# **Bronte Oil Play Brings Fabulous** Money for Leases

New interest in Bronte's spectacular oil play occurred this week when a third producer was indicated. American Republics No. 1 Jess Percifull, quarter mile north offset to the Rawlings discovery a mile west of Bronte, recovered 1,400 feet of oil Monday on a drillstem test from 4,365 to 4,420 feet Casing has been set to a depth of 4,379 feet with 300 sacks

Humble's No. 2 Bob Hickman, east offset to the heavy producing No. 1 Hickman, cemented surface pipe at a depth of 2,500 feet.

Intense activity in leasing and royalty sales have taken place at Bronte since the big Hickman well came in. Greatest interest seems to center around leasing of lots in the town of Bronie, where the city limits are less than a mile from No. 2 Hickman.

Taylor Emerson, leading Bronte realcor who is in the thick of the oil play, has secured the services of his nephew, Dowling Emerson of San Angelo, to help with the extra work.

Word went around this week that M & M Production Co. (Mc-Garr Bros of Midland) planned to drill a well on the Barney Modgling property west of the Bronce school house.





# 2nd Oil Well Near Edith Flows 339 Barrels in 21 Hrs.

Sun Oil company's No. 1 C. C. Millican, second well in the new field 3 miles west of Edith, flowed naturally 339 barrels of high gravity oil in a 21 hour test completed Thursday morning. Gauge was through quarter inch choke, with tubing pressure reported at 725 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 925-1.

The reef was topped at 5,800 feet, 102 higher than the P. W. Millican pool discovery. Hole is bottomed at 5,930 feet Production is from the Strawn section of the Pennsylvanian.

Operators expect to finish the well Friday and it is indicated Crudoil's rotary rig will be moved to No. 2 C. C. Millican, an offset to the west.

Location is 1,645 feet northwest of Sun No. 1 P. W. Millican, which flowed 575 barrels during its official 24-hour test.

# WITCH HUNT:

# Pumpkin, Too

Like a delayed Halloween episode, with macabre rather than humorous undertones, was the revival of the spy hunt in Washington. All the ingredients were there-the cornfield, the pumpkin, and the specter of Stalin hovering over the unsavory whole.

But there was nothing funny in the situation to the house un-American activities committee or to a federal grand jury seeking to rush indictments against suspected traitors and espionage agents.

THE PROBE committee declared it had "definite proof of one of the most extensive espionage rings in the history of the United States." Bolstering this assertion was discovery of microfilm documents, termed by the committee of "tremendous importance," which had been removed from the state department for transmission to Russian agents.

The microfilm was revealed by Whitaker Chambers, a senior editor of Time magazine, who admitted its possession and declared Alger Hiss, president of the Carnegie Foundation for International Peace, had given it to him for transmission to Russia. Hiss promptly denied the charge.
PLACED ON the witness stand,

Chambers said he had not had possession of the film during the years after 1937, until recently, and declined to name the persons in whose hands the film rested before being turned up in a pumpkin on Chambers' farm.

Meanwhile, Summer Welles, former undersecretary of state, studied the microfilm documents, evaluated their contents, but declined to divulge their importance.

Chambers, an admitted member of a Communist spy ring which operated here a decade ago, was slated for further witness stand appearances, as was Hiss, who main-tains he was never a Russian agent.

# HIGHER TAXES:

# Some Frightened

Some business men and indu trialists, who feared a Truman vicanew as they read a statement by one of the leading proponents of plea to impose a modified form of the wartime excess profits tax.

THE SPEAKER was Wyoming's Senator O'Mahoney, Democrat, who cited the 1929 financial crash as an argument for boosting taxes on business profits.

The senator declared that "if corporate profits of 1929 had been adequately taxed, this government would have been in a much better fiscal position to meet the depression.

He pointed out that corporate earnings now are piling up at the same rate as in 1929, although the companies are bigger. So earnings are greater than ever before.

