precinct (No. 2) Leroy Scott was high man and will run against Otis Smith, incumbent, at the Aug. 28 runoff.

T. R. Harmon was re-nominated in Precinct 3 over Ralph Garvin and Claude Dittmore is the new nominee in Precinct 4, defeating J. P. Arrott. Ben Brooks, incumbent, was not a candidate.

Coke County favored Stevenson over Johnson in the U. S. Senator race, by unofficial count 523 to 435. Cong. O. C. Fisher received a strong endorsement with 738 votes, compared with 196 for South and 200 for Cobb.

County returns are incomplete until the official canvass is made here Saturday afternoon. A county convention will also be held at the court house in Robert Lee at 2 p. m. Saturday to name delegates to the state convention.

A total of 499 votes were cast in the Robert Lee box, with 420 persons voting at Bronte.

The bride attended schools in Winters and Robert Lee and Mr. Millican attended Robert Lee school. During the recent war he served in the Army, stationed in Europe 28 months.

2 New Producers Completed By Sun In Jameson Field

Sun Oil company the past week completed two more producers in its steadily growing Jameson field at Silver.

No. 1 Tubb Omega flowed 158.7 barrels of 48.7 gravity oil in its 24-hour test through quarter inch choke. Gas-oil ratio was 1,475-1. The well was completed naturally in open hole from 6,447 to 6,498 feet. Location is a half mile north of Sun's A-1 Tubb, and is three-fourths of a mile northwest of the Silver school house.

No. 3 John B. Walker, south of the Colorado River, flowed 440.4 barrels of 49.0 gravity oil in its 24-hour test through quarter inch choke. Gas-oil ratio was 1,490-1. Total depth was 6,388 feet with casing set to bottom of pay section. Pipe was perforated from 6,104 to 6,314 feet with 560 shots. Location is a north offset to No. 1 J. B. Walker, high producing wildcat discovery brought in a few months ago.

Baker-Taylor's rotary equipment was moved from No. 3 J. B. Walker, to No. 2 J. B. Walker, an east offset to the discovery. It was drilling Wednesday morning at 2,200 feet.

After completing No. 1 Tubb-Omega, Ray-Harris moved its rotary rig to No. 4 Wille I. Tubb, a west offset to Tubb No. 2. No. 4 spudded in at 9 p. m. July 25 and set 9 5/8 inch pipe to a depth of 638 feet.

No. 9 Fred Jameson was coring at 6,340 feet in lime. A good oil showing was recovered between 6,100 and 6,200 feet.

No. 5 C. E. Mathers was coring from 6,132-53 feet. No. 7 Mathers was drilling in shale at 5,295 feet.

No. 1 P. W. Millican, Sun's wildcat three miles west of Edith, was drilling early Wednesday at 5,197 feet in sandy shale.

Sun's No. 1 Calla Mae Cargile, in the Arledge field north of Sanco, ran a Schlumberger survey from 788 to 6,200 feet Tuesday and operators will start coring at 6,260 feet.
