Fire Destroys Old Landmark

Only blackened walls remain of the old Harris ranch house which was gutted by fire Sunday evening. Located on high ground a mile southeast of Robert Lee, the place had served as a landmark for nearly three quarters of a century.

Origin of the blaze discovered a half hour before dark is unknown. However, many trespassers visited the vacant property and prowled through the spacious rooms and hallways. The fire department used several tanks of water on the blaze and saved a nearby outbuilding in which a quantity of feed was stored.

The house was built by the late L. B. Harris sometime in the early 80's. It was headquarters for the family's large ranch holdings and the Harris children were born there.

Native burned brick were used in constructing the massive walls which were 18 inches thick. Lumber was hauled from San Antonio and Mexican laborers were employed. The house had four large rooms on the ground floor and four upstairs rooms. There were six fireplaces and hardwood floors throughout.

By the turn of the century the Harris family had moved to San Angelo and later the big house and several hundred acres of land were acquired by the Lock family. The late Dr. F. K. Turney purchased the property 25 years ago.

He spent quite a sum for repairs and made it his home for a short time. For a number of years the house has not been occupied, but some old pieces of furniture remained in the building. The land is leased to Frank McCabe & Son.

Sun Brannan 13 Flows 103 Barrels

During its official 24-hour test the past week Sun Jewell Brannan No. 13 flowed 103 barrels of oil and 54 barrels of water, after being treated with 5,000 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 1,769:1.

No. 13 Brannan was completed in open hole bottomed at 6,373 feet after topping the reef at 6,044 feet.

Sun J. S. Walker No. 3 was drilling at 2,079 feet in shale.

Also southwest of Silver Sun No. 13 C. E. Mathers was in shale and sand at 5,945 feet.

Two miles south of the river at Silver Sun No. 1 Ralph Harris Estate was drilling at 5,849 feet in shale and sand.

In the Millican field west and north of Edith Sun No. 8 G. W. Davidson was drilling in shale at 5,416 feet.

Sun F. S. Price A-3 was 5,171 feet in shale.

Sun No. 1 Eunice Paramore, wildcat in southeast corner Nolan county, set pipe at a depth of 7,050 feet and will perforate in a section identified as ~~Credo~~ lime.

Notes From The Oil Field

Union Oil Company's No. 1 City of Robert Lee was drilling ahead Thursday below 4,300 feet. Operators cored for nearly 100 feet to 4,165 feet. Most of the recovery was shale and shaley lime and sand. There were no oil shows.

Operators announced yesterday they will deepen to at least 5,200 feet.

The test is being made on city waterworks property a mile east of Robert Lee. The city-owned tract includes 240 acres.

Spartan Drilling Co. No. 1. L. E. Smith, 14 miles southeast of Robert Lee, was drilling Thursday below 4,800 feet.

Amerada No. 1 Frank McCabe, wildcat 3 miles northwest of Silver, was drilling ahead at 7,150 in Pennsylvanian lime. A 4-hour drillstem test was made from 6,910 to 6,985 feet. Gas was at the surface in 50 minutes. Recovery was 1,260 feet of gas-cut mud and water with a slight show of oil, and 3,690 feet of salt water.

Humble No. 1 E. H. Schuch on the divide south of Robert Lee has been shut in after extensive tests of the Strawn through perforations from 6,418 to 6,430 feet. Recovery on a 20-hour swabbing test was 13 barrels of oil and 106 barrels of salt water.

Milk Used as Plant Food in Experiment Scientists Report Milk Benefits Some Flowers

Montana State college scientists report milk is as good as some flowers and vegetables as for babies.

The use of milk in horticulture, particularly in greenhouse operations, is new and still in the development stage. But many growers in the Pacific northwest already are reaping benefits.

Commercial flower producers say milk makes petunias grow faster,

last longer and bear larger and more brilliant blooms. It improves the color of roses, cinerarias and chrysanthemums. There are exceptions, including poinsettias and carnations.

