



#### Coke County Hospital Is Small, But Ranks Among Best in State

Coke County's new hospital is considered one of the best small hospitals in the state. This is the opinion held by representatives of the State Hospital Department who approved the plans and acted in a supervisory manner during its construction.

T. Roy Ainsworth of San Angelo, the architect, is to be commended for his excellent services. Joe B. Tharp and everyone of his sub-contractors did their work well.

Cost of the building (not including equipment) was about \$6,000 per bed. Most hospitals run \$10,000 and some reach a figure of \$15,000 per bed.

The hospital is located three blocks west of the business section of Robert Lee on Eighth Street. It stands near the front of a full block, one-half of which was given to the county by Jack Walker.

Four double rooms and four single rooms are located in the ward wing, making a total of 12 beds. One of the single rooms has been specially arranged for isolation cases and has an adjoining toilet and shower.

Persons entering the hospital find themselves in an attractive reception room equipped with modern chrome upholstered furniture. A door to the west leads into the doctor's offices. Then the emergency operating room, and at the west end of the corridor is the surgical suite which includes both the main operating room and obstetrical room.

On the opposite side of the reception room is the manager's office and the receptionist's desk. A door leads to the corridor where the head nurse's station occupies a position in the center.

The kitchen is located in the northeast corner of the building with the dining room across the corridor. Toilets and storage rooms are also along the east corridor. On the south side of the west corridor are the laboratory, general storeroom and X-Ray departments.

At the head of the corridor leading to the patients rooms are linen and janitor storage space, bath and toilet facilities for patients, a work and utility room, bedpan closet with washer and sterilizer. Also the nursery equipped with four basinettes and an incubator.



## Clinicial Laboratory Is Hospital Feature

Shown here is a corner of the Clinical Laboratory of the new Coke County Hospital. It is equipped to make all kinds of tests except tissue work.

The little black box-like apparatus in the corner is a thermostatically controlled hot water bath. Next with white chrome finish is a photo electric colorimeter for running blood chemistries, and an expensive Bausch-Lomb microscope sets on the bench above the stool.

On the left is an electric refrigerator and next to it on the bench is shown part of the centrifuge, a device which separates solids from liquids through centrifugal force.

It is said the laboratory does much to help a hospital meet its operating expenses. Hospital authorities hope this is true. A laboratory technician with long experience is C. S. Haselden, hospital manager. Dr. J. D. McDaniel's wife is also experienced in this work.





#### The Operating Room Ranks Second to None

Shown in the accompanying picture is the Operating Room, one of the most important departments of a modern hospital.

The operating Room of the Coke County Hospital has been well equipped and compares favorably with facilities provided by the larger medical institu-

The operating table is of the latest design and includes numerous modern improvements. Overhead is the Castle operating room electric lamp, which reduces shadows to a minimum. The lamp is attached to a track and a swivel device makes it adjustable to any angle.

A smaller lamp stands in front of the window on the right and is ready for use in an emergency. It would operate from a storage battery in case the electric power was interrupted. Also near the window is a pump and suction unit and its cabinet.

A metal rack with prongs, near the rear corner of the room, is the sponge rack. During an operation a definite number of sponges are removed from a pack. After its use each sponge is placed on one of the hooks, and an accurate count of all sponges is made before an incision is closed. No chances of having a sponge sewed up inside of a patient at this hospital.

The glass enclosed instrument cabinet sets in the corner and to the left is a blood pressure gague. A sheet covered table is provided for the surgery packs. A smaller table for instruments that are in actual use operates on a swivel and can be swung directly over the patient.

The room is large and walls are finished with tile to within four feet of the ceiling. A smaller room to the right of the entrance provides storage for additional equipment and supplies.

Heavy voltage wire designated as 110-220 and 220 3-phase (4 wires) lead into the new Coke County Hospital, according to J. D. Bullock Electric Co., who had the electric sub-contract.

There is an entirely separate switch and wiring service leading to the X-Ray equipment. Quite a complicated piece of wiring was involved in the signal lights with wires running from each room to the nurses station.

Mr. Bullock has been in the electrical business in San Angelo since 1920. He is a well known contractor and handles all kinds of electrical work. One of his present jobs is the new San Angelo National Bank addition.





