LOCAL FARMER KILLED IN FIELD BY LIGHTENING

Mr. Alphonse A. (Shorty) Hieman, farmer of the Nazareth community, was killed presumably instantly, Tuesday morning at about 7:30 o'clock while he was plowing on his farm midway between Dimmitt and Nazareth. The riderless tractor dragging a harrow attracted the attention of a neighbor, Mr. Schmucker, who rushed to the field and stopped the tractor and after a brief search found the dead man a considerable distance from the tractor. Although indications were that the harrow dragged Mr. Hieman a short distance after he was knocked from the tractor, resulting in some injuries, it is believed that burns and shock from the lightning killed him instantly. Mr. Hieman with his family had planned a trip to Nebraska for a visit with relatives and he was rushing to finish his farm work so they could leave the following day.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Holy Family Church in Nazareth Thursday at 9:30 A. M. Mr. Hieman was married to Miss Isabel Ball in May, 1930, and five children were born to the union, all of whom survive. They are: Ida Mae, Joanne, Julieen, Dennis and Iona. He is also survived by his father, Mr. John Hieman of Nazareth; three brothers, Florence Hieman of Amarillo, Bill Hieman of San Diego, Calif., Father Harold Hieman OSB, of Houston, Texas, and three sisters, Mrs. Frank Hochling and Mrs. Ahdy Schmucker of Nazareth and Sister Jean O. S. B. of Fort Smith, Arkansas.

Health Measures For School Children Given

School days will soon be here again. Thousands of Texas boys and girls and teachers will be returning to the schools. Each child entering school should be as free as possible of any physical defects which can be corrected. The earlier these are corrected the better chance the child has for good social and emotional development, says Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

August is the time for a complete medical and dental check-up. Eyes, ears, nose, throat and teeth should be carefully examined by the family doctor and dentist, and all remediable defects corrected. If such defects are neglected, they may result in serious damage to growth and development.

Dental correction often take time but a person is repaid many times over for good dental care. Healthy teeth lend attractiveness to the personal appearance, enable thorough chewing of food, and promote general good health.

In schoolrooms, children expose each other to many communicable diseases, especially the common cold and diseases such as measles, scarlet fever, whooping cough, and diphtheria. Protect the child from diphtheria and whooping cough, as well as smallpox, by safe and dependable immunization.

Parents, see that your child has complete treatment against preventable diseases; a clean healthy throat and mouth; the best possible vision and hearing; adequate diet, sleep and rest to build up resistance against disease. It will pay good dividends, and your child will be Ready For School.

Bids Wanted For Government Concessions

Washington News Letter

(By Congressman Eugene Worley)

The following is a continuation of the Report made by the House of Representatives Agriculture Subcommittee regarding the Foot and Mouth Disease in Mexico:

Observations and Conclusions
By the time the committee got out on its inspection tour it had, by reason of its conference at Amarillo and Kingsville, Texas, and in Mexico City, a fairly accurate idea of what to look for in the field. Since the factual data observed were so extensive and varied, it seems to the committee that its observations can best be reported in the form of conclusions or opinions arrived at by the individual members as they saw what was actually being done and tried to fit what they saw into the pattern of the job ahead.

For purposes of clarity in reporting, the conclusions or opinions reached by members of the committee have been arbitrarily divided into those that are affirmative or encouraging, and those that may be regarded as negative or indicative of difficulties to be overcome.

Affirmative Observations
1. Cooperation—The committee was impressed with the high degree of cooperation between the Mexican and American officials engaged in this fight against "aftosa", as the Mexicans call foot-and-mouth disease. Operations appeared to be conducted throughout on a most congenial and cooperative basis.

2. Morale—The morale of those engaged in the field operations appeared to be very high—even in the face of what seemed to the committee to be some very formidable difficulties.

3. Support—The Mexican Government appears to be giving the campaign its complete support. The committee believes that the American people should recognize and understand the high degree of courage it takes for the Mexican Government to support this program. For centuries the ox has been, and remains today, almost the universal draft animal in Mexico. A farmer's oxen are almost as dear to him as members of his family. They are, in addition, his only means of support. It takes political courage of high degree to tell farmers, most of them too little educated to understand the broad implications of the situation, that their oxen must be slaughtered and buried in this campaign, even though they may have no sign of disease. It must be remembered, too, that in Mexico, as in the United States, there is always an opposition party, ready to make political capital out of any mistakes of the administration—and that as regards the aftosa campaign this party has not been silent.

In spite of these considerations, the committee believes that the Mexican Government is sincerely and effectively behind the campaign to eradicate aftosa and that the commission will continue to have its fullest support.

4. Acceptance—Since the first of the year, the Mexican Government has been waging a strong campaign of education, at first the eradication program was opposed by the greater majority of farmers. At the present time, it was estimated by the minister of Agriculture, at least 90 percent of the rural population has been won over to support this program.

This trend has been accelerated as mules, harness, and plows are being made available to farmers as replacements for their oxen. There was considerable indication that Mexican farmers are already "sold" on the advantages of mules over oxen as draft animals and that there is a growing willingness on their part, if not an actual desire, to exchange their plodding oxen for the more agile mules.

5. Quarantine—The committee did not see the major military quarantine line that has been thrown across the country from Tampico, on the Gulf, westward and southward to the State of Colima on the Pacific coast. It was informed, however, by numerous observers, including ranchers from northern Mexico, that this quarantine line is "pretty effective." The committee was favorably impressed with the many quarantine lines

which it found within the infected zone.

As soon as an outbreak is reported, a quarantine enforced by the Mexican Army is placed around the infected herd or area. This quarantine is as small as possible to contain the actual exposed and infected cattle.

Where there are several outbreaks in an area, or where the whole area within the infected zone is regarded as infected, a quarantine is placed around such area in an effort to prevent the spread into uninfected areas within the large infected zone.

Whenever a road crosses a quarantine line there is a disinfection station, where any person or vehicles passing through the infected areas are disinfected. Vehicles are driven through tanks in which disinfecting liquid covers the tires. The occupants walk through troughs in which the liquid is held in saturated sawdust. Trucks passing through quarantine lines are sprayed inside and out.

On its 850 mile auto trip, the committee estimated that it passed through about 75 such road blocks and disinfection stations. The quarantine is entirely the responsibility of the Mexican Army and it was reported that more than 15,000 soldiers are being used for this purpose. The committee was, on the whole, favorably impressed with the quarantine and disinfection precautions.