HOWEVER, industrialists, leaders of the big labor unions, accountants and economists have been requested to give their view on what, if anything, congress should do about profits, estimated at a record 20 billion dollars this year.

O'Mahoney proposed that "little business," or small, independent corporations be given special exemptions under any excess profits tax plan.

# GOLDEN FLEECE:



The "golden fleece," subject of one of mythology's most romantic, colorful stories, crashed the world press by proxy as a result of a row over custody of its namesake.

The fleece, symbol of one of the world's most exclusive orders of nobility-not even the king of England is a knight-may be "kidnaped" by the city of Dijon.

THE GOLDEN fleece-of which small replicas were awarded the knights-was kept in Dijon, France, after the order was founded by Philip the Good, Duke of Burgundy, in 1429, for several generations until Mary of Burgundy took it with her to Austria when she married Maximilian the Fair.

The fleece remained in Vienna until the French army recaptured the city during the last war and returned the fleece to Dijon. Now, Austria is asking for it back. But the good Burgundians of Dijon have petitioned the city council to urge the French government to refuse the Austrian bid and to retain the fleece in Dijon.



Three years after the war most veterans, by and large, are firmly established in civilian employment, according to statistics compiled by the Research Council for Economic Security, Chicago. Eighty-nine of the estimated 14.9 million living veterans of World War II were employed as of last September. Of these, about 900,000 were on farms and another 900,-000 in school. About 450,000 were unemployed, while an additional 300,000 were "resting" or unable to work.

### **DEAD END:** Reds Block Way

The struggle for a Berlin peace dragged wearily on, extended by Russian establishment of a Communist "government" in the Reich

Demanding elections be held on "city-wide basis," the United States, Britain and France told the Soviet union that there could be no solution to the Berlin impasse until the Russians disown the newlyinstalled Berlin government. The terms were clearly expressed in a note accompanying a list of Soviet violations of the Berlin constitution that the three powers had submitted for guidance.

ALTHOUGH FORMALLY addressed to a United Nations comtory might result in a new "sock- mittee, the note obviously was the-rich" tax program, shivered meant as a strongly worded warning to Moscow. It indicated that if what it termed the "illegal body" President Truman's twice-rejected in the Soviet sector were not disbanded, the western powers would take a series of measures required by the fact, in their opinion, that the "legal, unified administration" of Berlin had ceased to exist.

The western powers placed no time limit for the Soviet union to make a decision on whether to continue collaboration. However, the tone of the note, as informed sources stressed, indicated that unless the normal administrative conditions were reestablished "pretty soon," a new policy would be adopted.

FROM BEGINNING to end the note gave what the western powers regard as detailed proof that the Soviets have pursued in Berlin a policy of systematic violation of all quadripartite agreements.

# POTATOES:

# No More Doubt

There was no longer any doubt. Farmers, at last, had a full-blown portrait of the American housewife's ideal potato. The U.S. department of agriculture even suggested that farmers tack it up in the barn for quick reference.

The department found, after a survey among 3,300 housewives, that farmers and shippers would see to it that potatoes prepared for market are:

CLEAN, of medium size, marked by few "eyes," light in color, undamaged-and of such quality that they will cook up soft, mealy and evenly throughout, without falling apart.

Housewives like medium sized potatoes because they rate them easiest to peel and handle, and best for judging individual portions-the all-purpose potato, they say.

The survey showed more than a fourth of the householders disturbed by "mechanical and handling injuries" to potatoes. Said the department:

"IT IS PRETTY good evidence that too many potatoes are being dug and handled with improper machinery and tools, and that the potatoes are not properly culled before being sent to market."

Immediate question to arise: Will potato growers and shippers do anything about it?

# ROBOT EAR:

### New Magic

Alexander Graham Bell would have approved. Science had moved to make his telephone even more serviceable. Tom Edison also would have nodded in approbation, for these same scientists had tied to-gether two great contributions to living to make their convenience even more marked, more appre-

A NEW robot ear that hears the phone ring and turns on the light was shown to doctors at the American Medical association meeting in St. Louis.

