## Phone Company Asks Rate Increase To Improve Service

San Angelo Telephone Company is ready and willing to improve its lines and switchboard to give Robert Lee patrons better service. But it will also be necessary to increase the telephone rates.

This matter was presented to members of the Board of Community Development Monday noon by John E. Robbins, Jr., commercial and traffic superintendent of the phone company. He also filed a proposed schedule of rate increases with Mayor Fred McDonald, Jr.

Robbins pointed out that the company actually lost money on its Robert Lee operations last year. While the number of telephone users has increased, operating expenses of the company have gone up faster.

According to figures submitted by the telephone company representatives, the rates in Robert Lee are the same as they were in 1931. There seems to be logic in their argument that it is not possible to pay postwar costs of furnishing telephone service with the revenues established 20 years ago.

Mr. Robbins also reported that engineers have run surveys on rural lines and in the near future they will have a definite plan to lay before this group of patrons.

The company will have to show it is making a fair profit on its Robert Lee investment before additional expenditures for improvements will be considered.

Robbins will confer with Robert Lee people again Friday of this week and is scheduled to address BCD members May 14.

## FFA Boys Win Area Judging Honors

Robert Lee High FFA Boys made a fine showing in the area judging contests at Lubbock last Saturday. Their coach and sponsor is Carl Maddoux.

The livestock judging team composed of Ted Cox, Bill Carwile and Milburn Wink, placed 3rd among 110 competing teams. They judged cattle, sheep and hogs and Milburn was third in sheep judging.

The Robert Lee team leaves Friday for College Station where they will compete among 60 teams in the state livestock judging contest.

Robert Lee's wool judging team, composed of Bill Casey, Bill Havins and Elmer Greathouse, won first among 19 teams and also took top honors in wool grading. Casey was high point man and Greathouse 4th in grading.

In the entire wool contests, Casey ranked 1st and Havins 4th. There will be no state contest for wool judging and grading.

## Flies Home From Korea in 3 Days

Happy to be home for a visit with his wife and two little sons here is Sgt. 1st Class W. F. Pharis, who is on rotation leave from eight months of active duty in Korea.

Pharis lost no time when he got orders at the front the morning of April 21 that he had been granted a pass. Later that day he caught a plane to Tokyo and arrived in San-Angelo April 24, making the entire journey by air.

He was about 20 miles north of the 38th Parallel and things were quiet in that sector when he left. He is attached to a medical unit of the 24th Infantry.

Sgt. Pharis left Fort Hood last July 10 with the Tank Battalion of the Second Armored Division. The outfit landed at Pusan and after a brief training period started in the big push Sept. 1.

He is due to report back at Camp Stoneman, Calif., May 25, and is in hopes he may get a different assignment.

## New City Lake May Furnish Ample Supply Of Water

The ban on using city water for lawns and gardens may be lifted within another week, according to City Secretary McNeil Wylie. In other words the city has more water than officials had estimated.

Last week Engineer Cooper was called here from Lubbock to confer with the City Commission. He went over previous figures and made a new survey, and his findings showed there is a two or three months supply of water in the new reservoir on Mountain Creek.

He estimated there are about 20 acre feet or 6½ million gallons of water available for city use. The lake is also fed by springs and more water will seep in. Cooper said there is enough water in the lake to run 84 days, allowing 150 gallons per day for every man, woman and child in the city.

City wells, which have been running low, will also furnish at least 15,000 gallons per day. Some water has been used from the new lake for several months, but it has not been properly treated.

However, the new treatment plant will be put into operation as soon as one remaining valve is installed. It was shipped from an eastern factory last week and should arrive very soon.

When the plant begins operating satisfactorily, city officials will take off restrictions on using water. Until that time, however, it is requested the present conservation rules be followed.

Water samples are being sent to the State Health Department regularly by Water Commissioner Sam Jay, and every report has been O. K.

