Christian Church History

(Ed. Note: This is another in a series of articles on Dimmitt churches. Minister Bedford Smith author of this article will be moving to Bridge City, February 24. He has been a pastor here for three years.) The Christian Church was founded by Jesus Christ on Pentecost through His Apostles following His death and resurrection appearances and His ascension ten days before Pentecost. According to Luke's account in the "Acts of Apostles" some 3,000 people "who gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day were added unto them". Following this Luke added that "the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." The Book of Acts tells how the Church spread from Jerusalem to Judea and thence to the Gentiles in much of the Roman world. Centuries later after the Protestant Reformation, certain Ministers and others in various denominations, separately conceived the idea of going back to the pattern of the church revealed in the New Testament in an effort to find Christian unity. They accepted the

idea that there were Christians in all the denominations and saw the Church not as an organization but an organism or body with Christ as its only Head; and they forsok denominational names and organizational structure, desiring to be known as Christians only and members of His Church or Body. Christian Church services may have been conducted here in the early days of Dimmitt since its founders named the town for a Christian Church Minister, a Brother Dimmitt, and since some of them such as Hilery Bedford, were lay preachers in the church as well as business men and ranchers. The writer does not have the facts concerning these early days. Prior to the establishment of what is now known as First Christian Church in Dimmitt, two women talked things over before one went to see the Christian Church Minister at Hereford. When she received no encouragement there, Minister R. C. Bolton of First Christian Church in Clovis, N.M., was

next contacted. Upon his advice advertisements were made in the Castro County News and the Earth News-Sun for members or interested people to help establish a Christian Church in Dimmitt along the lines suggested above. Several responded and met with Bro. Bolton in 1959. He in turn conducted a short revival in Dimmitt, and arranged with them and the West Texas-New Mexico Evangelizing Association for a tentative calling of Minister Bedford W. Smith to come to Dimmitt to organize First Christian Church. The Association agreed to guarantee the Minister's salary and car expenses for a full year; while those desiring to have the church in Dimmitt would be responsible for the Minister's residence in Dimmitt and his utilities and for a place to worship. A temporary Treasurer were chosen by the group of interested people. Minister Smith met with the W. T.-N.M. Evn. Assn. at a noon meeting in Clovis on January 19, 1960, where the arrangements were confirmed. He and Bro. Bolton met with the Dimmitt church folk at an evening meeting the same day. Three Trustees: George Gabel, Othele Fry and Clinton Fry were elected with Mr. Gabel to be Chairman, and it was decided to buy the two-acre site on Western Drive, to buy and move in a surplus building from Clovis AFB which could be converted to serve as the first house of worship, and to organize the church in its own building. When Minister and Mrs. Bedford W. Smith moved to Dimmitt from Bucklin, Kansas, the building was on its foundation at the present worship site. But it was not until Sunday, Feb. 28th, that the first services and Bible School could be had in the building. On Sunday morning of February 28th, thirty people were at the first Bible School meeting and thirty-one attended the Morning Worship Service. Sixteen became charter members, representing six families, some of whom have already moved from Dimmitt. Four were baptized that afternoon at Clovis. In all, forty-nine have taken membership since the beginning of the church but some of these have been lost by death and removal. The Charter Roll remained open during the year 1960 and it finally totaled thirty-six. On the third Sunday of March 1960 when the membership numbered 19, a Board of Elders and Deacons were selected, composed of three Elders in addition to the Minister, two Deacons and four Deaconesses. Eventually the church grew to have enough men to have a full men's Board of ten: the Minister, three Elders and six Deacons. During the first year the church was incorporated as a tree

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

When you mentioned several weeks ago the plan to liquidate two million farmers and call it a solution to the farm problem, it sorta got under my skin. I resolved to write you my view of the suggestion but thought it better to wait till I cooled off a little bit. But about the time I cool a little I read another something about like it which keeps me from getting in the more desirable condition, so here goes.

I can agree with many of the Republican friends on several subjects of a conservative nature, but when it comes to political party affiliations I am uncompromising. Some of my remarks may seem too rough, if they do not make us even if I never was any more insulted in my life than I was on last election day when I learned that they did not have enough confidence in me to risk me to cast an honest ballot. We have recent history to compare that for identification. If I have learned anything from reading "The Rise and Fall of The Third Reich," we can safely call it the second stage of the Gestapo. The first stage is that whispering campaign that we don't know about, builds up premature decisions, destroys confidence in elected servants as well as their neighbors and any and all who disagree with them in politics and philosophy. The third stage comes several years later when some good Democrat disappears and no one ever knows what became of him, plus a few others. Fourth stage comes to a head when bedlam and confusion reaches such a stage as to be unbearable and the forces of righteousness are forced to take over and restore order, killing off several prominent leaders in their opposition, forcing their national neighbors to pursue righteousness and not evil until it involves the whole world. The fifth stage can find a parallel in the day when Hitler gave Eva a capsule then stuck a Lager in his mouth and pulled the trigger.

After WW I, we had twelve years of what we learned too late was nothing but a sliding scale. One of my milo crops sold for 35c cwt. And I paid 15c for a sack to put it in. Sold my cotton for 7c a pound. Sold top hogs for two and one half cents in Fort Worth. Paid my help \$10 per day, when I could get the money. Some of my neighbors paid 75 cents per day. On every highway in and out of the major cities of Texas for a radius of fifteen miles could be found women drumming for business. Anything would beat starvation in a land of plenty. Farmers couldn't pay their taxes, teachers were unable to cash their vouchers. Churches paid their preachers with eggs, said

Senator YARBOROUGH'S REPORT

We have read and heard much recently about the new federal budget, but I want to give you a breakdown of some of the public works projects for Texas included in that budget. I am fighting for these items, and I want to tell you what affects you and your home county and town.

