Judge John F. Sutton ordered a venire of 75 men who will report for jury duty Monday morning. The jury list follows:

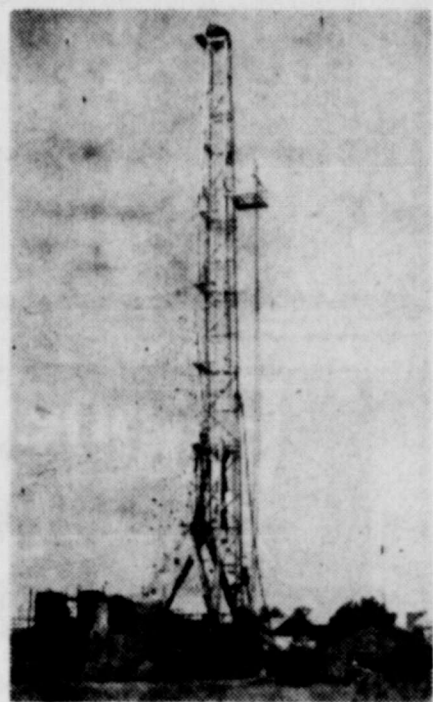

## Drilling For Oil In Bronte Townsite

Pictured above is the rotary rig which is drilling for oil in the Bronte townsite. Drilling started last Thursday evening and surface pipe was set to a depth of 360 feet. The hole was below 2,500 feet Thursday.

T. W. Murray of Texarkana and Louis Mabee of Midland are making the test on property owned by L. T. Youngblood, president of the First National Bank of Bronte. The location is in the center of town, just back of the Bronte Tractor Co. building.

Operators will receive \$15,000 in case the hole is dry. Forty persons made up the bottom hole money and if a producer is brought in they will be paid back from proceeds of the sale of oil. Contract calls for a depth of 5,300 feet which will not be deep enough to explore the Ellenburger. Oil is being produced a mile west of Bronte from the Palo Pinto around 4,400 feet.

The drilling equipment is owned by Mabee, and tools are being handled by Edward Polston. Day driller is W. E. Maypole of Andrews. The rig was moved to Bronte from Trent where two wildcat tests were made.

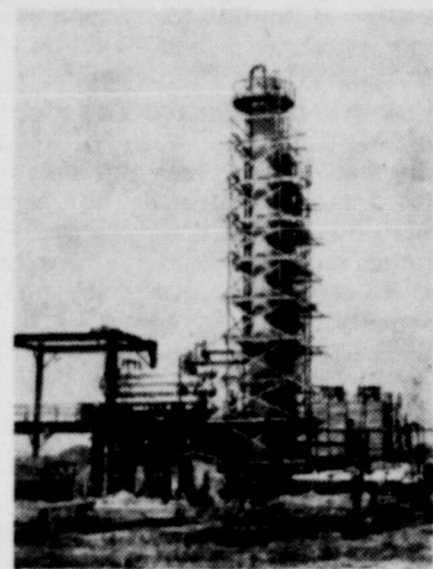
J. F. McCabe, Jr. says the Robert Lee calf roping club will have its first roping session here next Sunday at 3 p. m.

## Sun's Gas Plant Nears Completion

Two steel tanks known as fractionators, rising 70 feet into the air, are being made ready at Sun Oil company's pressure maintenance plant which is nearing completion at Silver.

One of the tanks is directly behind the one pictured. When The Observer picture was snapped last week, scaffolding was being used by workmen who were insulating the tanks.

Propane, butane and casing head gasoline will be drawn from these tanks, and the remaining dry gas will be forced back into the earth to maintain pressure of the flowing oil wells.

Gas which is now being flared from more than 60 producers in Sun's field at Silver will be used in the new gas plant.

Manager Harvey O. Evinger says the plant may be in operation by July 1.

### Death of Larkin Hayley

Wm. Larkin Hayley, 74, former Bronte and Norton postmaster and druggist, died Wednesday night of last week at his home in Snyder. Funeral rites were held from the Methodist church there Friday.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, Hubert A. Hayley of Lufkin, and Holliday A. Hayley of Tyler, a daughter, Mrs. Frank Storm of Snyder, and three sisters.

He was born Oct. 31, 1875, and moved with his family to Texas when he was four years old. He was postmaster at Bronte for 24 years before moving to Norton where he also was postmaster and operated a drug store for 15 years. He moved to Snyder in 1943 after retiring from business.

## No. 4 Cummings West Of Edith Hits Pay Section

Another producer in the Millican field west of Edith was indicated this week when Sun No. 4 Annie Cummings topped the reef at 5,818 feet. On a drillstem test 5 846-84 feet 180 feet of oil and gas-cut mud was recovered, showing 10 per cent oil.

