

It is hoped that some loss may be prevented by suggesting that people in business and those dealing with the public do not accept from strangers checks signed: "John Doe By: Bob Jones"; checks with the name of the bank scratched out and another written in and, particularly when the location is not shown directly under the name of the bank which is written in; checks made payable to a tradesname unless such name is registered with the county clerk; checks which are post-dated, checks which are requested to be held; and checks which have been endorsed by other persons.

While prosecuting attorneys are now prohibited by law from collecting checks or other debts growing out of criminal offenses, it is the policy of your County Attorney to take into account the defendant's attitude toward restitution and payment when considering the amount of fine or other punishment to recommend in case of conviction. A complainant also is now enjoined under heavy fine from seeking a dismissal of a prosecution which he has instigated.



After looking at two spots where water had been applied, one on bare ground and one on ground with a good grass cover, Royce Fancher made the following statement: I can see now why a good grass cover is so important in getting the water in the ground when it rains. I would not have believed the grass cover could have made so much difference, Fancher went on. Here are two range sites and water has been applied to each site the same length of time.

The water wet the bare ground about six inches, and the good grass cover caused the water to penetrate a good twenty-four inches. If we could get all of our range land covered with good range grasses, our erosion would not be near as great and our rivers and creeks would not flood as often, Francher commented.





1950 farm wheat acreage allotments will be used only for determining eligibility for price support. 