A total of \$88 Million is included in the proposed new federal budget this next year for Army Corps of Engineers work in Texas on water conservation, flood control, rivers and harbors and hurricane protection projects. These projects fall into three categories of activity: First, the preliminary surveys, the planning stages and finally, those where construction is underway.

One big step forward in the new budget is a proposal for a comprehensive 250,000 study to find the best way to protect the Texas Gulf Coast from the high tides driven by hurricanes, to prevent damage like that done by Hurricane Carla in September, 1961. I made a request for this study in the budget. I am glad to see it included.

Another vital new study would authorize \$50,000 for finding a way to cut down the salt pollution of the Arkansas-Red Rivers, and to improve the quality of surface water. Funds are also included for major basin studies on the Pecos, Colorado, Sabine and Neches River Basins, and on the Red River below the Denison Dam.

Among special projects in the planning stage are channel improvements on the Clear Fork Extension of the Fort Worth Floodway; hurricane protection for the Freeport area; an earth-fill dam for the Pat Mayse Reservoir or Sanders Creek, near Paris, Texas, so badly needed in Lamar and adjoining areas; channel work on the Vince and Little Vince Bayous in Harris County, and on the Sabine Neches Waterway for the Beaumont-Port Arthur area.

Among big construction projects in the budget are the Somerville Reservoir on Yegua Creek, a tributary of the Brazos River and a part of the West Brazos river development, and on the West Fork of the Fort Worth Floodway on the Trinity River. A total of \$8,100,000 is requested for the Somerville Reservoir and \$500,000 for the West Fork project.

A total of \$50,000 is included for the McGee Bend Reservoir on the Angelina River, ten miles northwest of Jasper. Another \$500,000 is included for the Brazos Island Harbor project at Brownsville, on the southern tip of the State.

In addition to these Corps of Engineers-sponsored projects, the Reclamation Bureau has jurisdiction over other projects. For example, a total of \$23,000,000 is asked for the Canadian River project to provide a winter supply for the cities in the Panhandle and South Plains. The dam is near Borger. Additional amounts are provided for other Bureau of Reclamation projects in Texas.

Meanwhile work continues on the great Anstett Dam, west of Del Rio, on the Rio Grande—a total of \$7 Million being needed to continue construction under the direction of the International Boundary Commission. Fellow Texans, these are some of the projects I am fighting for as your Senator.

Irrigated Pasture Must Be Managed For Good Returns

By Bob West, USDA-SCS agent

The purpose of an irrigated pasture is to maintain or increase farm and ranch profits. The kinds of grass to be grown depends on the farmer or rancher. He can choose a cool season or warm season grass. He also can choose a low or high producing grass. Any grass selected should be adapted to climate and soil.

Pasture management is the key to a successful pasture. The purpose of pasture management is to maintain an adequate ground cover for protection against soil and water losses, to prolong the life of grass plants, and to maintain a sustained yield of good quality forage.

The first thing to remember is it takes grass to grow grass. Food for grass plants are manufactured in the leaf surface and stored in the roots for regrowth of grass. Adequate leaf surface must be left to assure the manufacture of food for regrowth. If adequate production is going to be maintained, for example: The first few weeks in the spring is a critical time when growth of plants is from food stored in the roots and not from a commercial fertilizer applied. Again, remember any fertility applied to grass must be assembled in the leaf and returned to the roots before it is food for the plants.

In the spring tall grass, such as switchgrass, should not be grazed until grass is in boot stage or 18-24 inches tall.

Bermudagrass should not be grazed until it is 6 to 8 inches in height with good ground cover. This may be done by probably 50 percent leaf surface is left during growing season. It may be done by dividing pasture into two or more units. This probably is the best system to follow as it fits into the other things needed to manage pasture for maximum production.

A rotation can be carried out with this type of system. The period of rotation should be fitted to the period of watering. If grass is to be watered every two weeks, at least two grazing units will be needed, and four would probably be more desirable.

Where pasture is divided into separate grazing units, one unit may be grazed to the end of the growing season provided enough residue is left to protect against wind and water erosion.

The pasture grazed last in the spring should be grazed last in the fall should be grazed last in the spring so it will recover from the late grazing.

To maintain good pasture management adequate feed must be provided to take care of livestock during the time when grass is in low production. For warm season grasses this will be from about November 1 to May 15 or cool season grasses, mid-winter and mid-summer.

Wool Payments Apply To Sales

Made Before April

Wool growers were reminded today that the 1962 program payments, to be made this summer, will be made on wool and unshorn lambs which are marketed before March 31, 1963. That is the closing date for the 1962 program.

Charley E. Hill, Secretary, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, Castro County, also pointed out that applications for such payments under the 1962 wool program are to be filed before the end of April 1963.

He emphasized that the information on payment applications is to be supported by adequate records on the sales. For instance, producers' sales records for shorn wool should show name and address of buyer, date of sale, name and address of producer, net weight of wool sold, and net proceeds to producer after normal marketing deductions.

Payments to producers for the 1962 marketing year will follow the same methods employed for previous years. Shorn wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash returns from wool sales. The percentage—to be announced later this year—will be that required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool during the marketing year up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound.

Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payments will be at a rate per hundred-weight of live animals marketed to compensate for the wool on them on a basis comparable to the incentive payment per pound of shorn wool.

Under the 1961 wool program, growers in Castro County last year received a total of \$5034.31 in incentive payments earned under the marketing year ended March 31, 1962.