Milk-fed vegetables also do much better than those grown under ordinary conditions.

The scientists reported the milk was fed either in dry or diluted fluid form. Further experiments with milk as a plant food are necessary before it is out of the development stage.

Iowa Farm Earns \$4.50 Per Acre Each Month

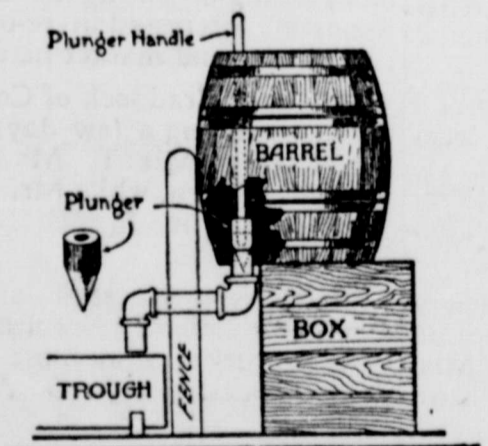
The average Iowa acre is earning between \$4.50 and \$5.00 a month, cash, the Iowa development commission reports. Which means that the average 160-acre farm, under good management, is bringing in \$768, gross per month.

Last year Iowa farmers made \$59.40 for each of the 34 1/2 million acres in farms in the Hawkeye state. That figures out \$4.95 per month, per acre, or \$495 per month for each 100 acres of Iowa land being farmed.

In the first six months of 1950—the leaner half of the farmer's year—Iowa farm income came to \$27 per acre, or \$4.50 per month, per acre. That still is \$450 a month for every 100 acres of farm land.

The commission hastened to repeat that the figure is gross income. Out of it the farmer must pay for power and machinery, labor, feed, feeder stock and breeding stock, before he arrives at his own salary.

Slop Storage Tank



On a farm where there are many hogs to feed ideas that will save labor usually are appreciated. The storage tank for hog slop, shown in the above illustration, has been used on a number of farms successfully. Materials needed include two pieces of 3-inch pipe 6 inches long, one piece of 3-inch pipe 12 inches long and two 3-inch elbows and assemble them as shown in the illustration. Mount the barrel on a box 30 inches high, placed close to the fence so that the pipe may go through into the feeding trough. Make a plunger out of soft wood.

Soil Conservation District News

Grass Fires Become A Major Hazard

Grass fires have become a major hazard to the ranchers in Coke County Soil Conservation District was the statement made by W. E. Burns, member of Board of Supervisors. Each and every one should be very careful with matches, cigar and cigarette butts, camp fires. A lighted match or a cigarette butt carelessly thrown down could cost a ranch operator lots of money by burning off the grass that he has grown, Burns pointed out.

The burning off of a range has such bad effects on the ranch operators as destroying his feed, destroying the grass litter on the soil surface so necessary in a long time range conservation plan, burning up valuable grass seed produced, causes soil erosion and ex-

celerated water loss during rainfall, Burns added.

If a ranch operator loses the grass grown, it will be necessary that he put a much larger feed bill into his livestock until he can grow some more grass, Burns went on.

Be Careful With Fire

J. N. Taylor, who farms five miles north of Bronte, and is a member of the Fort Chadbourne conservation group, has completed a soil and water conservation plan. The plan was developed to treat each acre according to its needs. The plan included such practices as constructing channel type terraces, controlling outside water, seeding cover crops, and seeding pasture grasses.

A 4000 cubic yard ranch pond was staked last week on W. C. Shamblin's ranch located three miles southwest of Blackwell. The pond was designed to give Shamblin permanent livestock water. It was located to give better

distribution of grazing of his livestock and prevent trampling and soil erosion around the watering places.