## Wednesday, May 9th Is Clean Up Day

Next Wednesday, May 9, has been designated as Clean Up Day in Robert Lee. The event was discussed at Monday's luncheon of the Board of Community Development.

Mayor Fred McDonald, Jr. has issued a proclamation urging all property owners to clean up their premises on or before the above date. City officials are cooperating with the BCD Committee headed by W. D. McAdams.

The city will furnish a truck to haul off trash and waste material throughout the day next Wednesday. Rubbish is to be piled so that it will be accessible. Persons wishing to have the truck come to their residence, are advised to phone the City Hall, No. 149.

## Announce List of Honor Students

Honor students of the Robert Lee High School Senior Class and Eighth Grade were announced this week by Supt. B. C. Goodwin. Highest rating among the Seniors was achieved by Tommy Kirkpatrick, with Don Fields a close second.

Tommy made an average of 91.475 during the last two years and will be valedictorian of his class at the graduation exercises May 21. Don's average was 91.187, giving him the role of salutatorian.

A better scholastic record, however, was made by Harriet Porter with an average grade of 92.46. But she was ineligible to compete for top honors because she had not been a student here the entire two years. She had completed 12 weeks of her junior work before moving to Robert Lee from Abilene. Supt. Goodwin stated Abilene Christian College has announced it will award Harriet a full scholarship.

Other top ranking Seniors were Lynn Doris Varnadore with a two-year average of 90.53, and Charles McDaniel who scored 90.03.

In the Eighth Grade Leslie Nell Wink was high with 97.45, followed closely by Betty Loyce Burson, who scored 97.15. They will be valedictorian and salutatorian, respectively, at the Eighth Grade Commencement set for Wednesday night, May 23.

## Abilene Man Jailed After Losing Appeal

K. P. Jones, Jr. of Abilene has begun serving a 30-day sentence in the county jail. He was convicted on a liquor transportation charge in county court here last December, and later lost an appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals. Besides the jail sentence he was assessed a fine of \$500.

Efforts have been made to have the sentence suspended, on grounds that Jones is a disabled veteran and requires medical attention every few days. However, County Judge Jeff Dean says the matter was taken out of his hands when the case was appealed to a higher court.

Davis Scarborough, attorney for Jones, has asked the State Pardon Board to take action. At last report Jones was still in jail.

## Mathers 15 Flows 258 Barrels Oil During 14 Hours

Another good producer in the Jameson field near Silver was indicated this week when Sun No. 15 Mathers flowed 258.5 barrels of oil and no water during a 14-hour test. The pay section 6,192-6,383 feet was acidized with 2,000 gallons.

Gauge was through a quarter inch choke with pressures of 725 pounds on tubing and 875 pounds on the casing. Gas-oil ratio was 1,363-1.

Ray-Harris had the drilling contract and moved its rotary rig to Sun J. S. Walker No. 5. It was drilling Wednesday at 1,420 feet in shale and anhydrite.

Sun No. 15 Jewell Brannan, southwest of Silver, was preparing to swab after running tubing for completion. It topped the pay at 6,154 feet and was bottomed at 6,453 feet.

Sun A-2 J. B. Walker was swabbing after treating with 5,000 gallons of acid a pay section 6,300-6,320 feet. Total depth is 6,323 feet.

Sun No. 16 Brannan was drilling in lime and shale at 4,610 feet.

Sun No. 7 W. I. Tubb was at 2,135 feet in shale and lime.

South of river at Silver Sun No. 2 Ralph Harris Estate was at 4,770 feet in shale.

West of Edith Sun No. 10 Davidson was drilling in lime at 2,440 feet.

In southwestern Nolan county Sun No. 2 Eunice Paramore was coring in lime below 6,796 feet. It topped the lime, probably Ellenburger, at 6,774 feet.

