

Dimmitt Bobcats Win District Championship

The Dimmitt Bobcats wound up a blistering two-game series with Tulia Thursday night and emerged District champions for the second time in two years. Dimmitt won, 71-62. Thursday night's game was almost anti-climatic to the hard-fought Tuesday night game which saw the Bobcats and Hornets go into two overtime periods. The win Thursday night throws the Bobcats into a bi-district game against Abertathy, probably at Plainview Monday or Tuesday.

It was too much Coffey and too much fouling as the decimated (three men fouled off) Hornet team fell before the Bobcats in front of a capacity crowd at Tulia. Junior Coffey scored a fantastic 41 points to lead the Bobcats in their victory. Second man down was Mike Calvert who made ten points. Coffey hit better than 70 percent of his field goal attempts.

It is distressing to learn that many Castro County farmers are holding back and not contributing the pittance of grain asked for by the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. The cooperation this organization is receiving is much less than it deserves. This association — along with the cotton growers, wheat growers and other major farm groups — represents the only way the national farm economy can ever break away from government supports and controls.

We can expect a farmer who wants his security guaranteed by the government to be indifferent to such organizations. Who, such a farmer might think, needs some organization to beat the tub price, when he can get a guaranteed price from the government.

There are many fallacies to this line of thinking. Most of us agree at government price supports are necessary until a better system can be devised — either by the secretary of agriculture or by farmers themselves. We will pay heed to anyone who promises a call for the arbitrary discontinuance of government controls as socialistic and opposed to free enterprise. We have to have price supports or the whole economy would come down around our ears. But that doesn't mean we should have them always, or at a better situation would not be a desirable goal.

Farmers should be thinking about and working for a long-range increase in the price he can demand for his products through opening up new markets. He could look upon the government price supports as only a temporary means to help him stay financially stable until he can find better price on the open market.

While we campaigned for the Democratic Party cause and advocated all its ideals, it always gave us a jolt to hear a farmer declare that "Sure, I'm going to be Democratic — I ain't made dime since Eisenhower's been office." We heard this all too often and it's not right. It is probably true that the Democrats will stitute higher price supports high may conceivably serve to lower production and raise market prices, but that's not the point. No farmer, or American, should vote for a political party because it thinks one will give him a higher price support or subsidy than the other. This is a repugnant ought and we hope it does not dictate the motives of the average farmer.

Whether grain, wheat, cotton, same, peanut or other, organizations do any immediate good is at the point. We think they do, it more important are the farmers involved who want to use the existing time given them by the government price support program to try and find new markets for their products so they can get out of government control and on the open market. The men who work up these organizations are active men. They are not passively waiting from year to year hoping the government will "do something" about the falling farm prices and meddling in farmer's affairs.

The government is under no obligation to support farm prices, any more than it is its obligation to guarantee a minimum wage to labor. The government does this to try and keep an economic balance and keep skilled working people free from forced poverty. The government would be glad to stop supporting farm prices if it were possible.

The major hope for removing these supports comes from farm organizations like the grain sorghum producers who endeavor to find new markets for their products at home and abroad. It is quite possible that agricultural products would be on their own in a free market by now if the Republican administration had maintained the high price supports of the previous Democratic agriculture department. By lowering these supports the government fostered ever increasing production on a land scale that made supplies so great that any hope of returning to a free market was obliterated.

But that's crying over spilled milk and to our own way of thinking the only path to a free farm economy is the laborious search for new markets and new uses for farm products. Without a corresponding increase in production it is likely that normal population

Annual Soils Fertility Day Set For February 28 at High School

Plans are being completed this week for the annual Castro County Soils Fertility Day to be held February 28 in the Dimmitt High School auditorium from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Farmers attending will be treated to a free meal by the Castro County Chamber of Commerce and Dimmitt Lions Club during the noon intermission. The day-long program itself is under the general sponsorship of the Running Water Soil Conservation District, the Extension Service and Chamber of Commerce.

Dan True, area weather specialist will give a short talk on the weather during the noon period. Cotton Seedling Diseases will be the subject of a talk by Billy G. Gunter, area agronomist from the Extension Service in Lubbock.

Dr. Tom Longnecker, superintendent of the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway will speak on flame drying and cultivating.

Harvey Walker of the Lubbock Experiment Station at Lubbock will speak on fertilizer placement. His appearance here was not absolutely confirmed by early Thursday, although it is expected he will appear.

A brucellosis program for Castro County will be the topic of Elvis Burch, local farmer and rancher.

