Bids on Hospital Much Too High; To Revise Plans

When the lowest bid was more than 50 per cent above the estimated cost of the new Coke county hospital building, all bids were rejected by the county commissioners court here Monday.

Several months ago at a special election voters approved the issuance of \$50,000 in time warrants to build and equip a county hospital. Of this sum, \$42,000 had been set aside for the building, leaving \$8,000 for equipment.

Bids were asked on construction of the building, including the plumbing, heating and electrical wiring. Architect on the project is T. Roy Ainsworth of San Angelo.

Three bids were submitted to the court, as follows:

Templeton-Cannon, \$74,000.

Joe B. Tharp, \$70,340

Warner Constr. Co., \$65,408.

Some of the county officials are inclined to believe the contractors are asking too much, but The Observer's opinion is that the building was planned on too large and too elaborate a scale.

Present status of the situation is something like this: County Judge Davis met with the architect and a Warner representative this week, when possible cuts in the proposed building were discussed.

The commissioners will be back in session Saturday morning to see what has been done. There is no chance to get the contract down to \$42,000 unless an entirely new building is planned. Since building costs have gone up rapidly the past year, the county officials may vote to let a contract in excess of the allotment.

A site for the hospital was donated by Jack Walker and other donations have been received to fully equip each of the eight rooms. Hospital and medical service is badly needed, more so now since so many men are engaged in dangerous work in the oil fields. The hospital should be speeded up and every county officer should realize the seriousness of the situation.

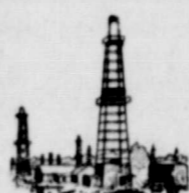

Interest will center during the next week on the two tests which are only a few hundred feet from pay in the Jack Lassiter field west and north of Sanco. No. 2 Lassiter was drilling Thursday morning at 6,146 feet, while the B. D. Gartman test had reached 5,951 feet. The Marble Falls section which is producing in the Lassiter discovery, was topped at 6,495 feet.

J. Jameson has leased his 1,509 acre ranch to J. E. Dickinson at a bonus of \$15 per acre. The property joins the Sun block near Silver on the northeast and lies in the southwest corner of Nolan county. It is understood the lease will be taken over by Sun Oil Co.

Bob Hickman has a letter from Humble stating they plan to start drilling on his property within the next 30 days. Hickman gets an offset from the C. E. Rawlings discovery brought in a mile west of Bronte. Jess Percifull will also get an offset on his property to the north of Rawlings.

No. 1 Fred McCabe, Southern Minerals wildcat 10 miles southwest of Robert Lee, was drilling yesterday below 1,200 feet.

Seaboard and Southern Minerals No. 3 M. G. Reed, 11 miles southeast of Robert Lee was drilling below 2,800 feet in shale.

Sun's No. 4 Tubb Produces 188 Bbls. In 24-Hour Test

Sun Oil company's No. 4 W. I. Tubb flowed 188 barrels of high gravity oil during a 24-hour official test. The gas-oil ratio was below 1,500-1. No. 4 Tubb is located at the south end of the Tubb ranch south and west of Silver.

No. 8 Fred Jameson set 5 1-2 inch casing to 6,132 feet and will core to bottom of about 6,400 feet. Operators reported a depth of 6,269 feet Thursday morning in lime. Location is a half mile south of No. 1 Allen Jameson, discovery well in Sun's Jameson field at Silver.

No. 8 Mathers set casing to 6,065 feet and was coring ahead at 6,140 feet in lime. Both the No. 8 Mathers and No. 8 Fred Jameson have good oil showings.

No. 2 J. B. Walker, south of the river, will explore the Ellenburger and was drilling Thursday at 6,869 feet in lime. No oil shows were recovered in the Strawn or Marble Falls sections.

No. 13 Homer Jameson was drilling at 3,064 feet in shale and lime.

No. 1 Beatrice Anderson was drilling in shale at 2,230 feet. This is the first test on Anderson property. Location is north of the Silver school house.

No. 1 P. W. Millican, Sun's wildcat 3 miles west of Edith, had reached a depth of 5,710 feet. Contractors were still having trouble getting back to bottom of hole because of heaving shale.

No. 1 Mamie Haney, wildcat near Maryneal, was drilling in lime at 3,662 feet.

No. 2 Ellwood, Sun's second test on the Spade ranch in Mitchell county, was drilling at 7,715 feet. A drillstem test Thursday morning recovered 25 feet of mud and no oil.

