Sun's Central National Bank No. 1, southwest of Silver was swabbing Thursday after acidizing with 3,000 gallons. The lime formation was found to be very tight and additional treatment may be necessary, operators said.

The Central Bank test topped the reef at 6,117 feet and was bottomed at 6,299. Baker & Taylor are the drilling contractors and after their release will move to Sun No. 8 J. B. Walker, south of the river.

A short distance southwest of Silver Sun Wille I. Tubb No. 6 was drilling in shale at 5,085 feet.

In the Millican field west of Edith Sun No. 5 G. W. Davidson was drilling at 5,640 feet in shale. Sun No. 8 Annie L. Cummings was in shale at 2,640 feet.

Sun No. 1 J. P. Maddox, in Nolan county 4 miles north of Sun Arledge No. 2 northw st of Sanco, spudded in Wednesday at 9 p. m. Parker Drilling Co. has the contract.

Arrow Drilling Co. is rigging up rotary on Union No. 1 Daisy McCutchen, five miles west of Robert Lee.

E. C. Rawlings, 86, Dies At Bronte

Edward C. Rawlings, 86, Coke county ranchman since 1888 and pioneer banker, died at the Bronte hospital Sunday night after a lingering illness. Funeral services and burial occurred Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Rawlings was born in Burnet county Jan 13, 1864. Following his schooling in Burnet county young Rawlings punched cattle and rode the range until 1888 when he leased 12 sections of land on Yellow Gold Creek in Coke county. Later he bought a 5,000 acre ranch which he owned and operated until his death.

He married Alice Lasswell on May 15, 1890. A pioneer organizer of the First National Bank of Bronte, the elderly ranchman was chairman of the board of directors when he died. He was a long time member of the Methodist church and served as a county commissioner a number of year ago.

Surviving the pioneer ranchman are the widow, four daughters, Mrs. Edna Butner, Mrs. O. R. McQueen and Mrs. Earl Box, all of Bronte; and Mrs. Joe Carter of San Angelo; and two sons, Carter Rawlings of Water Valley and Edward Rawlings, Jr., Bronte.

Soil Conservation District News

Robert G. Foreman, Charlie Copeland, Finell Smith and R.D. Watts were made district cooperators with the Coke County Soil Conservation District when their plans were approved by the Board of Supervisors last Tuesday at their regular monthly meeting. C. N. Webb, chairman of the board of supervisors, has announced.

These plans were developed to treat each acre according to the needs of the land. Contour farming, seeding of cover crops, protecting crop stubble, range improvement, constructing stock ponds, and seeding of range grasses are some of the practices planned to be applied to put a complete plan on the farms and ranches, Webb pointed out. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisted the landowners develop the plans.

Joe George Wilkins reports that his Madrid sweet clover is making a good growth. Wilkins plans to harvest the seed this year. The field was seeded in 1949, and Wilkins harvested one and one half tons of hay last year. Madrid sweet clover is a deep rooted, heavy forage producing bi-annual crop that will penetrate the plow sale and increase the rate of infiltration during rainfall and add nitrogen to the soil.

A. B. Sheppard, Earnest Varnadore and J. A. Perc full completed plans last week. The plans were developed to treat each acre according to its needs. 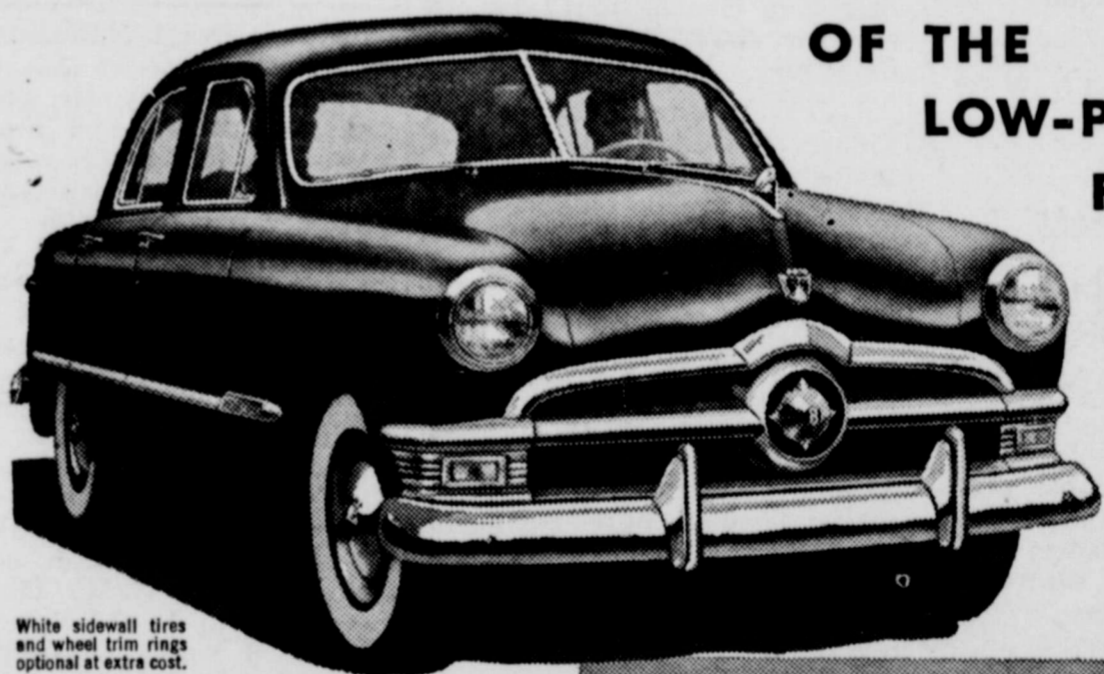