Three miles of level broad base terraces were completed on D. K. Glenn's farm located one and one half miles south of Bronte. The terrace system is a part of Glenn's complete coordinated soil and water conservation program that he is applying as a district co-operator with the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

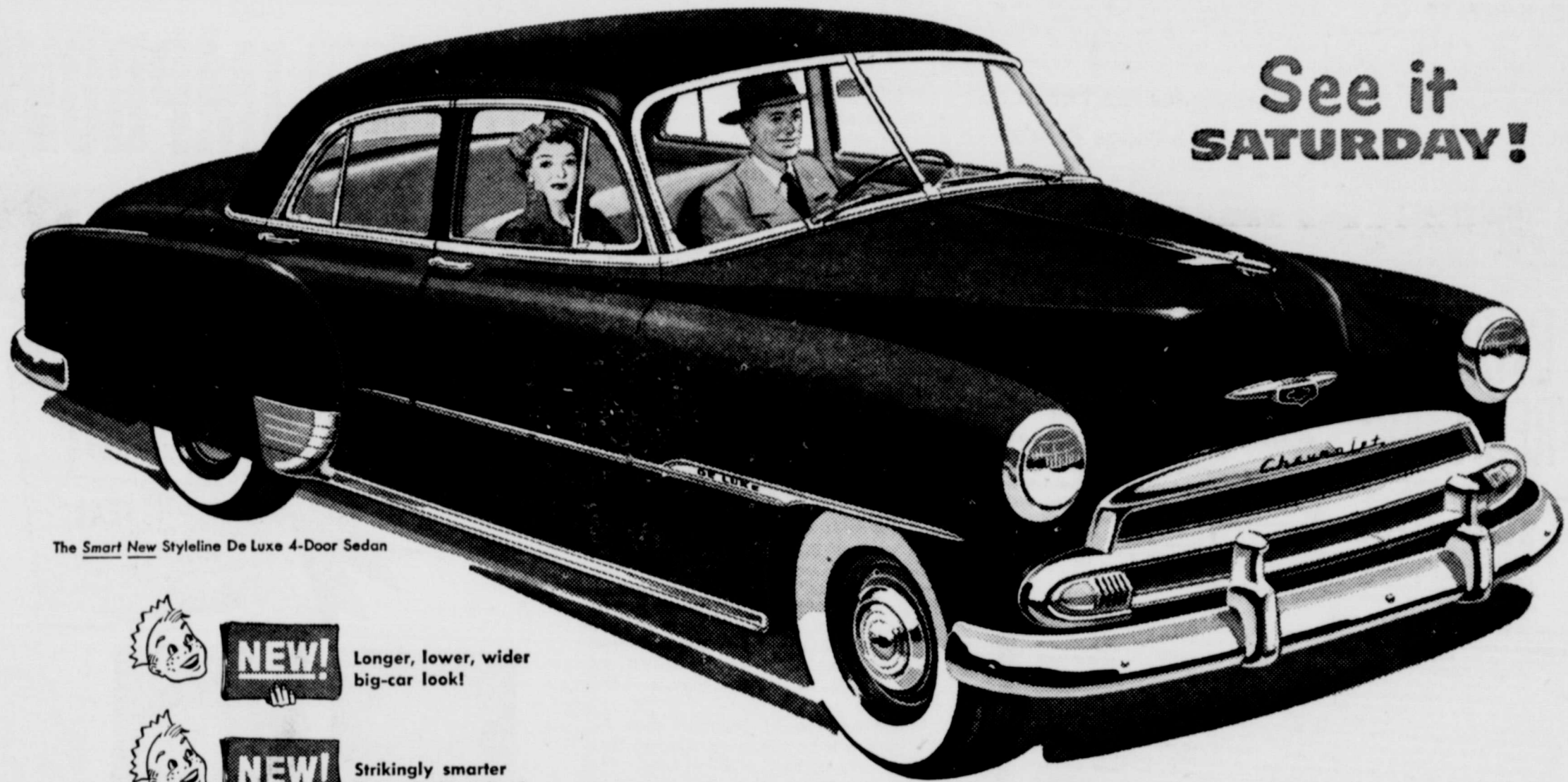

Snow Ring

There are almonds, citron and currants between the braids of this coffee cake. The bread itself is wonderfully rich and good—made with eggs and butter. Mrs. Bockstahler suggests that it "may be decorated for seasonal holidays as desired, but is delicious by itself for any occasion."