Editorial

The Hospital Situation

Another serious delay in the construction of a county hospital occurred this week when bids were found to be away above the amount authorized for the project.

Why an architect should be so far out of line in his estimates, we cannot understand. Everyone knows that building costs are high, but they haven't gone up more than 50 per cent during the last six weeks.

The commissioners court advertised that they had \$42,000 to spend for the proposed hospital, and they employed an architect to draw plans and prepare specifications for a building of that nature. Surely he should have known somewhere near what the contractors would ask.

An effort will be made to cut out some unnecessary features and permit a contractor to submit a lower bid. In case a contract can be let at somewhere near the original figure, we believe the commissioners would be justified in going ahead.

If this is not possible the architect should be compelled to draw up new plans to fit the available \$42,000. If he can't do the job, then hire someone who can.

Coke county is badly in need of more medical and hospital facilities, and a majority of the people voted for the hospital appropriation. The most recent delay is uncalled for and the more it drags along the longer the community suffers.

Of course we cannot expect to get as good a building for \$42,000 as we would for \$65,000. However, the county hospital plan is on trial and we can afford to start with a modest structure. The Observer believes the hospital will prove itself so valuable that within a couple of years, additional funds will be voted for more space if it is needed. If it don't work out, then \$42,000 is enough to spend.

School Outlook Is Good

Patrons of the Robert Lee school district have reason to believe they will have a better school this year. Buildings have been improved and some changes in the teaching staff have been made. The new superintendent has been working hard since he came into the community early in the summer, and he is getting sound backing from the board of education. Supt. Goodwin has many years of experience behind him and he's got the earmarks of a progressive school administrator.

Taxes have been raised so that there will be sufficient funds to provide adequate buildings and pay good salaries. About the only other thing needed now is more community interest. It's up to the people of this district to say what kind of a school they want.

The organization which is set up to bring the public into closer contact with the schools is the Parents-Teachers Association. A handful of

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good women have been carrying on the best they could. The PTA should have several hundred members, and there should be community-wide gatherings more often.

The Observer would like to suggest the following objectives which might be worth while projects for this year's PTA:

1. More attention to safety, to include traffic signs and possibly patrols on the highway between the school grounds and town.

2. Appoint a committee to contact city and county authorities about improving the streets leading to the school.

3. Ask city officials for street lights to the school house.

4. Try and promote a little more music in Robert Lee schools. No reason why pupils shouldn't learn to read notes and sing. No special teacher necessary for this.

5. Of course we would like to see financial reports published regularly so the people would know where their money goes. This applies to the school and all other taxing districts. Don't you think the public is entitled to that information?

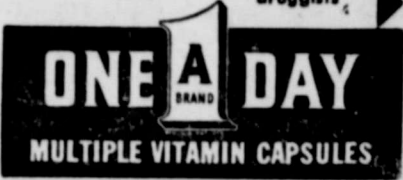

Frankie Percifull returned the opening kickoff 10 yards to his 37. In the first play from scrimmage he gained 3 yds., then went to the 49 yd. line for a first down. The Steers failed to make much yardage in the next series of plays, and Royce Smith punted out of bounds on Baird's 21 yd. line.

Yarbrough cracked the line for 5 yds. and Mayers made it first down on the 31. Mayes picked up 2 yds., Clark gained 5 on a sneak and Yarbrough plowed to the 43 for another first down. Bobby Hood stopped Clark and Yarbrough made 5 around end. A pass failed and Baird punted to the Steer 41 yard line.

Percifull made a yard thru the middle and Havins picked up 9 more for a 1st down on the Baird 48. On the next play a 5-yd. off-side penalty was assessed against

Robert Lee. Percifull made 6 yds. and Havins added 3 more. Percifull went to the visitors 37 for a 1st down. Havins gained 6 and Smith picked up 2 yards as the first quarter ended.

2nd Quarter

Havins rammed the line for 2 yards and Percifull went for a 1st down on the 26. Frankie gained 4 and Havins on a reverse traveled to the 10 yard stripe for a first down. Percifull went off left tackle for a touchdown. A line play for the extra point failed. Score: Robert Lee 6, Baird 0.

