Naturally, any kind of water problem is particulary distressing to people living on the High Plains because we have no dependable water supply and our underground water level keeps dropping right on down at the rate of from one four feet per year depending the locality. From all indication farmers must submit to metered wells within the next decade or so and if this simple mathematical progression keeps up it is possible that irrigation as we know it, here will be either sharply curtailed or ended within the next forty or fifty years. All this is speculation naturally,, but if a

man has \$5,000 in the bank, makes \$50 a week and spends \$150 a week, it is simple logic that he will be out of money within a year. Such is the case with the underground irrigation water. Despite the emphasis given salt-water conversion and the efforts towards water conservation being made by state and federal agencies water is not being des-

troyed. Water shortages exist in areas not because the world is running out of water but because it is poorly used or is not in the right places. A farmer who lets his tail water gush off down a barditch is not destroying water he is simply removing that much water from the possibility of use by himself or his neighbors. It will evaporate or seep into the ground but it won't return to the underground reservoir in measurable santities in the farmer's lifetime.

The hydraulic cycle - which means evaporation of water from the seas, its forming clouds, falling on land as rain and returning to he seas as runoff or through other ways - causes tremendous anounts of water to fall on the land but pitifully little is retained by man for his use, especially in his country. Rainfall here is us-ually collected in lakes where it evaporates back into the atm phere where it is returned to th seas or moves furber inland w other water vapors to cause other rains. The only hope for reclaim

the High Plains by the thousands. Let's point out some things that happen to our water supply here on he plains - a supply, incidentally, that is much leaner than most of us suspect. A normal in rigation well pumps 1,440,000 galons of water a day. Someone has estimated that American irrigation uses about 80 billion gallons a day. It has also been esti-mated that West Texans use 140 times as much water daily as is returned to their supplies.

Individuals on the farms and in towns of the Panhandle use a lot of water, too. An average person uses more than 50 gallons of water a day in his normal routine. For instance a ten-minute shower uses 50 gallons of water and the person who is fastidious about his bodily hyviene and takes a bath once a day will use a lot more than the man who bathes just enough to stay socially acceptable. Each flush of a commode requires four gallons. A dripping faucet can waste ten to twelve gallons a day and washing our hands can require as much as two gallons.

Several hundred gallons of water per day go into furnishing each us with electricity, foodstuffs and living accessories. All of this is slowly but surely

A long-range solution to the water problem demands that a huge water transportation system be developed that would make the Canadian River water system many area towns look like child's play. These must be virtually rivers made by man that will gain their water from either trapped rainfall or from de-salted sea water. It's coming to that some day.