Operators set casing to 5,882 feet and were preparing to core to completion.

No. 5 Cummings has been staked as a new location. It will be a northwest diagonal offset to No. 4, and 660 feet from the north and west lines of Section No. 187.

In Sun's Jameson field at Silver No. 2 H. L. Bloodworth was drilling in sandy shale at 2,700 feet.

No. 7 J. B. Walker, on the south side of the river, was drilling in shale at 4,577 feet.

General Geophysical Co. rotary equipment was being moved from the Billie Hanks failure to No. 10 Homer Jameson, which is to be worked over as a gas injection well. It is a half mile north and west of the new gas plant which is nearing completion.

Sun's No. 1 Mary S. Cook, wildcat near Maryneal, was coring Thursday at 6,412 feet in shale.

## Speer Law Points

### ODDITIES IN THE LAW

The law, like a marble statue of Justice, is a beautiful thing. But sometimes we come across a law that brings a shudder or a laugh. These oddities are usually in some court opinion construing or applying the law. The court once reversed a conviction of a man for drowning his victim because the indictment didn't allege that it was in water. The Constitution declares that taxation shall be uniform but uniformity is found nowhere else. It is a beautiful concept only.

Our law in its anxiety to foster the family life exempts to every family, from every specie of forced sale, five milk cows and their calves, two mules, one gun, twenty hogs, twenty sheep, twenty goats, fifty chickens, thirty turkeys, thirty geese, thirty guineas and one dog. This was good in its day but of little value in modern family life. It doesn't mention automobile or radio set.

The law has been zealous to protect the wife's right to own a separate estate, but see what absurd results follow their workout. A woman upon her marriage is the owner in her separate right of, say a thousand stock cattle and abundant pasture lands for their subsistence. They are by law under her control and disposition, but after a dozen or so years, the original cattle are all dead and the ten or more thousand herd of their progeny are no longer hers, but belong to the community estate, subject to the control and disposition of the husband. Or if the herd at marriage be of sheep and goats the semi-annual clips are not her

own. They are community property.

It is by statute a criminal offense for a corporation to sell any article of adulterated food or drink or to pollute a fresh-water stream of the State. How can a corporation—an artificial person—be indicted, arrested, arraigned in court, confronted by witnesses, and sent to jail and imprisoned, for failing to pay the fine imposed upon it? I have never known of such a thing being done. Have you?

It is an offense to exceed a certain speed in passing into or through an unincorporated town in Texas. Now an unincorporated town has no line of boundary. Where would one enter it or how could he pass through it?

A wife is permitted to sue her husband for any sum of money due her, but she may not sue him for damages if he beats her, breaks her bones, or deserts her and defames her good name wrongfully. If he murder her baby, she has no remedy.

"That sounds like nonsense my dear."

"Maybe so, my dear, but it may be good law at that."—Scott.

#### District Encampment

Miss Vernemma Freeman, Coke county home demonstration agent, and Mrs. James Scott of Bronte, an adult 4-H leader, took Nelda Sheppard, Melva Dean Gartman and Esther Allen to a district training encampment in Ballinger last week. The purpose of the camp was to train girls and a leader to

come back to the county and help conduct the county encampment which will be held the 29th and 30th of June. Location of the camp will be announced later.

There were about 65 girls, leaders and agents present. Since this was an experimental camp for this part of the nation the recreation specialist from A & M, Miss Dorothy Brightwell, was present to help supervise the camp. Two counties were grouped together as separate camping units who did their own cooking, program planning, keeping their camp grounds and the setting up of the camp equipment.

The advantages of this type of camp is the fact that each girl present had a chance to take part in every camp activity. Had the whole group been put together this would not have been possible. The entire camp did come together for the evening meal and a camp fire following. Nelda Sheppard was selected as head of the cowboy campfire which was a very interesting campfire program.

Since this camp experiment was of interest to the whole state, Miss Gladys Martin, assistant state home demonstration agent from A & M and Miss Frances Arnold, assistant editor from A & M were present.

Plans are now under way to conduct the county camp in a similar fashion to give the children the advantage of learning how to live in the out of doors and close to nature.

Sealed proposals, addressed to the Commissioners' Court of Coke County, at Robert Lee, Texas, for the construction of a County hospital for said County, in accordance with plans, specifications and "Instructions to Bidders," which will be made available to bidders by the County, will be received by the Commissioners' Court until 10:00 A. M., on the 18th day of June, 1949, in the Commissioners' Courtroom in the Courthouse at Robert Lee, Texas, and then publicly opened and read.