Makes one large coffee cake.
Bake at 350° F. for 25 to 30 minutes.
Dissolve 1 cake compressed yeast (or 1 package dry granular yeast) in 2 tablespoons lukewarm water. Add 1 cup scalded milk, cooked to lukewarm. Let Rise in warm place (85° to 90° F.) until light, about 30 min. Cream 1/2 cup butter (half shortening may be used) with 1 cup confectioners' sugar. Beat in 1 egg, 1 egg yolk and 1 1/2 teaspoons salt. Add to risen yeast mixture. Blend in 2 1/2 cups sifted Pillsbury's Best Enriched Flour. Beat for 2 minutes. Let Rise in warm place about 30 minutes. Divide dough into three parts. Roll each part between floured hands to make strips about 18 inches long. Lay dough on floured board and flatten slightly. 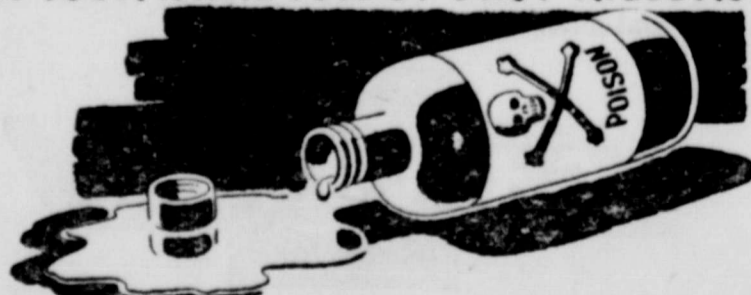

TRUMAN:

Champions Fair Deal

President Truman held a press conference and declared—in the face of G.O.P. claims that the November election had killed his fair deal—that he would continue to press for adoption of his whole program as long as he was president.

If the Republican party thought their victory had taken any of the starch out of the President they were disappointed. He said he would present his full program to the 82nd congress when it convened in January.

To the surprise of everyone present at the press conference he did not seem disturbed by Republican gains in congress. He brushed off his reverses as normal in a non-presidential year. He added that practically all the Republican victories could be traced to local situations. Most observers were inclined to agree with him in that respect.

Then the President got down to some definite statement:

Secretary of State Dean Acheson is going to keep his job—period.

General Douglas MacArthur reports that American troops in Korea have plenty of clothing.

Surveys are still going on to determine whether price and wage controls are necessary. They'll be imposed as soon as there is need for them, but he doesn't think the time has come.

He could be convinced this country should send an ambassador to Franco Spain, but he hasn't been convinced so far.

He doesn't agree with Taft's recent statement that higher taxes could lead to inflation.

There will be further conversations on the proposed Japanese peace treaty within a few weeks.

PROFITS LEVY

Battle Shapes Up

From all indications a severe battle is shaping up over President Truman's proposed \$4 billion excess profits tax. The tax bill in all probability will be presented to the "lame duck" session of congress but the President has no assurance that it will get approval, especially in the senate.

If the proposal fails in the "lame duck" session and is presented in the 82nd congress, observers believe Republican strength will show itself for the first time and a great many changes will be written into the bill.

As of the moment, the U. S. chamber of commerce branded the tax "un-American" and urged congress to cut Federal nondefense spending by at least \$8 billion instead of approving the levy.

A Republican substitute for the bill was vetoed in the house ways and means committee. Democrats on the committee criticized the GOP proposal as one that would hit small business and favor corporations with income swollen by the defense program.