## Obstetrical Room At Coke County Hospital

Coke County Hospital's obstetrical room is also well equipped in every detail. The delivery table is adjustable and divided into two parts.

An adjustable focusing lamp is provided and may be moved at will. On the right is the pack and instrument table. The anesthesia table is at the left near the window. It provides a space for needed drugs and supplies.

## Japan Outlaws Communist Party; **Europe Coal-Steel Pact Signed;** U. S. Construction at New High

#### JAPAN: Outlaws Reds

The Japanese Communist party received a serious setback with that government's announcement that the party would be outlawed

in Japan. Observers did not find the move surprising since such action had been hinted and only waited the outcome of the general election which was carried by Japan's Liberal party. The liberals alone stuck to a pro-United States policy in a highly nationalistic campaign.

Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida had announced the action would be taken if there were further acts of violence by Communists. He referred to the attack on five U.S. soldiers at a Communist rally on Memorial Day.

As expected, the Communists tried to blame the action on the American occupation, but Yoshida quickly denied it.

Meanwhile, the Liberal party seemed assured of victory in the election. Despite rains throughout the country, the voting was heavier than expected. Officials said 31.400,-000 voted, or 70 percent of those eligible. About 60 percent had been

Yoshida's strong showing had been expected after his government firmly squelched projected Communist anti-American rallies and a socalled general strike called for elec-

#### COAL-STEEL PLAN:

Unites Six Nations

Britain's labor government has been caught short with the announcement that six European countries have formed a coal-steel alliance.

Observers said it was fairly clear that Britain, struggling to win back | turned against his own country to a high place in world trade, was spy for Russia, wanted the sweet caught by surprise at the move.

The Schuman plan represents a historic surrender of national sovereignty of all the six countries in their economy. The pooled coal and steel industries will be directed by an independent international high authority.

Neutral observers were especially happy over the alliance. It is the first time in history that countries whose differences have caused numerous wars have gotten together to create a community of interests. This, observers contend, should eliminate the cause of wars.

Increased production is also expected from the merger. The total joint production could be far greater than the sum of their separate competitive efforts. It was pointed out, for example, the industrial Ruhr needs French coal and France needs the Ruhr steel but each put a permium on the materials they exchanged with each other.

Although the British have not joined the alliance or made any commitment on the plan, the way has been left open. Observers said it would certainly give the labor government something to think about.

## **BALTIC PLANE:**

Evidence Damning

The United States produced new evidence that the navy patrol plane recently lost in the Baltic was shot down, although the Russians reported they only drove it out to sea.

State department officials said a recovered landing wheel indicated the plane had exploded in mid-air, price cuts that averaged 7 per cent and had possibly lost a wing before it spun into the sea.

The wheel floated because its tire was inflated with air. It was found by a Swedish fishing captain 48 miles off the Coast of Latvia.

A navy expert, Lt. Comdr. M. W. Cagle, exhibited the plane's front landing wheel, and pointed to a lever in a position showing that the wheel was retracted when the plane touch with all sorts of farm procrashed.

Construction in the United States has reached a new high, according to reports by the department of

According to department statistics, construction valued at nearly \$2,000,000,000 was put in place in May. This was ahead of the 1948 and 1949 seasonal peaks.

Home construction accounted for much of the advance, although building costs have risen sharply.

Private construction in May amounted to \$1,400,000,000, an increase of 12 per cent over April and 27 per cent over May of last year. The home building part of that was estimated at \$825,000,000, an increase of 15 per cent over the month and 56 per cent from a year ago.

In the first five months of 1950, the total value of all types of new construction was nearly \$8,100,000,-000, an increase of 21 percent from

#### SUPREME COURT:

Three Decisions

The U.S. supreme court has handed down three decisions in the current civil rights controversy which will have far-reaching reac-

The court held that segregation of Negroes in railroad dining cars violates the Interstate Commerce Act, that Negro students must be admitted to the University of Texas law school because the state does not afford them facilities equal to those for whites, and that Oklahoma had been discriminating against Negro students at its state university law school by segregating them in classrooms and elsewhere on the campus.

The court, however, did not go into the cases as deeply as the justice department desired.