Plans, Specifications and Instructions to Bidders, may be procured at the office of the County Judge of Coke County, at Robert Lee, Texas, on or after the 20th day of May, 1949.

A charge of \$10.00 will be made for each set of Plans and Specifications, which amount will be refunded upon the return of same in good condition not later than ten (10) days from date of receipt of bids. Specifications used in making a bid will be considered as returned.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check, drawn on a responsible bank, or an approved Bidder's Bond, for the sum of Five (5) per centum of the amount of the maximum total bid, as a guarantee that, if awarded the contract, the bidder will promptly enter into contract and execute a bond as outlined in the Specifications and Instructions to Bidders. Certified checks must be made payable to Commissioners' Court of Coke County, Texas.

A performance bond in an amount of not less than One Hundred (100) per centum of the contract price, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the contract and upon payment of all persons supplying labor or furnishing materials will be required of the successful bidder or bidders.

In case of ambiguity or lack of clearness in stating prices in the Proposal, the County reserves the right to adopt the most advantageous construction thereof, or to reject the Proposal.

The Commissioners' Court reserves the right to reject any and all bids and or waive any of all formalities. No bid may be withdrawn within thirty (30) days after the date on which bids are opened.

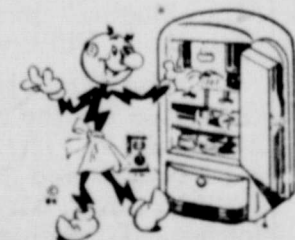

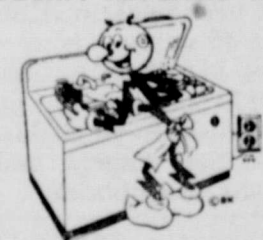

## New Hope Seen In War Against Polio

The conquest of infantile paralysis is now within sight, Alton L. Blakeslee, noted science writer, predicts in a pamphlet published today by the Public Affairs Committee, Inc., of New York.

"No one can predict just when the victory will come, or in what way," he adds, "but medical science is making such progress that there is real cause for optimism."

Such striking progress has been made in treatment during the past ten years that only about 15 to 25 per cent of polio victims are now "left more less severely handicapped . . . Forty to 60 per cent of the children or adults who get the illness in recognizable form will recover completely, or almost completely, without any visible evidence of paralysis."

Scientific study of means for pre-

venting the disease has been slower, Mr. Blakeslee admits in the 20-cent pamphlet POLIO CAN BE CONQUERED, but he lists a number of recent developments that appear to carry great promise. Monkeys have been inoculated against polio safely and effectively, he points out. Unfortunately, the vaccine does not protect the monkeys against all strains of the virus and thus could not offer satisfactory protection for humans.

Top scientists are cited as believing that a safe vaccine for humans will someday be found. The recent success of scientists in almost completely purifying one kind of polio virus should hasten this day, Mr. Blakeslee declares.

"Drugs and other chemicals have been found," he reveals, which "protect mice against viruses like the polio virus, or which help the mice recover when they are given the viruses." So far however, none has been used successfully on humans.

Although little is known about the way in which polio spreads, the pamphlet carries a number of tips for parents in the event that infantile paralysis breaks out in epidemic form in their neighborhood. Parents are urged to:

1. Watch for the symptoms that may be weathervanes of polio: a tired feeling, nausea, upset stomach, pains or stiffness in the muscles, or a fever. A big part of the victory in polio is immediate rest and immediate treatment.

2. Avoid crowds. There is no way of telling who has the virus, who is becoming sick, or who is a healthy, unaffected carrier.