The President's plan calls for a tax of 75 per cent on excess profits of corporations, with the four-year period 1946-49 used as a yardstick to determine what profits are abnormal.

A barrage of other protests against the levy was received by the house ways and means committee.

All this would indicate that no action will be taken on the bill this year although it will be ready for consideration. What the new congress will do about the proposed tax is anybody's guess.

The battle will be bitter and may have a great influence on the 1952 presidential election.

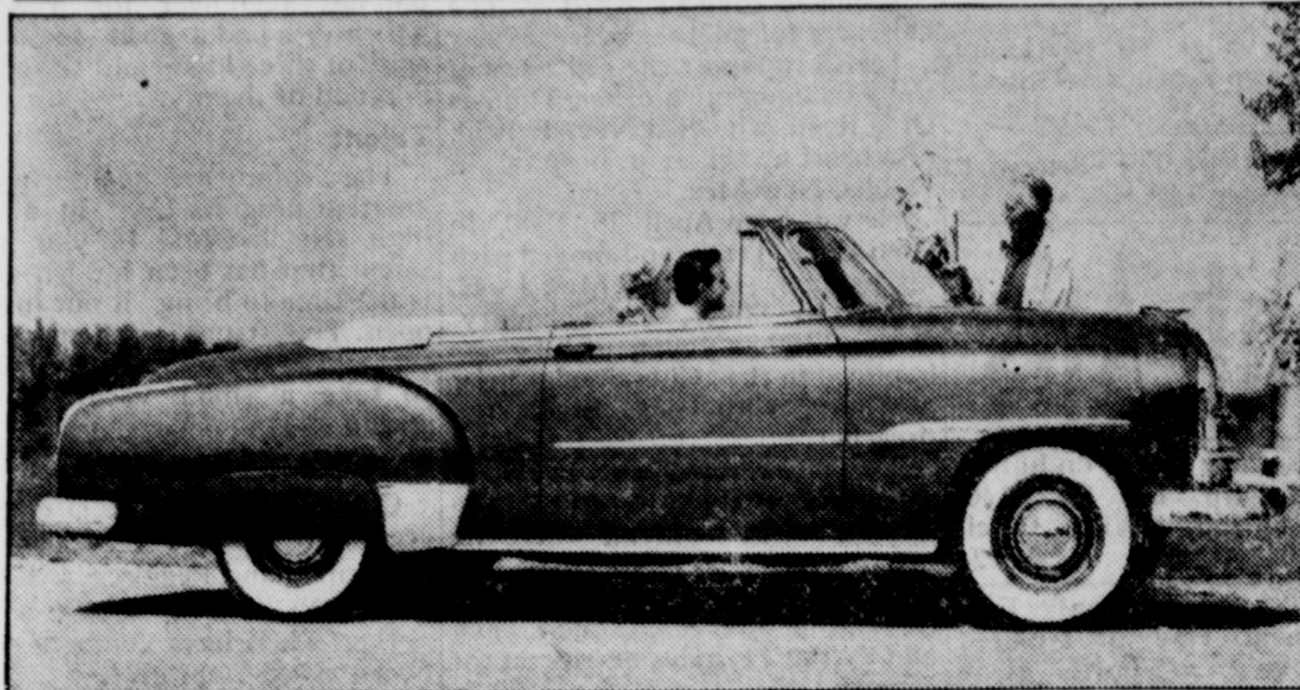

Sharing Our Faith

Lesson for December 10, 1950

SCRIPTURE: Acts 8:1-13; 18:1-7; I Corinthians 9:16-17; II Corinthians 5:17-20; Philippians 1:12-18; 2:12-18.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Romans 1:8-17.

A COMMON sight in cities of ancient times was the "libation." Statues of gods or goddesses stood at every prominent corner, in every yard; they were as numerous as billboards today. Before one of these statues some one would be pouring out wine from a cup or goblet, an offering of thanksgiving or dedication. Saint Paul even used the libation as a figure of speech to describe himself. My life, he said to his friend Timothy, is being poured out—there was not much left of it. But all of it, every drop, would be poured out as an offering to God.