For instance, the justice department argued there can be no such thing as "separate but equal" facilities and treatment. It contended the mere fact a Negro has to use a separate public facility prevents him from having an equal facility. It is just as sensible, the department argued, to say that a thing can be "black but white" as to insist it can be "separate and equal."

Observers point out that had the court gone into the matter as deeply as the department asked and ruled in its favor, there would have been practically nothing left of segregation laws.

Some students of government believe such a ruling would have been a great deal more far-reaching than the passage by Congress of the much debated F.E.P.C.

The court, however, adhered to its long established practice of not determining constitutional issues if other grounds for decisions exist.

## **IOWA ELECTION:**

**Brannan Plan Test** 

The nation watched with interest the final outcome of the primary election in Iowa. And the outcome was what seasoned political observers expected - a final campaign between Albert J. Loveland and Sen. Burke B. Hickenlooper.

There was more to it, however, than just the outcome of a primary election to determine the Democratic and Republican senatorial candidates this fall.

Loveland, former undersecretary of agriculture, campaigned against five other Democrats using the Brannan farm plan as his main weapon.

On the other hand, Senator Hickenlooper is a strong opponent of the plan. He won the Republican nomination easily over two oppon-



### Smallmouth Bass

N NEARLY every section of the United States more and more anglers are joining the hundreds of thousands who have matched wits and muscles with the smallmouth bass. The reason is simple. "Inch for inch and pound for pound, the gamest fish that swims," wrote Dr. James Henshall in his "Book of the Black Bass." That is exactly what sportsmen have decided.

Known to scientists as micropterus dolomieu, sportsmen call him by a number of names -black bass, black perch, bronze back, brown bass, gold bass, little bass, redeye, swago bass and tiger bass. On light tackle the last of these fit about as well as any for he is a fighting fool when hooked.

The smallmouth is really a member of the sunfish family, along with the crappies, rock bass, green sunfish, bluegill, longear sunfish and others. As a rule, our hero is easily separated from his two close relatives, the largemouth black bass, and the spotted or Kentucky black bass, because he has smaller scales and his mouth extends only to the middle of his eye instead of beyond the back edge of the eye. He does not have the black stripe along his sides that causes the other two to be called linesides. Instead, the smallmouth has vertical black blotches or bars of darker color.

The small mouth favors cool, flowing streams and clear lakes. Along with several other fish, it prefers lakes in the northern portion of its range and clear, cool streams in the south-streams with gravel or rock bottom, perferably boulder strewn, with large pools between riffles. It still occupies much of its original range in east central and midwest states.

In the spring, when the water temperature reaches about 60 degrees, the males begin nest building. The male then finds a female and drives her over the nest, where the eggs are laid and fertilized.

If there are more females than males, there may be eggs from two, three, or four females in a nest. The male guards the nest, keeping off intruders and preventing the attacks of small fish on the eggs. The eggs hatch in three or four days and the males continue to care for the young until they are about an inch long. At that time they disperse and are then legitimate prey for any larger fish-including their parents.

Their growth is rapid. They will reach about 3 inches in the first year, 51/2 to 6 inches the second, and 8 or 9 in the third. A small mouth 18 inches long may be anywhere from 7 to 13 years old, depending on his home river and local

conditions. Minnows are the most successful lure for smallmouth in northern lakes, followed by spinners, plugs and worms. Plugs generally take the larger ones. The tendency now is toward smaller blugs.





## Soil Conservation District News

"Madrid sweet clover, a biannual crop, is proving to be an excellent soil conditioner, soil enricher, and soil building crop in the Coke County Soil Conservation District, was the statement made by A. V Sheppard, Work Unit Conservationist, with the Soil Conservation Service. 'The Clover is a legume that is adapted to most hard soils Total 35 minutes 195 inches and is a host for nitrogen fixing bacteria that develop on the root system and take nitrogen from the air and fix it in the soil to be used for future crop production," Sheppard explained.

The clover is a very deep rooted plant that is able to penetrate hard soils and tends to break up plow soles that retard the intake of water during rainfall. The deep root system opens up the soil and allows the water to enter the soil faster during rains which is a very important factor because many of our rains fall in a few minutes.

The following data were collected on D. K. 

