





## Moritz Is Named March Of Dimes District Chairman

AUSTIN, Nov. 15, (special) ... Wallace A. Moritz, San Angelo businessman and civic leader, was appointed area campaign advisor for nine Texas counties in the 1951 March of Dimes campaign, Ed Stewart of Abilene, and General Walter Krueger, San Antonio, state chairman, announced today.

As campaign coordinator for the nine National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis county chapters Moritz will work with Coke, Concho, Irion, Mason, Menard, Runnels, Schleicher, Sterling and Tom Green Counties in their January 15-31, 1951, fund raising activities.

In Coke County, Moritz will work with A. J. Bilbo of Robert Lee, who has been selected as campaign director for the county campaign.

Accepting the appointment by Stewart and Krueger, Moritz noted increasing incidence of infantile paralysis in Texas as a challenge to conduct a stronger campaign. By October 28, he said, Texas had 458 more cases of the disease than during the same period last year.

The objective of the campaign, which is the National Foundation's only fund raising activity, is to enable Texas to take care of its own polio patients and pay its share of the national programs of research, epidemic aid and professional education of medical personnel, Moritz asserted. He noted that in the past three years Texas has received \$257,000 more for patient care than it has sent in to the national organization, thus making no contribution to these programs.

A pre-campaign meeting for the counties named above will be held in San Angelo at 10 a. m. November 22 for planning purposes.

Owner of the Wallace A. Moritz portrait studios, Moritz resides at 1315 South Madison Street in San Angelo, having moved to the city in 1940. He is a member of the Shrine and Kiwanis Club and is the father of three children, two girls and a boy. In 1950 he was campaign director for the March of Dimes in Tom Green County.

## School Board Takes Up Important Matters

The matter of buying the old Planters Gin in Robert Lee was discussed at the monthly meeting of the Board of Education Monday night. The gin has not been used for a number of years. It is a huge structure and contains a large amount of good lumber and metal sheeting.

Owners of the property at Sweetwater have set a price on the material which would be available if the building was torn down. The material would be used by the school district for a FFA sheep barn, addition to the bus garage and other purposes. No action has been taken on the proposal.

The board voted to purchase new white uniforms for women employed in the lunch room. Each of the four ladies will receive five uniforms. Supt. B. C. Goodwin said the state recommended such action. About 200 meals are being served daily at the lunch room. A special Thanksgiving dinner will be prepared for Wednesday, Nov. 22.

Arrival of two new school buses is expected this month. One will be used on the Sanco route and the other, a smaller bus, will be operated by Mrs. Finis Harmon.

The school district has purchased a gasoline tank and pump from Bon Spoonts and will move the equipment to the bus garage. After it is ready for operation gasoline will be purchased wholesale. El Higgins will be in charge of servicing the buses and his salary was advanced to \$125 per month.

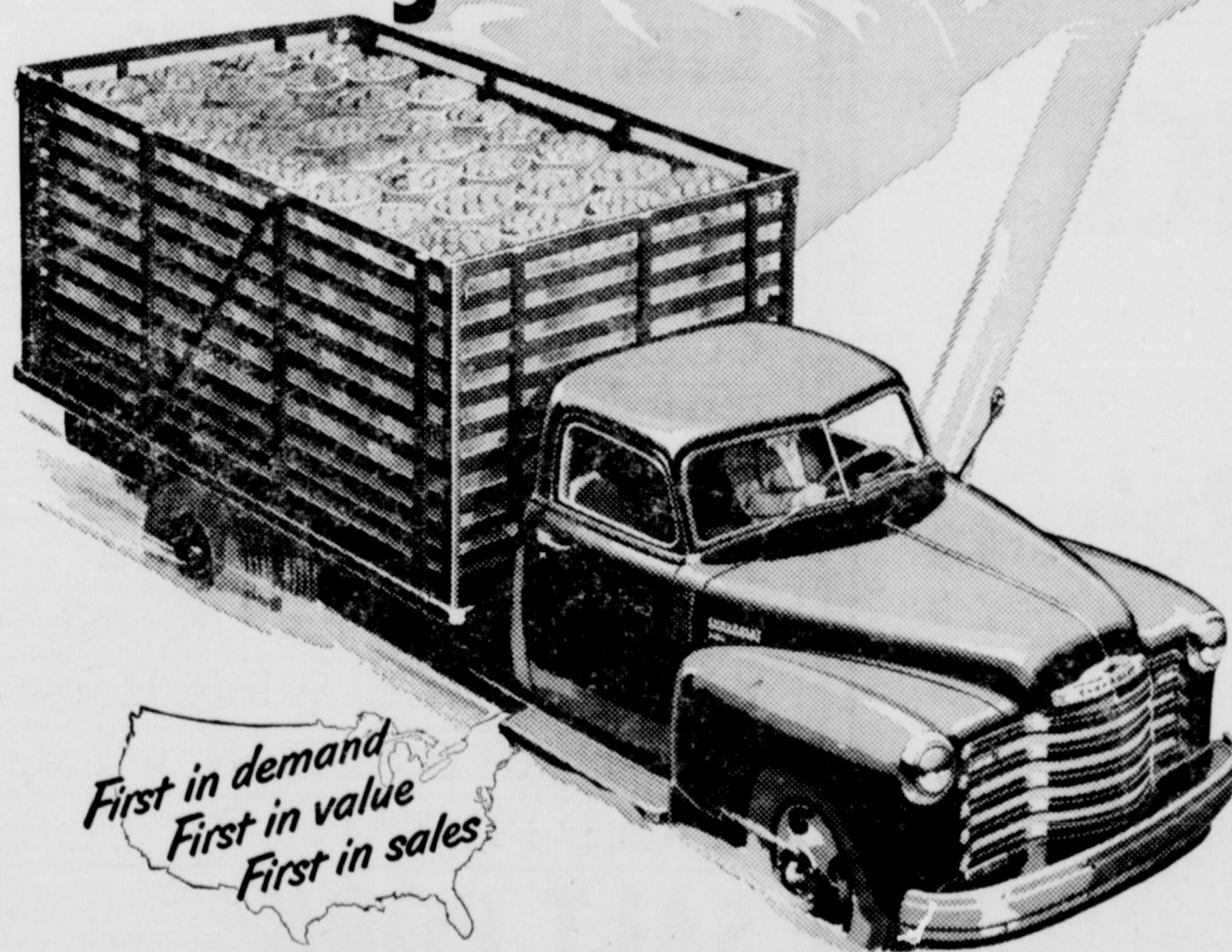

## Canvass Reveals Four GOP Ballots

Three hundred Coke county residents cast ballots in the general election Tuesday, Nov. 7. The turnout was only 20 per cent of the 1,500 votes cast in the July primary. There were no contests for local offices, but a full state ticket of Republican candidates appeared on the ballot.

Four Republican votes were cast in Coke county—two at Sanco, one at Ft. Chadbourne and a voter at Silver cast his ballot for a couple of Republican candidates for state office.

Gov. Allan Shivers received 296 votes in Coke, with only one vote cast for his Republican opponent, Currie. Other GOP candidates for state office received 3 votes.

The result on county candidates

was about the same, ranging from 297 to 299 votes for the principal offices. Weldon Fikes was elected county clerk. He is the only new county official to take office next January.

R. S. Crum, justice of the peace, and V. H. Simpson, constable, were re-elected to their respective offices in Precinct 1. Each received 58 votes. In Precinct 2 Justice A. E. Bell and Constable George Wrinkle were re-elected with 100 votes each.

Official canvass of the ballots took place at the Commissions Court session here Monday.