3. Keep children from becoming overtired or chilled.

4. Do not let children swim in polluted waters. Attacks of polio have followed after such experiences.

5. Keep clean. Make sure the children wash their hands before eating.

6. Keep garbage covered and screen the house against flies.

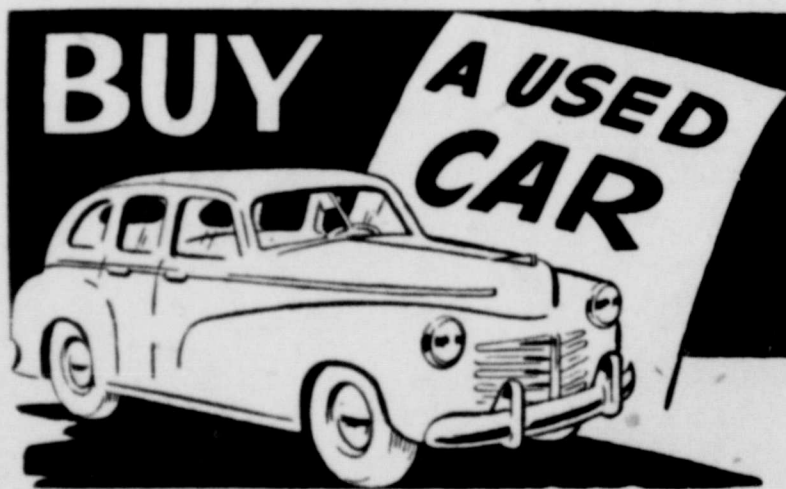

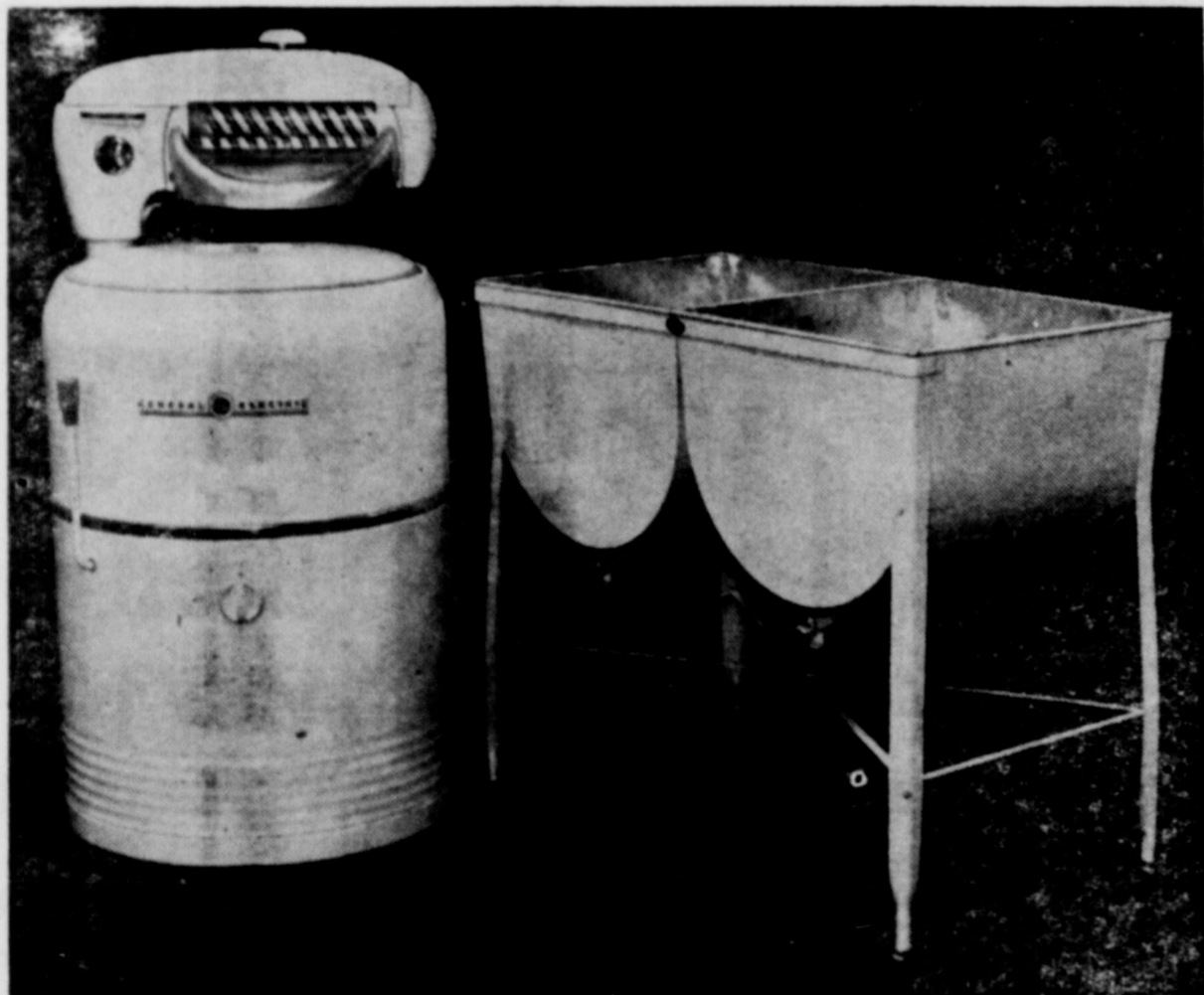
