If Coke county ever received a "million dollar rain" they had one the first of this week. Robert Lee . F. McCabe, Louis Bridges, gauged a strong 2 1-2 inches, while Barton Waldrop, Tom Schooler, almost every other section of the

The rains started Monday night and continued through Tuesday. Some showers were received Wednesday night and skies were still cloudy on Thursday. In most cases moisture to soak in, and only an 8foot rise was noted in the Colorado River at the Robert Lee bridge.

With the drouth situation becoming worse each season since 1941, Coke county has experienced a long period of poor crops. During 1948 the average rainfall for the county was not more than 12 inches. As a result crops were very short and pastures died out. Many ranches were forced to sell off their entire herds of sheep and cattle.

However, farmers and ranchmen were greatly encouraged by 3 inches of moisture which came during January and February, all of it in slow rains that wet down through the sub-soil. Oats planted last fall and then died down for lack of rain, came out in fine shape. Oat fields and a grain crop is almost assured

Farmers have put in large acre-Now additional crops will be planted as soon as the ground dries enough, and more cotton will be planted than for many years.

Last year Coke county had no more than 1,500 acres in cotton up for the light run last fall However, Mr. McDonald says his gin will operate this year. He estimates at least 3.000 acres of cotton will be planted in Coke this year.



A chattel mortgage, either oral or in writing is valid and enforceable between the parties, but is void as to innocent purchasers if it is not duly registered in the county where the same is situated, or to which it is removed with the knowledge of the mortgagee. A removal of the property by the mortgagor out of the county where it was located when mortaged, or a sale of disposition thereof, without the mortgagee's consent and with the intent to defraud him is an offense.

One may generally mort gage anything he may sell, but if the owner be a married man he may not mortgage the household and kitchen furniture to a loan broker without the consent of his wife executed and acknowledged as in a conveyance of the homestead. Merchandise daily exposed to sale may not be mortgaged.