## Soil Conservation District News

### Coke Ranchmen Are Seeding More Grass

Respect for the fact, "Grass, man's best tool for anchoring soil against wind and water erosion," is gaining respect in this District because the district cooperators have seeded many acres of abandoned cropland to native and introduced grasses this spring. Those seeding K. R. Bluestem grass for a seed source last week were B. B. Pierce, 5 acres; and L. E. Wink, 3 acres. Wink also seeded 7 acres to a mixture of Weeping Lovegrass, Sand Lovegrass, and Blue Panic Grass.

A farm pond was completed on Glenn Waldrop's farm, located near Hayrick. The pond, which was designed by personnel of the Soil Conservation Service, was located and designed to provide better distribution of livestock water. The pond is a part of Waldrop's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan that he is applying as a district cooperator with the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

A farm pond was also completed on R. C. Lasswell's farm located near Hayrick. The pond was located to give better distribution of livestock water and to reduce trampling by livestock around watering places.

Four miles of terrace lines were run on Noah Pruitt's farm, one and one-half miles northeast of Bronte. The terrace system, designed by personnel of the Soil Conservation Service, was layed out to retain all water that falls on the field.

J. B. Glenn, who owns land one mile north of Tennyson and who is a member of the Tennyson Conservation group, has developed a complete coordinated soil and water plan on 2224.5 acres. Glenn was assisted in developing his plan by the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

R. A. Stroud, a cooperator with the Soil Conservation District, had a ranch pond staked last week on his ranch 3 miles south of Robert Lee for better distribution of livestock water and to reduce trampling of livestock around watering places. The pond was staked by personnel of the Soil Conservation Service.

