The daughter was praying earnestly under her breath for their safety, when her mother turned to her and said, "I just don't believe that cow is worth \$40.00."

Among her memories is her trip with her six orphan children to the Indian Territory in 1900 in a covered wagon. "Dan" is her pet name among her children, grand children and great grandchildren; and "Dan's" word is the law and gospel in the Dickey tribe.

She spent her 85th birthday in the home of her son, Frank C. Dickey, in Robert Lee. One of her daughters, Mrs. L. B. Newman, came from Dallas to help her celebrate the day. Many happy returns of the day, "Dan."

Soil Conservation District News

W. G. Cresap and Charlie Arnold completed the development of their complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan last week. The plans were developed to treat each acre of land according to its needs. The plans included contour farming, seeding of cover crop, seeding of range grasses, range improvement, and construction of level broad base terraces with ends partially closed. A. V. Sheppard Work Unit Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, said. The plans were developed by each land owner assisted by personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

A farm pond was staked on W. T. Green's farm last week. The

pond will provide better distribution of livestock water and is a part of Green's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan he is applying as a District cooperator with the Coke County Soil Conservation District. Green is a member of the Mule Creek Conservation Group.

E. E. Bussey, a district cooperator and a member of the River Conservation Group, completed eight miles of terraces on his farm located four miles southwest of Silver. The terraces are a part of Bussey's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan. A diversion 3200 feet long was constructed to divert all outside water from the field before the terrace construction was started. The diversion terrace was designed and staked and the terrace system laid out by the personnel of the Soil Conservation Service.

The S. C. Vowell family moved to Colorado City last week, vacating one of the J. J. S. Smith houses in the south part of town. Mr. Vowell is now employed on a drilling rig near Snyder.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to wit: Suit for divorce and custody of minor child. Plaintiff alleges that she has been a bona fide resident of the State of Texas for more than twelve (12) months next preceding the filing of the petition; and that she has actually resided in Coke County, Texas, for the next six (6) months preceding the filing and exhibition of her petition. Plaintiff alleges cruel and harsh treatment on the part of the defendant, as well as abandonment and failure to support, acts of cruelty by both words, acts and conduct. Plaintiff further alleges that she and defendant are permanently separated as man and wife; and that plaintiff and defendant were duly and lawfully married, and as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

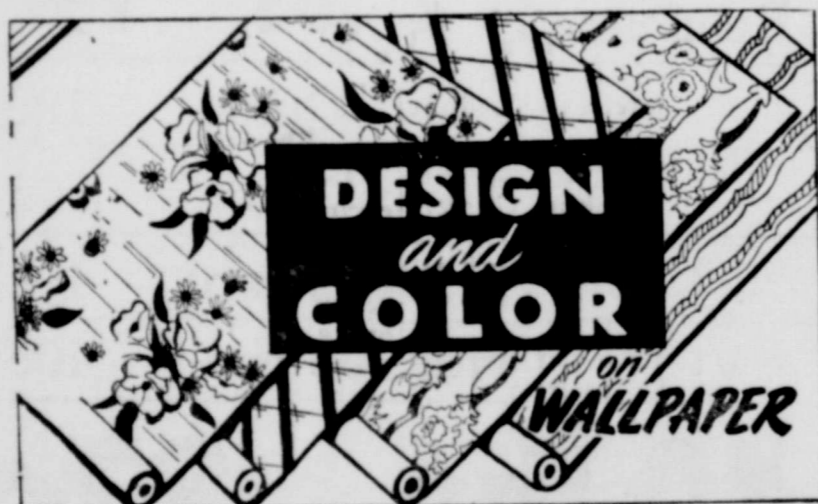