The ear could be used when no one is at home to turn on the light outside the front door. When the householder got ready to go home, he could call his house and the ear would turn on the light. No one need answer the phone.

THE ROBOT is a box on which the telephone sets. When the phone rings, the noise of the bell vibrates a salt crystal in the box. The vibration makes electricity flow in the salt, and the current is amplified to turn on the light switch. The box and phone are set in the circuit with the light to be turned on. In this way, the ear could be used to light any lamp in the house, or outside.

The device comes from wartime submarine and surface ship detection by sound. Nothing but the vibration of a phone bell affects this

Besides doctors, FBI men have been getting these ears because they are on call 24 hours a day. Undertakers are getting them because more people seem to die at

# In the Bag

THE BAG was a complete rainmaking outfit he had acquired from an Indian whose grandfather was a medicine man.

The bag and its potentialities came to light when Kern county, in the southern part of California's central valley, had its first rainfall in eight months not long ago. Fenenga was right there in the middle of the downpour. And, when he returned to Berkeley, the rain came down there in torrents.

NATURALLY, speculation arose concerning the properties of the rain-making bag, for, when the outfit, including the tail of a beaver, a bag of snapdragon seeds, a bag of eagle down, a fossil fish vertebra and various charm stones and pebbles, was brought out of storage, the rain started.

Fenenga had the bag with him when he entered Berkeley in a storm. It is now in possession of the university.

one committee post. The northern Democrats will argue that if Rankin accepts the veterans' affairs committee chairmanship, he should be restricted to





### **Farm Price Supports**

THE WEEK of July 16 last, your Home Town Reporter branded farm legislation, and specifically the long-range farm bill passed by the 80th congress, a "delusion and a snare." We further predicted — "what will happen, though, is that a new bill will be written before that time (January 1, 1950)."

The week of September 16 last, your Home Town Reporter predicted that the Democratic party would regain control of the United States senate with "eastern industry and big business locked in a battle for this control with the agricultural South and the mineral-reclamation minded West." In that column we even published a list of Democratic senators who would be named chairmen of the senate committees.

Again in the week of September 30 your Home Town Reporter predicted that the action of the 80th congress in taking away from the Commodity Credit Corporation power to lease or buy storage facilities for the farmers' grain "would blow up in someone's face and become a political issue."

The point of these "I told you so's" is that (1) they all came true and (2) at this moment a battle of major proportions is shaping up in the next congress to discard the flexible price support program of the Aiken-Hope long-range farm bill in favor of a rigid 90 per cent ratio under a revised parity figure.

Even Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannon who has supported the flexible of sliding scale price support program now is questioning the advisability of lowering supports unless industrial prices also come down.

There is no question but that the cost of farm price supports may become an issue in the new congress, with representatives from large city constituents questioning the policy as a bolster to high food prices. At the end of October the government had put 652 million dollars in crop loans outstanding with the prospect of making loans involving millions more before the end of this crop year. While much or all of this money may eventually be recovered, the opponents of price supports regard it as a government expenditure.

Despite that fact, this reporter believes there is an increasing sentiment for the rigid price support among the farmers and even among the large farm organizations, all of which supported the flexible provisions of the Aiken bill, and that eventually a new rigid price support program will be adopted.

# **Reclamation Program**

Krug has set up a new long-range program of reclamation for the western states which, in the hands of a friendly congress, seems likely of enactment.

This program, extending through 1954, contemplates expenditure of almost four billion dollars which would reclaim and irrigate thousands more acres, bring 100,000 new settlers into these western states and add approximately three billion dollars to crop values grown over the period. It would generate additional hydroelectric power to bring in annual revenue of \$64,000,

Among the first things the new congress may do is to kill that portion of the interior department appropriation laws which fired Reclamation Commissioner Michael W. Strauss.