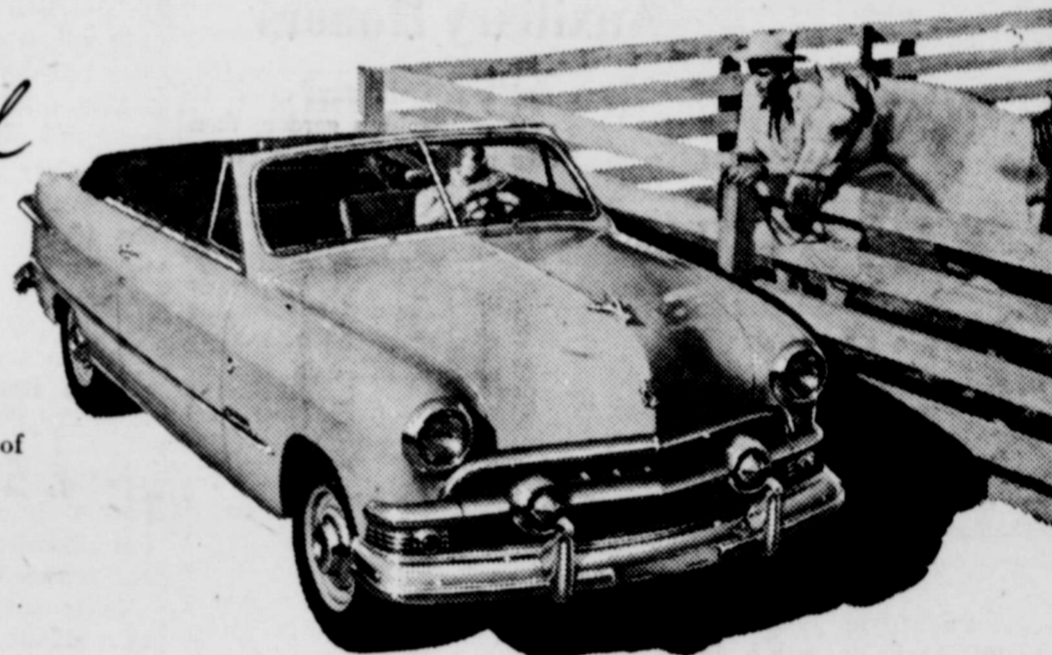

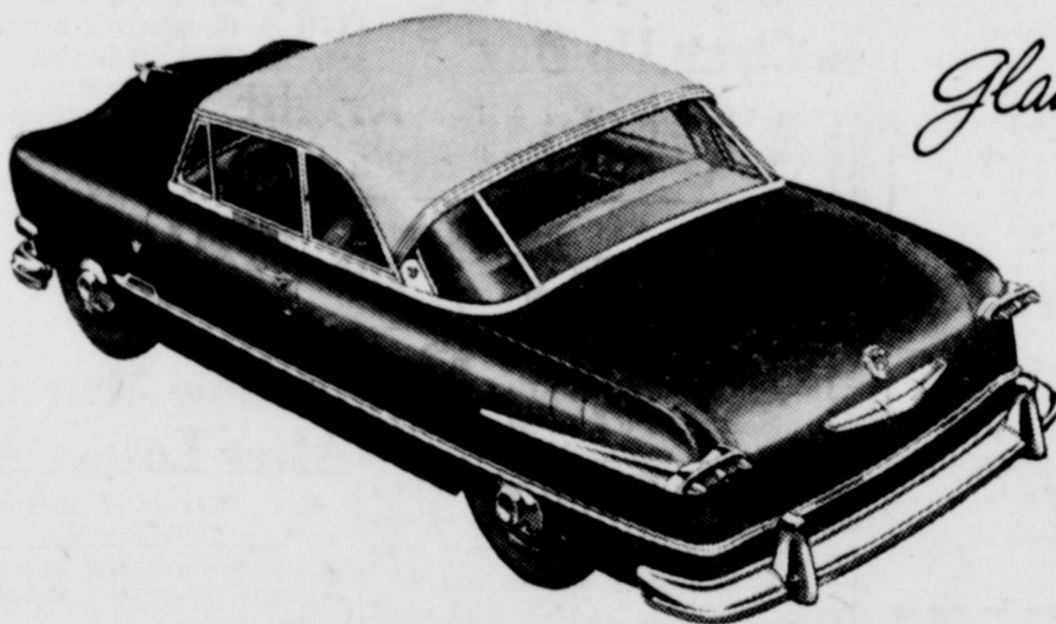

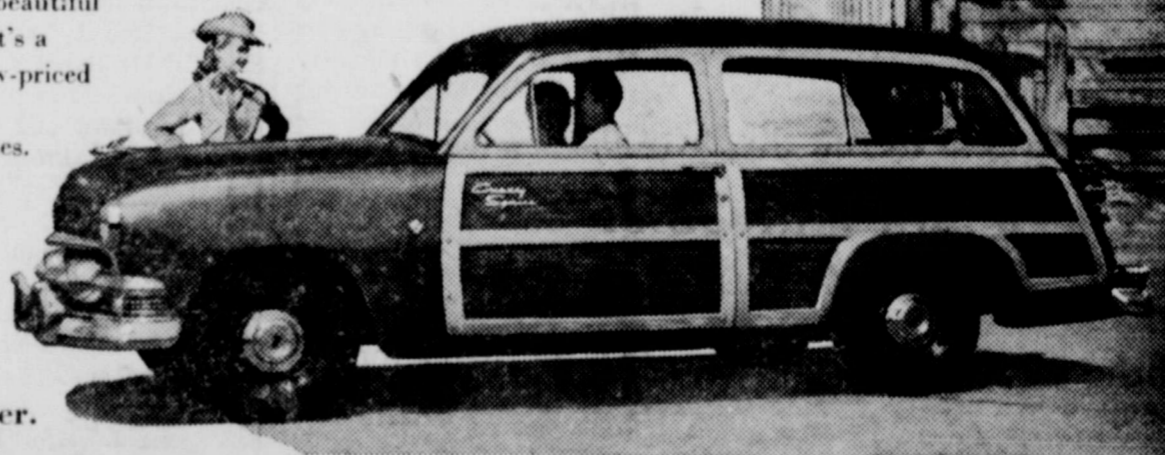

## Mrs. M. B. Sheppard, Former Resident, Dies At Abilene

Death came Saturday morning to Mrs. M. B. Sheppard, 72, Coke county pioneer woman, whose passing occurred at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, where she had been a patient for two weeks. She had been in ill health the past two years.