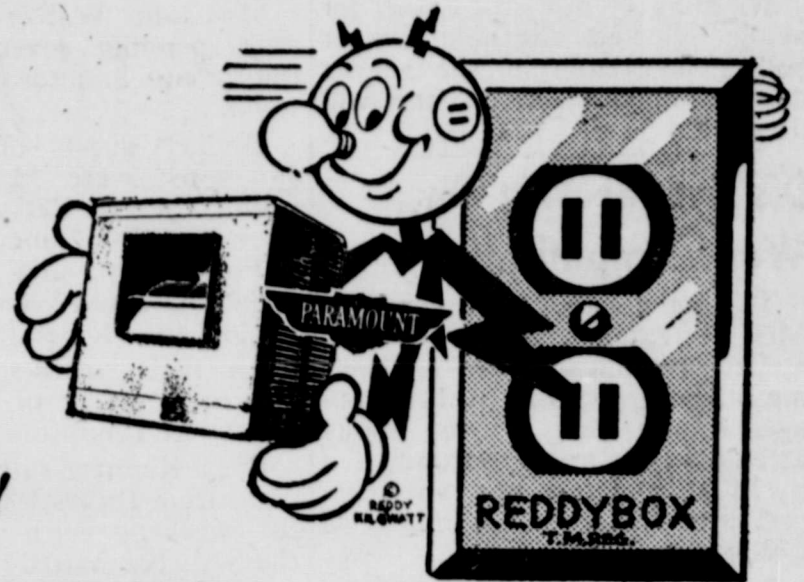

Heart Disease Is Number One Killer

AUSTIN, TEX. May 17.—Heart disease is the number one killer in Texas and last year there were 18,003 deaths from diseases of the heart, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

What kind of a heart have you? The periodic check-up with your physician will tell you. The Tuberculosis Survey in the state conducted by the Texas State Department of Health has brought to light many non-tuberculous abnormalities, some of these have been heart conditions.

The three present major forms of heart trouble are: rheumatic heart disease, high blood pressure and coronary heart disease. Rheumatic heart disease, the most common type of early life, occurs as the result of one or more attacks of rheumatic fever. It is a public health problem for which very little has been done, yet with early diagnosis and proper medical care during the acute and convalescent stages, children who develop rheumatic fever can be largely spared from rheumatic heart disease in later life.

Another major cause of heart trouble is high blood pressure or hypertension. This is the most common heart disease of middle age. There is a great deal that is not known about this disease, but we do know that it is most common in people who are overweight, and that it is associated with long, continuous nervous strain, high tension and constant worry. Treatment of high blood pressure is fairly successful in the majority of cases.

Coronary heart disease is a disease of the arteries which supply the heart muscle itself with blood. A majority of persons survive the first attack, and with good medical care, rest and common sense precautions, may even live a normal life span. Syphilitic heart disease can be prevented by early and adequate care of the systemic disease, a problem which has been simplified by the use of penicillin.

Research in the medical sciences is constantly improving the outlook for the cardiac patient, yet each individual must assume the responsibility for obtaining the benefits of this knowledge from his physician for himself and family.

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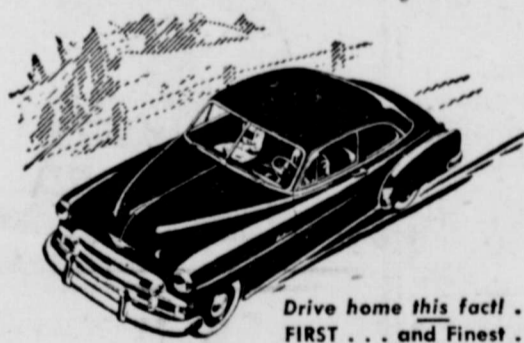