Miser of Life or Sinner?

PAUL was no miser of life. If life was a full cup, it was not a cup with a tight lid, not like one of your grandmother's jars of very special preserves to be saved and saved but never used. Paul was a spender of life. Whatever God had given him was to be poured out, not to be saved.

There is something in every one's cup of life; something that spoils if kept too long, something fragrant and beautiful when poured out in service. The miser of life finds that life at last turns sour on him. The spender of life finds that as he has given, in the same measure it will be given him.

Faith Can't Be Hoarded

ONE very important part of the Christian's life is high-lighted for us in this week's Scripture: his faith. Indeed, faith ought not to be a part of life for the Christian. Faith is no more a "part" of life than sunshine is a part of the out-of-doors. Without the sunshine there might as well not be any out-of-doors. So without faith the Christian's life would be mere existence.

The question is: What do we do with our faith? Do we keep it for ourselves alone or do we pass it on?

Last summer a man tried to get a grocery store to take back 100 pounds of sugar which he had laid up during World War II. He had hoarded it till it was hard as rock and he could not use a pound of it. (The grocery would not take it back, and it served him right.) Faith is like that. It is sweet and good — but only if we use it and share it, not if we keep it.

What Is Sharing Faith?

SHARING your faith means helping others to have a faith at least as strong as your own. All around us there are persons who have no faith at all. They are discouraged, blue, bewildered, at loose ends—in the sad old phrase, they are lost. Sharing your faith means sharing it with just such people.

With some things, the more you give away the less you have left; but the arithmetic of religion is different. The more you give away, the more you have. Shared faith is living faith.

talk about it. A person can "give a testimony" in a prayermeeting, and share faith that way; but this is not the only way. A person who merely talks about faith is a little like a gardener who is proud of his own garden and brags on it, but never helps his neighbors with theirs.

How Can We Do Every Day?

REMEMBER, what we are really trying to share when we "share the gospel" or "share Christ" is not an argument, a set of propositions. The big thing is not arguing other people into becoming Christians.

Very few persons have ever become Christians because some one talked them into it. Talk has its place, and every Christian should be eager to say a good word for Jesus Christ at every chance. But good words for Jesus have their best effect when they come from a life that is really His.