Funeral rites were held at 2 p.m. Sunday from the First Methodist Church in Abilene, with the Rev. E. A. Reed, pastor, officiating. Burial followed in Paint Creek cemetery in Edith.

Mrs. Sheppard was born July 8, 1878, in Lampasas county, the former Loula Pearl Fields. She came with her parents to the Edith community before Coke county was organized. On Oct. 28, 1894, she married Miles Burton (Bert) Sheppard, the ceremony taking place in Paint Creek school house.

The couple retired from the ranch and moved to Abilene 27 years ago. The family home was at 1950 Amarillo Street. They observed their golden wedding anniversary in 1944. Mr. Sheppard died in September, 1947.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. B. J. Robbins, Natalia; Mrs. W. A. Shel-

ton and Mrs. H. H. King, both of Abilene; two sons, W. Delmir and A. B. Sheppard, both of Robert Lee; 18 grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren.

Also surviving are three sisters, Mrs. J. M. Sparks, Kermit; Mrs. R. H. Price, Fort Stockton, and Mrs. A. G. Cook, Blythe, Calif. A brother, Hubert Fields of Edith, died two years ago.

### Why New Telephone Rates Are Necessary in Robert Lee

For the first time since 1931, the Telephone Company is asking for an adjustment in telephone rates in Robert Lee. The request is made necessary by the high level of post-war costs of furnishing telephone service, which has thrown our operations here with insufficient earnings.

Here are some of the reasons an adjustment in telephone rates is necessary at this time:

During 1950 we furnished telephone service in Robert Lee at insufficient earnings.

We collected .....	\$15,197.16
We spent .....	15,632.44
We lost .....	435.28

Robert Lee telephone rates have not been changed since 1931.\* During the past 10 years Robert Lee has grown from about 203 telephones to nearly 350.

Several general wage increases have been granted telephone employees since 1945. The total monthly payroll in Robert Lee is more than four and one-half times as high as in 1945 due to higher wage rates and a larger number of employees.

Telephone poles, wires, switchboards, and other equipment and supplies cost more than they did before the war.

New schedule of telephone rates:

Following is the new schedule of telephone rates in Robert Lee:

Class of Service	New Monthly Rate Will Be
Business Individual Line .....	7.00
Semi-Public .....	4.80
Business Two-Party .....	6.50
Extension .....	1.50
Residence Individual Line .....	4.00
Residence Two-Party .....	3.50
Extension .....	1.00
Rural .....	3.25

The increase is about 11-cents a day for business customers, 6 cents a day for residence customers. The discount for wall type telephones will be discontinued, and customers may have their choice of desk or wall handset telephones.

In addition, charges for various auxiliary telephone services will be adjusted in relation to today's higher cost of furnishing them.

The adjustments are moderate in comparison with the increase in cost of furnishing service and the higher prices Robert Lee families and business concerns pay for most things they buy today.

It is not possible to pay post-war costs of furnishing telephone service with the revenues from rates established 20 years ago.

\* At that time they were reduced from rates established in 1926.

**First War Bonds  
Begin To Mature**

Ten years ago on the first of May, 1941, the United States Treasury sold the first Series E Savings Bonds. Americans now hold around 500 million E Bonds, worth some \$34½ billion, present cash value. On May 1, 1951, E Bonds begin to mature.

fense Savings Bond, Series E" until after The first E Bonds were titled "De-Pearl Harbor when the title became "War Savings Bond", followed in 1946 by "U S. Savings Bond." Since mid-January the treasury department has been referring to them as Defense Bonds. However, under all these names it is the same Series E Savings Bond, the most widely owned security in the world.

