Government Halts Cattle Buying In Texas Tuesday

Austin, Sept. 15.—The Federal government's cattle buying program in Texas was halted abruptly Tuesday last week, it was announced by C. Z. Crain, head of the commodity distribution department of the Federal Relief Commission.

Crain said he was informed of the halt in a telegram from George Barnes, representative of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration at College Station. Cattle have been bought by the AAA representatives, turned over to Texas commission county administrators, who, as representatives of the Federal Surplus Relief corporation, have been responsible for shipping of the livestock from concentration points out of the state and processing plants in the state. The wire explained that the order was issued to permit AAA officials to make an audit of all operations. It did not say when the program would be resumed.

Crain hastened to assure ranchmen that all cattle bought by AAA representatives will be received by the Federal Surplus Relief corporation, even though they may not be government pens for several months. He estimated that perhaps 100,000 head will be so received. These will be shipped out of state but will be processed for canning in the plants. With approximately 100,000 pounds of boned meat on hand at Fort Worth and San Antonio, it was believed the 19 government plants in Texas can be kept until buying is resumed. There are some 8,000 persons employed at the plants, and with cattle distributed in the fresh meat program, the state itself is able to consume 100,000 head per day.

Crain estimated that between 800,000 and 1,000,000 head of cattle have been bought and that the government expended approximately \$25,000,000 in the program in Texas.

All cattle purchases have been halted in the state and so far no invoice has been received at the county agent's office as to when operations would be resumed. To date 2,365 cattle have been purchased in the county, of which 1,113 were delivered. Total payments for cattle amounted to \$31,088.00.

Corn-Hog Checks Arrive Here

More About Housing Act And Its Provisions; How It Will Aid Property Owners

Here, in a nutshell, is the plan for borrowing modernization funds under the Federal Housing Program.

1. A modernization loan is solely for the purpose of repairing, altering or improving your home, shop, farmhouse, store or other building. Diversion of the money to any other purpose is strictly prohibited.
2. It cannot be for less than \$100 or for more than \$2,000. The borrower must have a bona fide source of income equal to at least five times the annual payments.
3. It can be made for terms up to three years, but may be paid in full earlier than the maturity date if the borrower desires.
4. Maximum charges including interest and fees, cannot exceed an amount equivalent to \$5 discount per year per \$100 original face amount of the note.
5. To get a modernization loan the property owner must present to the bank or other lending institution a precise estimate of the cost of the improvements and should be able to prove that they are necessary or advisable.
6. In addition, the owner must file a Property Owner's Credit Statement, showing his financial condition and sources and amount of income and other information necessary to determine his ability to repay the loan.

If the bank considers the improvements advisable, and the property owner able to meet the payments when due, it can advance the money on the personal note of the property owner. The note must be signed by both husband and wife, if the property owner is married. No mortgage or collateral security is necessary, unless State laws or the financial institution's officials demand it.

Date on Wheat Loans Extended To October 15

Farmers in the drouth areas will have until October 15 to make application for loans for the purpose of winter seed wheat, rye or barley, or for summer fallowing, or both, according to an announcement from the Farm Credit Administration. The cutoff date was previously set for September 15.

The loans for the purchase of winter wheat, etc. and for summer fallowing are being made in both the primary and secondary drouth areas and disbursed from the \$40,000,000 crop loan appropriation of 1934. This fund is also being used in the secondary areas to make feed loans, applications for which will be accepted until January 1, 1935, as previously announced. Applications for the loans should be made to the local county crop and feed loan committees now operating through the drouth areas.

\$16,317.60 Paid To Those Who Curtailed Crop

Two hundred and twenty four checks were received at the County Agent's office representing the first payment on 218 of Castro county's Corn-Hog Contracts. The checks totaled \$16,317.60.

Payments on 22 contracts which were delayed in forwarding to Washington have not yet been received. The above amount represents 40 per cent of the hog benefit payments and 50 per cent of the corn benefit payments.

Texas Baptists To Raise \$4,639,087 General Expenses

Texas Baptists will undertake to raise \$4,639,087.40 for local church expenses, missions of all types, Baptist schools, hospitals and orphanages during the next Convention year. This is approximately \$50,000 more than the 3,153 Baptist churches in the state raised last year. A campaign known as the Every Member Canvass movement has been launched to secure pledges covering the above mentioned budget. The plan of the Every Member Canvass in Texas is to first present the campaign educationally.

The entire month of September is devoted to organization setups and associational and district rallies. The first two weeks in October are to be given to the arranging of campaign workers. The latter part of October and the first ten days in November is the time for education, information and inspiration. The exact time to actually secure individual pledges from the 576,945 Baptists in the state is November 11th to December 9th.