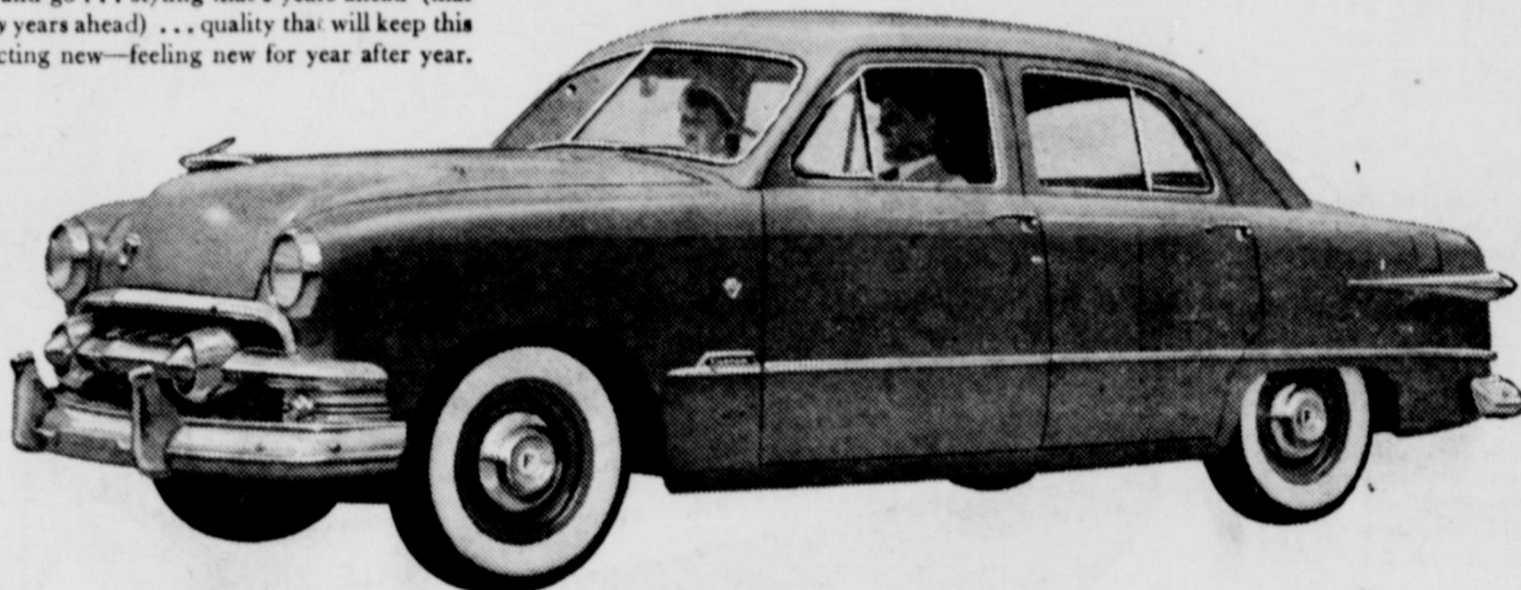

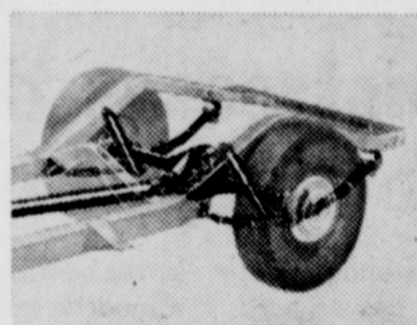

Impact of Election

WHILE THERE will be comparatively few new faces in the 82nd congress and the Democrats will maintain "paper" control of both houses, the result of the recent election may be far-reaching in its impact.

These factors may be considered: (1) With a presidential election coming up in two years the Republican leadership actually did not want control of the 82nd congress; (2) Democrat leadership has been warned and forewarned concerning the issues to which the American people object; (3) Although Dean Acheson, the day after election, denied vehemently that he would resign as secretary of state, there is a persistent rumor here that he may quit, which will involve an extensive cabinet shake-up; (4) Despite the prophecies of the victory of Senator Taft in Ohio, there is bound to be a clash in the Republican ranks over leadership of the party in the senate, and (5) it is evident Democratic policies will move over closer to the conservative side with every indication that the 82nd congress will be an anti-administration congress.

Prior to the 1948 election the Republicans found that performance, instead of promises, was a difficult feat, and as a result their control of the 80th congress was a factor in the Truman victory in that campaign. For this reason the GOP leadership believes their best position prior to 1952 is the minority in the congress where they will be free to act without the responsibility of making a record.

The GOP leadership, therefore, is elated over the election results for the reason that a definite Republican trend is indicated which puts them in position to go on from there in 1952. At the same time, the voters in the home towns throughout the country indicated in no uncertain terms they took to heart the fight made by Sen. Joseph McCarthy of Wisconsin against Secretary Acheson and the alleged harboring of Communists in that agency. Although Senator McCarthy never proved his charges the folks back home acted as though there must be some fire where there was so much smoke. The defeat of Sen. Millard Tydings of Maryland, veteran of 24 years in the senate, was because of this issue of "McCarthyism." Tydings, chairman of the sub-committee which probed the McCarthy charges, found them unfounded and was in turn charged with "white-washing" the whole thing. McCarthy stumped Maryland from one end to the other telling the people this story and lambasting Tydings unmercifully.