About \$1,096,000,000 of Series E Defense Bonds issued in 1941 are still outstanding and will mature month by month between now and the end of 1951. In 1952-54 the amounts maturing will markedly increase, reflecting the heavy wartime sales of E bonds in war loan drives and on the Payroll Savings Plan during 1942-44. In 1955, maturities will begin to come down to peacetime levels.

In a statement embodying these facts, Chairman T. A. Richardson of the Coke County Savings Bonds Committee, reminds owners of Series E Bonds that under a recent act of Congress (H.R. 2268), they now have three options at maturity, two of which are new privileges:

(1) CASH. The owner of any series E Bond may receive, if he wishes, full cash payment by presenting his matured bond to any qualified bank or other paying agent. This has not changed. The new options are:

(2) EXTENSION. The owner may retain the matured E Bond and for a period not to exceed ten additional years the cash value of the bond will increase each six months, interest accruing at the rate of 2½ percent simple interest for 7½ years, and then at an increase rate for the remaining 2½ years, to bring the aggregate interest return to approximately 2.9 percent, compounded semi-annually (the average rate as for the original ten-year period.)

(3) EXCHANGE. Those who prefer to receive interest as current income, rather than having it accrue and add to the cash value of the bond, may change maturing E Bonds in amounts of \$500 or multiples thereof for Series C Savings Bonds. Series C Bonds are registered bonds issued at face value (selling at par.) They bear interest at the rate of 2½ percent per annum, payable semi-annually from the issue date until their maturity in 12 years.

The options outlined apply to all outstanding E Bonds as they mature and will apply to all new Series E Savings Bonds issued in the future, Mr. Richardson added.

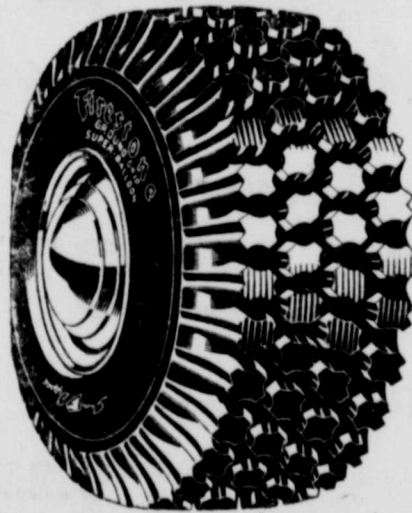

## Snyder Man Killed Near Robert Lee In Highway Crash

A 25-year-old Snyder man, Robert L. Gray, died instantly about 12:30 a.m. Monday in a freak traffic accident five and one-half miles south of Robert Lee on Highway 208.

Gray's car, a 1942 Mercury convertible, apparently traveling at a high speed, ran off the left side of the pavement, narrowly missing the concrete bridge over West Buffalo Creek, and shot 50 feet through the air across the dry creek bed, before ramming into the opposite bank.

Two other men in the car with Gray were C. J. Bogue, Jr., 20, of Snyder, and Bobby Villa, 19, of Tallequah, Okla. All three were employed on a Snyder dam project.

Villa, who sustained a broken collarbone, and Bogue, who had multiple fractures, are recovering at Coke County Memorial Hospital.

Bogue and Villa told investigating officers they had been at a San Angelo highway resort and were returning to Snyder. The accident occurred near the Lenn Roberts ranch home.

Gray's body was brought to the Clift Funeral Home where it was disclosed that his injuries included a broken neck, a severe head wound and leg and arm fractures. Mr. Clift and Jack Crowley carried the body to Fort Smith, Ark., and burial will occur Friday at Van Buren, Ark., his former home. The man's parents now reside in Topeka, Kans.

Many persons have viewed the wrecked car at the Ivey Motor Co. here. The front of the machine was driven back from 3 to 4 feet, and the steering wheel was bent to an upright position.

Gray's death brings Coke county's 1951 traffic fatality to five and the San Angelo district total to 28 — ten more

deaths than for the comparable period in 1950.

The car belonged to C. J. Bogue, Sr., of Snyder, also a worker on the Snyder dam project.