#### Washed Eggs

It is harmful to wash eggs, says O. C. Ufford, poultry specialist for the Colorado A. & M. college extension service, because the shell of an egg is porous or full of tiny holes. These are filled with a gelatinous covering that keeps out bacteria. When eggs are washed it dissolves the protective covering and not only removes the dirt but may force some bacteria through the shell where they proceed to spoil the eggs.

#### Water and Fire

Water causes burning grease, fats and oils to spatter violently and thus spreads the flame. Water is not effective on fires involving electrical equipment and short circuits until after the circuit is cut off. In such cases the fire extinguisher is the logical answer.

#### Enamelware



#### Wool Outlook Bright, **Bureau Head Reports** Material Remains Quality Fabric for Human Needs

For the sheep ranchers and the farmers who maintain small flocks, W. F. Fitzgerald, president of the Wool bureau, had a good word when he predicted markets for wool are bound to increase.

Speaking before the National Association of Wool Manufacturers at their annual meeting in New York, he said:

"Barring a national catastrophe, markets for wool, and indeed for all textiles of established service values, is bound to increase. The reasons are fundamental and are to be found in even a casual study of our increasing population, our expanding birth rate, the total

number of people employed and the constantly increasing standards of living of large segments of our population."

FitzGerald went on to point out that an acceptable substitute for wool has not been developed. Wool is still the quality fiber which is best suited for a wide variety of human needs and we are convinced the public shares that opinion, he

#### Needs of Corr.



Corn needs plenty to eat and drink to produce high protein yields.

You can get extra pounds of protein and more bushels per acre, too, with a well-rounded bill of fare based on good soil management. University of Illinois research men proved that in tests on a number of experiment fields.

H. J. Snider of the agronomy staff reports that good soil management increased the corn's protein content by nearly a pound per bushel. Corn grown on well treated land averaged 5.6 pounds of protein per bushel, or about 10 per cent of the total weight. Corn on untreated soil averaged only 4.8 pounds of protein per bushel, or about 8.5 per cent.

The well managed land had the benefit of liming and rotation built around well-fed deep-rooted legumes. The organic matter added by the legumes built good soil structure and tilth, improved the drainage and increased the soil's water holding capacity. That made it easier for corn roots to get at plant nutrients, oxygen and mois-

ture. The fertilizer treatment included phosphate and potash where needed. In soils requiring more nitrogen than the legume crops provided, nitrogen fertilizer helped increase the corn's protein content. Snider says good soil management not only improved the corn's feeding value, but improves vield.



# **Heart Pain Described in Journal**

By Dr. James W. Barton

UNTIL A FEW YEARS AGO a of heart illness: mild, moderate (pressure of pain in chest) was heart pain (angina pectoris), ensidered a heart case. Today angina pectoris is called cardiac (heart) pain.

In "The Canadian Medical Association Journal," Dr. Harold N. Segall, Montreal, states that after studying heart pain for the past 30 years he can repeat the description of this pain as given him by these patients.

Instead of calling it a vise-like pain, as is taught to medical students, the patients described it as a pain under the breastbone (sternum) and as "a sense of weight," "pressure," "pressing," "squeezing," "load on the chest," "burning," "fullness."

The pain in most cases extends to the left arm, but occasionally to right or both arms. In a few cases there is discomfort in upper abdomen and shortness of breath.

#### Campfire Flavors Are Easy to Capture When You Broil Meat Cuts

WHEN YOU LONG for the taste of campfire cookery and still want the convenience of your kitchen, plan some broiled dinners!

Broiling gives an irrestible flavor to meats as well as fruits and veg-



etables to go with the meats. It's a quick method of cooking, too, for, in most cases, the broiler meal takes only 15

minutes to one-half hour to cook. Most homemakers like to plan several broiled dinners for hot weather because they're so quick and appetizing. Furthermore, since meat, vegetables and fruits can be placed on the broiling tray, there's only that single piece of cooking equipment to be washed after dinner, in place of several pots and pans.

To stimulate a real out-of-doors supper several times a week, plan to serve on gay gingham cloth out on the porch or in the garden. The main course, hot and sizzling from the broiler, is easily carried outside.