# God's V-Day

Lesson for December 26, 1948

EVERYBODY loves a fight, they say. But the underdog does not love it, and nobody loves one that goes on and on and seems to have no end. The long-



mankind wages against everything that is out to destroy him. It is the war between man at his best and man at his worst, between the angel and the devil in man himself. We

seem to be the underdogs-and how tired we grow of it!

God's Fight

THE Bible shows us that this fight is not one in which we human begins are left to defend ourselves alone. We have an enemy, Satan; and we have an ally, God. Whenever a man lines up against anything that is wrong, hateful, deceitful, destructive, and on the side of what is creative, just, brotherly and true, he finds that this is not a private fight, it is not even the struggle of mankind alone. It is a cosmic conflict.

God's universe is not a neat garden in which only flowers grow; he has to work cutting down the weeds. His universe is not a realm at peace, with no need even for police; treason is abroad, rebellion breaks out here and there.

The Greeks used to think that the gods never went to any trouble, they ruled without effort. But the Christian Bible tells of a God who does have troubles, who meets opposition and fights against it.

**Bright Books for Dark Times** 

Two books in our Bible bring this out in a startling way: Daniel and Revelation. We have been thinking through three months now about various kinds of literature in the Bible. The kind represented by these two books is called "Apocalyptic." Scholars have discovered a number of similar books, but these two are in-comparably the greatest and were the only two to be admitted to the Bible.

Daniel, long before the time of Christ, and Revelation, two generations later than Christ, came as lights in a very dark world. The first of these books circulated when the Jews were hard pressed by Syrian persecutors, and when the other came out, the Christians were about to be crushed out of ex-

Observing what went on in those days, you might have thought the Jews, or the Christians as the case might be, had no prospects of surviving.

DANIEL and Revelation are both hard to understand, and for the same reason. Their messages are framed not always in plain language but in symbols. Hidden meanings abound.

All sorts of weird creatures and events move through these mysterious pages, and they often probably refer to persons or events known to the writers and the first readers: beasts with iron teeth and horns with eyes; a flaming throne set on a river of fire; golden vials filled with the wrath of God; a red dragon sweeping the stars down with its tail.

God's Victory

WE NEED not be distressed now at not being able to unlock all the code in which these extraordinary books are written. We can read them for their sheer beauty and force of imagination, for one thing, and we cannot miss their main truth. The bright picture of the New Jerusalem in Rev. 21, 22 is one of the loveliest and most comforting passages in the entire



# Welcome New Year With Luxury Spread Or Simple Buffets

IF YOU'RE planning a gay New Year's Eve party, then be prepared for the call for refreshments at about the stroke of midnight when the revelers start feeling hunger

pangs. However, if you're the hostess and want to enjoy your own party, plan foods that you can whip out to the table in a minimum of time. In other words, do the cooking to completion before the party begins.

A big crowd is best handled with a buffet supper, with all the preparation done ahead of time. If properly planned, you can get the food on the table in a quarter of an hour. A small party can have a cozy waffle supper, and the menu can be very simple but still satisfying.

Buffet Supper Sliced Roast Turkey Ham or Roast Beef Hawaiian Cranberry Relish \*Dark Nut Bread \*Molded Cider Salad \*Peppermint Stick Cake Popcorn Salted Nuts Beverage

BAKE THE TURKEY, roast beef or ham during the day; or, use slices from the meat you've had for dinner. This may be served cold. If you don't have enough meat, have sliced assorted cheese on the platter. All the other items can be made beforehand.

\*Hawaiian Cranberry Relish (Makes 1 quart)

4 cups fresh cranberries 2 cups sugar 1 cup canned pineapple

Put cranberries and pineapple through food chopper. Add sugar and mix well. Chill before serving. This relish will keep well for several weeks if refrigerated.