George W. Pfiffenberger, manager of Plains Cotton Growers, will speak on Agriculture Programs and Policies.

Irrigated Pasture will be the subject of a talk by Jack Douglas of the Soil Conservation Service. The day's program will be completed by a talk on the sugar beet situation and production by Daniel J. Larson, Castro County farmer.

Soils Fertility Day is held once a year to assist farmers in Castro County in keeping abreast of the latest in agriculture processes and trends.

Grain Sorghum Producers Plan Meeting Monday

A meeting of all milo producers in the area has been scheduled for Monday, February 23 at 7:30 p.m. in the Dimmitt High School Auditorium.

The meeting, called by the Castro County Grain Sorghum Producers Association, will feature talks by executives of the USDA Department of Agriculture and of the Association.

Speakers will be Bill Nelson, executive vice-president of the USDA Feed Grains Council; Frank Moore, president of the National Grain Sorghum Producers Association; Elbert Harp, secretary-treasurer; J.C. (Sam) Gilbreath, director; and R.G. Peeler, Hereford farmer.

Nelson has been to Japan to study the grain export situation there, and Peeler has been to Europe for the same purpose. The five men listed here are considered outstanding experts on grain sorghum production and marketing.

All farmers are invited to attend and hear a complete discussion on the grain sorghum situation in the United States.

Collision Injures Dimmitt Youth

Richard Jackson, 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Jackson, was injured about 6:20 Tuesday afternoon when his bicycle collided with a pickup driven by Frank Castaneda at the intersection of Haisell and Northwest Third Sts. Richard was knocked unconscious in the accident and spent the night in the Castro County Hospital. He was released Wednesday free of serious injuries.

Witnesses said Richard was riding his bicycle when he approached the intersection. He looked back momentarily and did not see the pickup. City Marshal W. W. Jones said Mr. Castaneda could not have avoided the accident under the circumstances. However he was issued a ticket for driving without a license and operating a vehicle with faulty brakes.

225 Soil Samples Made in County

He was a member of the Methodist Church and at the time of his death was a salesman for the Finlarler Hardware Company in Hobbs. He had been in ill health for several years.

Country Club Drive Gain Recent New Momentum

At a recent meeting of the membership of the Dimmitt Country Club, plans were made to complete the club project started two years ago.

When the club first organized the agreement with the members was that the full membership quota would be secured before any contracts were entered into by the club. According to club workers who have been contacted with the project since the beginning, a decided slump followed an initial enthusiastic response to the membership drive. Memberships became difficult to sell due to poor crop prospects and general economic conditions at the time.

It was decided at the membership meeting that to develop a positive program eventually resulting in the completion of the country club project, all members would be given an opportunity to approve one of three methods of procedure or to withdraw from the organization. The three options being decided upon by members which would authorize officials to proceed are the purchase of the club site and either start construction of the club house and swimming pool or start construction of the golf course when signers of either option were sufficient enough in number to complete that portion of the project. The third option was for members who would favor either the first or second option so long as the project was begun.

The new board met in the Community Room of the First State Bank Wednesday afternoon at 5 o'clock to elect officers and to make initial plans for the completion of the membership drive and to start detailed work necessary to perfect the organization. The board also elected its officers.