Select meats for broiling from this list: chopped beef or lamb, sausage, frankfurters, steaks, chicken (broilers), corned beef hash, leftover chopped meat, small pieces of meat on skewers, bacon, sweetbreads, pre-cooked ham slices, lamb chops, bacon or sausage.

Pre-cooked or canned potatoes may be used with the meats, as well as cooked vegetables which need simply to be reheated.

Broiled Lamb Chops Dinner

- (Serves 10) 10 pear halves
- 3 tablespoons melted butter
- 5 tomatoes, halved 1/4 cup chopped onion Salt and pepper
- Parmesan Cheese 10 loin lamb chops (about 1-
- inch thick) 5 teaspoons mint jelly Parsley

Broiled halves of chicken are delightfully brown and juicy and make a delicious main dish when served with whole, browned potatoes and tomato halves. The vegetables are placed in the broiler just a few minutes before the chicken is done.

**H**OW LONG MEATS are to be broiled is entirely a matter of personal preference. In any case, the exterior of the meat should be uniformly browned and he plump and full in appearance.

#### Broiled Chicken

Clean two-pound chickens thoroughly. Split down the back and flatten out by pressing with the hands. Brush skin and underside with butter, then season with salt and pepper. The chicken may first be placed in a hot oven to cook for 15 to 20 minutes, then in the broiler to complete the cooking, another 15 to 30 minutes, depending upon how done one likes it.





DEVOTIONAL READING: Ephesians 3:
14-21.

### **Peevish Prophet**

Lesson for June 25, 1950.

TONAH THOUGHT he knew better than God. When men said, "Be a prophet," Jonah decided to take a long vacation. He took a ship for a far place so far away he thought even God could not follow. When

God said, "Preach to Nineveh," Jonah decided that was the very thing he did not want to do. When God said, in effect, "Be a missionary," Jonah thought he would rather be a tourist. Of all the prophets on record, Jonah



was the peevish one. The remarkable and unique little book of Jonah is perhaps the most misunderstood book in the Bible. Nobody knows how much ink has been wasted on the whale (which, incidentally, was not a whale but a fish!). whereas the real message of Jonah is not about whales at all. It is about taking the message of God to the most unlikely places in the world; it is the story of how the very people who ought to be doing it, sometimes won't do it.

Does God Care?

CONSIDER the good reasons Jonah might have given for not going to Nineveh. They are like the reasons people give nowadays for not believing in foreign missions.

Reason number one: The Ninevites were mean people. So they were. Assyria, of which Nineveh was the capital city, had done, and would do, Israel more harm than any other enemy she had.

The Ninevites were an unscrupulous, greedy people. They knew no law but force. They spread by violence into many a country. They were the nation nobody loved.

Should the message of God be given to such a city? Jonah thought not; God said it should.

And of course, God was right. If the message of God had been sent only to peoples and nations that "deserved" such a favor, God's messengers would all have stayed at home.

Too Far From God

REASON number two: Nineveh is a long way off. Indeed it was. To reach Nineveh, Jonah would have to pass through at least a dozen other cities, all of which no doubt needed preachers. Were there not enough people at home who needed preaching? Of course there were . . . Only Jonah did not preach to them.

This is often too true. People will protest about foreign missions; why send preachers and doctors and teachers and money so far away? Aren't there plenty of heathen right at home? Of course; but you won't often find the objector to foreign missions doing much about it.

Judge The World

REASON number three: (This sounds like a silly reason, but Jonah actually put it forward-Jonah 4:2.) God is too good! What was the use of preaching to Nineveh, Jonah wanted to know, if God was going to be gracious and not destroy the city with fire from the sky?

If God is good and merciful, why should we bother about sending missionaries anywhere? Won't he save every one anyhow? Isn't God too good to judge the world?

Jonah overlooked the fact that God had mercy on the Ninevites because they repented. Nowhere in the Bible is there any encouragement to believe that God has mercy on the unrepentant. To all who turn to him, God is gracious; and the job of the missionary, whatever else he does, is to persuade people to turn to God.

The great tragedy of Judaism is the tragedy of Jonah: God wanted his people to win the world; but they became ingrown, they ceased even to wish to be a missionary faith. Shall the same tragedy overtake Christianity?
