Frank Tubb Buried In National Shrine

Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Tubb and daughter, Mrs. Vincent Hanna, returned Sunday from Fort Smith, Ark., where they attended final burial rites on Friday for their son and brother, Corporal Frank Maxwell Tubb, who lost his life in China during the war.

Other relatives making the pilgrimage to Fort Smith were Mrs. Mabel Parker of Eldorado, Mrs. Lois Cline of San Angelo, Mrs. Irv Cumbie, Mrs. W. H. Maxwell, Jr. and son, Bill, of Bronte and Mr. and Mrs. Earl Barr of Ballinger.

Frank was a radio-gunner on a B-25 bomber. Flying at low altitude it had dropped a bomb load on an enemy ammunition ship in the Honkong harbor. Repercussion from the explosion damaged the B-25 and caused it to crash into a mountain a few miles away.

Other members of the crew were the pilot, Lt. Garrison, of Poplar Bluff, Mo., and Sgt. H. M. Worley of Ft. Worth. Because of the wreckage it was impossible to identify the bodies individually, and the remains were brought back to the States and buried in a group in the National Cemetery at Ft. Smith.

Relatives report the burial service was very impressive. In charge was Chaplain Johnson of Camp Chaffee and an army firing squad. The remains in one casket were accompanied from Oakland, Calif., by Major Leo E. Ogozaly.

Lt. Charles Gilmore came from Denver, Colo., for the service. He was the regular pilot of the ill-fated B-25 but did not go on the mission the day it crashed. The date was March 15, 1945. Relatives of Sgt. Worley and Lt. Garrison were also present.

At Ft. Smith the Tubb family joined by Frank's widow, who has remarried and is now Mrs. Johnny Schneider of Festus, Mo. Also present was Maxwell McDade of Fulton, Ky., a cousin of the Maxwells.

Sun No. 1 Davidson Northwest Edith Rates 160 Barrels

Sun No. 1 G. W. Davidson flowed 160 barrels of high gravity pipeline oil during its official 24-hour test this week. Gauge was through quarter inch choke. Gas-oil ratio was 1,261-1.

The well was completed naturally in open hole from 5,971 to 6,065 feet in Pennsylvanian lime. Location is in the extreme southwest corner of Section 158 H & TC Survey, four miles west and one mile north of the Edith store.

Paul F. Rutledge was the drilling contractor and moved one location west to Sun No. 1 Foster Sims Price, in the southeast corner of Section 159. Surface pipe at No. 1 Price was cemented Wednesday to a depth of 624 feet.

To Complete Mathers

In Sun's main field southwest of Silver A-1 Mathers was drilling plugs and will acidize with 2,000 gallons Friday. Top of the lime reef was 6,251 feet and the hole bottomed at 6,273 feet.

The reef was much lower than the recently completed No. 9 Brannan, a quarter mile to the east. A fair showing of oil resulted from drillstem tests and a producing well is indicated.

Soil Conservation District News

H. C. Grafa, a district cooperator with the Coke County Soil Conservation District, reports that the King Ranch Bluestem grass seeded last spring on his farm is making growth and producing a good seed crop. This grass promises to be a good forage grass, Grafa said. King Ranch Bluestem is an introduced grass first found growing on the King Ranch in south Texas, Grafa explained. It is a deep rooted perennial, mid-tall, semi-prostrate tufted grass that is drought and cold resistant, and adapted to wide extremes of rainfall, Grafa went on.

A 4000 cubic yard stock pond was staked last week on Tom Green's farm located one mile south of Tennyson. The pond is a part of Green's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan that he is applying as a district cooperator with the Coke County Soil Conservation District. The pond will give me a better distribution of livestock water and prevent livestock trampling around my other watering places, Green said. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisted Green with staking the stock pond.

R. C. Lasswell and Mrs. Carrie Williams completed a coordinated soil and water conservation plan on their farms last week. The plans were developed to treat each acre according to its needs. The plans include construction of broad base terraces, contour farming, seeding of cover crops and range improvement.

A diversion terrace 26 feet long was staked on Jacob Morrow's farm last week. The diversion terrace will pick up outside water and divert it from his field. Controlling of outside water is a part of Morrow's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan that he is applying as a district cooperator with the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

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A Good Night's Sleep Important To Health

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Sept. 22.—Sleep is a necessity of life and health, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, and habitual loss of sleep will tend to retard the body's recovery from fatigue of the day's activities.

"We may be able to go without sleep for a night or two, but too little sleep for a prolonged period will undermine the health of a rugged person and turn a cheerful individual into a cross, irritable one," Dr. Cox said. "When good health can be protected to such a large extent merely by sleeping, and thus allow overtaxed bodies and minds to secure the proper rest, it is hard to understand why so many persons are heedless of this important health measure."