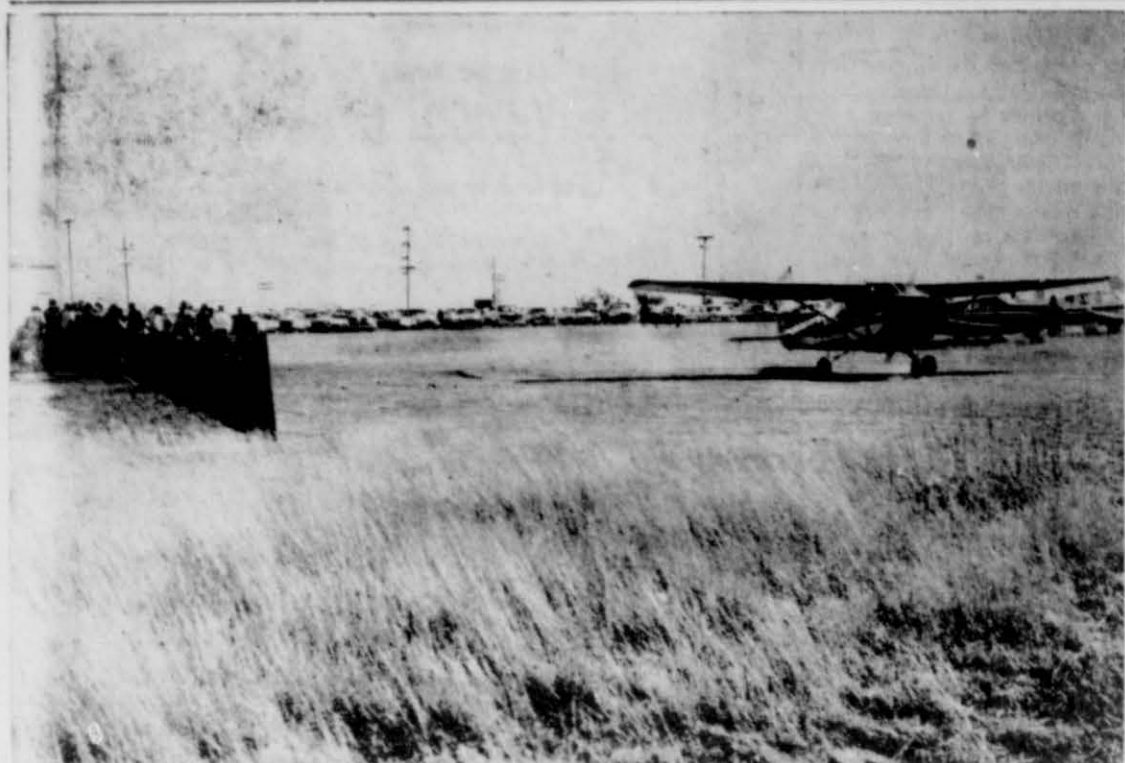

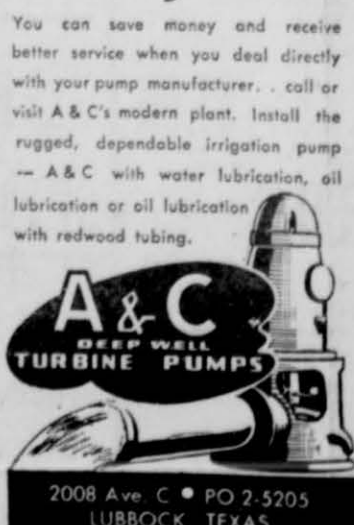

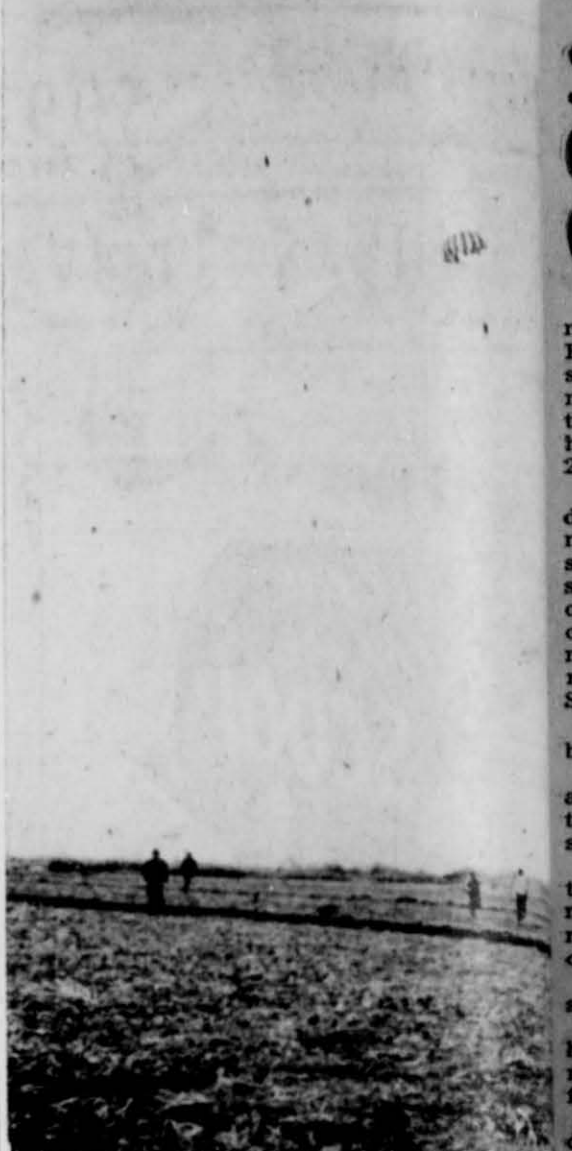