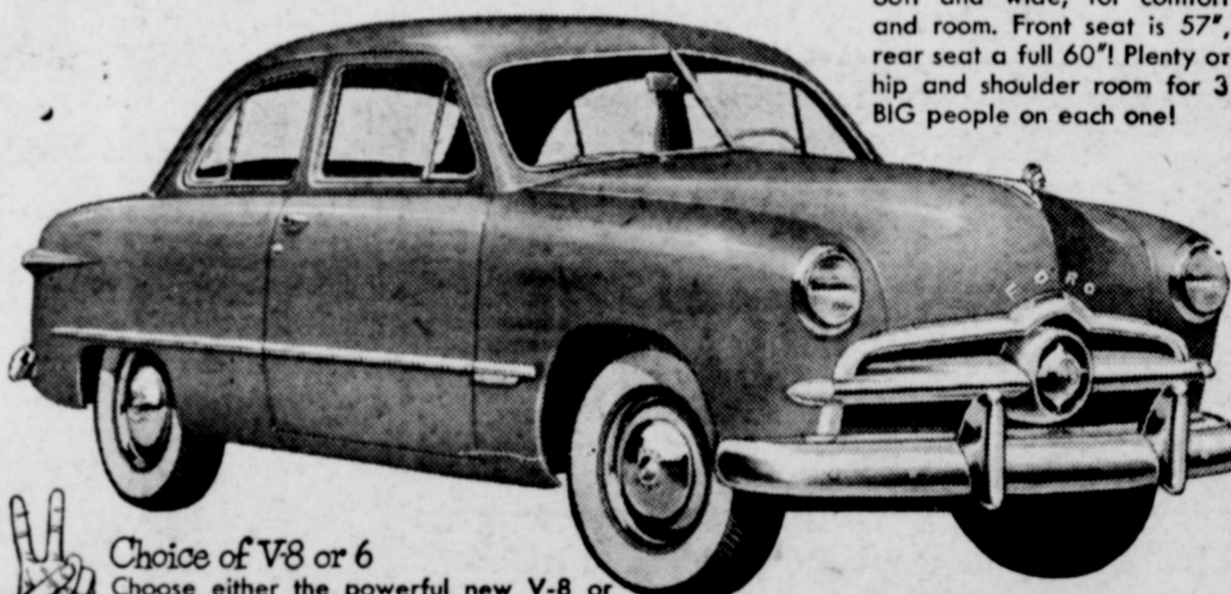

Livestock and Meat Prices

Livestock is marketed when it is ready. The supply of animals coming to market at any one time is controlled by your decisions as producers. These decisions may have been made months previously, depending on your breeding and feeding program. The weather—blizzards, storms and droughts—also have a bearing on when you market your animals.

Meat packers have no control over the supply of livestock.

The meat packer must sell meat and by-products for what they will bring. When people have to economize, they spend less money for meat. Consumers, retailers and meat packers reduce their bids. The prices of both meat and livestock fall accordingly. But when people make more money, they are eager to buy meat. Then buyers all along the line increase their bids. In my work with farmers and ranchers I have visited just about every part of this country. I can't begin to count the number of times I have traveled out of Chicago and back—to the range country of the West . . . through the Corn Belt states . . . the wheatlands . . . the cotton country—Florida, Maine, Washington, California and all the other states in between.

I do not know how anyone who travels much can help being impressed with the need for team play in America. As farmers or ranchers, your prosperity depends to a large degree on the ability of workers in industry to purchase the food and fiber you produce. Likewise, city businessmen know that your power to purchase their products is equally important to them. And all of us depend on the men in the mines, in the forests, in the steel mills, and oil fields.

New Idea in Junior Feeding Projects

Boys and girls are trying out a new kind of livestock feeding project. In several states—including Montana, Nebraska, Colorado and Indiana—people are enthusiastic about it. Here is how it works. The boy or girl buys an average lot of feeder steers or lambs, from a uniform herd or band. The number bought is usually 3 or more steers, 15 or more lambs. That depends on finances, feed supplies and equipment available.

These lots of animals are bought at a central market. They are taken home and fattened. Careful records are kept of feed costs and rates of gain. At the end of the feeding period, they are shipped back to market. They are sold on Junior Marketing Day.

Boys and girls consign their animals to commission firms of their own choice. Upon arrival the animals are penned separately, according to ownership. Each lot is graded and weighed separately. Then all animals are assembled in pens according to grade. They are sold for slaughter in the usual manner used on that market. The boys and girls profit according to the market value of their animals.

Sponsors claim the following benefits: (1) It is practical. (2) It promotes better farm feeding methods. (3) Boys and girls learn about market grades of livestock. (4) They learn about central markets and their operation. This new idea in junior feeding is not intended to take the place of feeding for show. It is a separate project, to give youngsters practical experience in feeding for market.