\*Dark Nut Bread (Makes 1 loaf)

2 eggs, well beaten 1 cup sugar

- 14 cup melted shortening
- 3/3 cup light molasses 1 cup sour milk
- 11/2 cups white flour
- teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon soda
- 11/2 cups wheat or graham flour
- 1 cup seedless raisins 11/2 cups broken nut meats

Beat eggs and sugar until thick. Add shortening and molasses. Add sour milk. Add white flour sifted with soda and salt, then wheat flour. Fold in raisins and nuts. Bake in wax paper-lined pan in a moderate oven (350-degree) for about an hour.

\*Molded Cider Salad (Serves 10)

package orange-flavored gelatin 1 cup boiling water

1 cup cider 134 cup diced red apples 34 cup seeded Tokay grapes,

halved 14 cup chopped nuts, if desired

Dissolve gelatin in hot water and cool. Add cider and allow to thicken. Fold in other ingredients. Pour into molds which have been rinsed in cold water or oiled and allow to chill until firm. Serve on lettuce.

The dessert for your gala New Year's buffet is a refrigerator cake which one and all will welcome for its light fluffiness and refreshing flavor. Make this ahead of time so it will have time to chill thoroughly and thus slice nicely.

- 2 cups heavy cream, whipped 1/2 cup maraschino cherries, quartered

### Angel Food Cake

Soften gelatin in cold water. Dissolve in hot milk. Add salt and chill until partially set. Fold marshmallows and candy into whipped cream. Beat gelatine mixture until light and fluffy. Add cherries and whipped cream mixture. Line bottom and sides of an angel cake pan or a spring form (oiled) with strips one-half inch thick and one inch wide of angel food cake, from which the crusts have been removed. Fill with gelatine mixture and chill until set.

FOR A SIMPLE supper on New Year's you may set the table for the number you are serving or serve buffet style, making waffles at the table. A simple fruit cen-

terpiece will be appropriate, as the guests may want some after you have served the waffles.

Plain waffles with syrup are an excellent choice, but if you want something more, serve creamed chicken or creamed ham and mushrooms on the waffles. If you serve caffein-free coffee, everyone can drink all they wish without any qualms about staying awake after they get home to retire. Use the regular grind for percolator and the drip grind for glass coffee maker or drip type of pot. The instant type is good if you want quick service.

Waffles

- (Makes 4 4-section waffles) 2 cups sifted cake flour
- 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 egg yolks, well beaten
- 1 cup milk
- 4 tablespoons melted butter or other shortening 3 egg whites

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt and sift again. Combine egg yolks and milk. Add

to flour with butter then mix only

# Best Time to Stop Rodent Losses Is Before Storage

The best time to prevent losses by rats and mice in farm storage is just previous to the actual storing of produce.

Before storing vegetables, apples, or other farm produce, give the storage room a thorough cleaning-both inside and out.

Check windows, doors, ventilators, and floor drains to make sure they are constructed so as to prevent rat and mouse travel. Farmers should remove all lumber piles, broken boxes, tall grass, weeds and refuse from areas surrounding the outside of the storage building.

# Union Starts Test In Northeast Coke

Union Oil Co. of California has set surface pipe in its wildcat in northeastern Coke county to be drilled 7,000 feet if necessary to explore the Ellenburger. Exploration Drilling Co. has the contract.

The test is known as No. 1 Jack Frost, 660 feet out of the north-east corner of the southeast quarter of Section 269-1A-H&TC, four miles west and slightly south of Blackwell and five-eights mile south of the Nolan county line.

It is on the northwest side of a block of 11 1-2 sections. The block was leased up more than a year ago by S. E. Adams. Humble and Rio Bravo Oil Co. have offset leases.

Union's wildcat on the Jack Frost property is about eight miles east of Sun's No. 1 J. S. Arledge, Marble Falls pool opener, 7 miles north of Sanco.

Three Ellenburger failures have been drilled in the Blackwell area east of the Frost location. The first was Warren Oil Corp. No. 1 Fowler, an east offset to Warren No. 1 J. S. Craft, small discovery pumper from the Cisco at 3,820-28 feet and only well in the Blackwell pool. No. 1 Craft is two miles east and a half mile south of Union No. 1 Jack Frost.