Some individuals require more sleep than others. How well we sleep is as important as how long we sleep. A good night's rest means a sufficient number of hours spent in sleep to enable each person to feel well, do efficient work, and to keep in a cheerful humor the next day.

"Some outdoor exercise each day, a comfortable bed, and fresh air in our sleeping quarters," Dr. Cox said, "will help us to sleep soundly at night. Do not mull over your problems and ideas after you have gone to bed. Make your plans early in the evening for a good night's rest by slowing down from the physical and mental work of your daily life. When you arise each morning, rested and with a feeling of general well being, you will be amply repaid for your thought in planning a good night's sleep."

Bronte Outplays Robert Lee, 14 To 0

The Longhorns from Bronte high school came over Friday night and won a 14-0 football victory over Robert Lee's Steers. The field was heavy from a 3-inch rain earlier in the week, and as a result both teams were slowed up considerably.

The visitors struck early and scored a touchdown on the third play of the game. They were deep in Robert Lee territory because the Steers umbled the opening kickoff. Just before the half ended an interception put the Longhorns into scoring position again and they cashed in.

Neither side threatened seriously in the second half. Robert Lee went like a house afire in spurts, but their drives were stopped by numerous costly fumbles and penalties. Statistics show the Steers racked up 10 first downs and the Longhorns 4.

This game does not count in the conference, but the teams meet at Bronte on Thanksgiving Day to settle their 7-B District standing.

Bronte kicked off to Robert Lee and a fumble gave the Longhorns the ball on the Steer 25 yard line. Sandusky and Rusk failed to gain thru the line, and a forward pass to Ben Snead was good for a touchdown. Sandusky plunged from the 2-yard line to convert the extra point. Score: Bronte 7, Robert Lee 0.

Hamilton brought the next kickoff back 15 yards to the Steer 43. On the second play Robert Lee fumbled again and Bronte recovered in midfield. Rusk attempted to circle his right end but fumbled the ball the Steers recovered on their 45 yard line.

Roe gained 5 yards and Mauldin followed good interference around right end for 7 yards and a first down on the Bronte 43. Hood and Hamilton failed by inches to make it a first down in four line plays and Bronte took over on their 34.

Hester gained 9 yards around end, a pass to Vaughn failed to connect. Sandusky grabbed a short pass and went to the Steer 37 for a first down. Rusk failed to get off a pass and was thrown for a 10 yard loss. He picked up 9 yards around right end and then lost 4 when Plumlee made a nice tackle. Sandusky punted out on the Steer 15.

Roe gained 4 yards around end and Hamilton carried to his 26 for a first down. Roe and Hood got six yards in two plays and Hood made it a first down on his 39. Hamilton charged through center for 7 yards and Roe went off left tackle for a first down on the 50.

Hamilton and Hood picked up 7 yards in three plays and Hamilton went over right tackle for a first down on the Longhorn 37. Roe found a hole in the center of the line and gained 12 yards before he was stopped. The play was called back and a 5 yard offside penalty went against the Steers. Hamilton gained 5 yards in two off tackle plunges and Mauldin was dropped for an 8 yard loss. The Steers punted to the Bronte 19.

The Longhorns failed to gain on two pass attempts and a recovered fumble and punted to the Robert Lee 30. The Steers couldn't advance in four plays and Bronte took over on the 30. Bronte was forced to punt on the 4th down and Roe brought the ball back to his 28.

Sandusky intercepted a short wobbly Steer pass and was downed on the Steer 21. Rusk passed to Vaughn for a first down on the 11. Another pass intended for Vaughn failed. Sandusky picked up 5 yards and 2 more, then plunged over for a touchdown. Rusk carried over to convert the extra point. Score: Bronte 14, Robert Lee 0.

Hamilton brot the kickoff back 20 yards to midfield as the half ended.

Second Half

The Longhorns took the kickoff on their 29. Sandusky and Rusk failed to gain and the Steers took a punt on their 40. Mauldin went thru center for 6 yards, but the play was called back and a 15 yard penalty went against Robert Lee. The next play saw a 5 yard offside penalty against Bronte.

Roe came around left end for a gain to his 49, but it availed naught as a 15 yard clipping penalty was called on the Steers. Hamilton gained 7 yards and Mauldin 4. The Steers were forced to kick, Sandusky downing the ball on his 25 yard line.

Two plays netted the Longhorns 4 yards and a 5 yard penalty was called on Robert Lee. Roe brot a punt back 20 yards to the Steer 47. Hamilton went over right tackle for 3 yards. Roe skirted around right end, but fumbled and Bronte recovered on their 47.

Two pass attempts failed, a 5 yard penalty went against Robert Lee and two line plays carried to the Steer 40 for a Bronte first down. Roe intercepted a long pass on his 15. Roe gained 8 yards around end and Hood crashed thru for a first down on his 39 yard line.
