## Hamlin Defeated In Ragged Game Here; Score 12-11

Robert Lee Rabbit Twisters won a see-saw base ball game from the Hamlin Independents here Sunday by the narrow margin of 12-11. It evened up matters between the clubs, Hamlin having defeated the Rabbits 5-3 the previous week.

Ronnie Baker, 16-year-old southpaw, was not as effective as in his previous start, and the Pied Pipers found his slants much to their liking. He was relieved in the sixth inning by Joe Dean Phillips, who shut the visitors out the last three frames.

Hamlin jumped into the lead with two runs in the first inning and counted again in the second. Two more tallies in the third frame gave them a total of five. Robert Lee scored once in the second and knotted the count with four runs in the third.

Hamlin put across a pair of scores in the fourth inning, but the Rabbits came back strong again with four tallies and took a two-run lead. The visitors had a big time in the sixth frame, with four additional scores, making their game total of 11.

Going to bat in the eighth and two runs behind, Robert Lee pushed over three runs to win the contest.

Black, Hamlin relief pitcher and center fielder, poled two 3-base hits and two singles to lead the visitors attack. Gregory, left fielder, got a two-bagger and single. Their total was 11 safe blows.

Barney Malish, playing first base for Robert Lee, smashed a homerun in the fourth inning with two men on. It was a tremendous drive along the left field line, one of the longest balls ever hit in the local ball park.

R. W. Bowman had a triple and a single. Phillips poled a double and two singles. Lew Heuvel blasted two singles and had two walks. John Conley hit a two-bagger and Frank Percifull, Robert Lee catcher, continued his hitting effectiveness with three hits in five times at bat.

Hamlin and Robert Lee will meet again in July for a pair of games.

## More Good Rains; Farmers Are Busy

Coke county received more good rains Thursday night of last week. Most communities have had around three inches of moisture recently, and farmers are busy putting in crops of feed and cotton.

While more rains will be needed soon there is ample seasoning to bring up crops. Pastures are greening up nicely and feeding of livestock is being discontinued.

Fred McDonald, Jr., says he still has a supply of good cotton seed available. Most farmers have seed on hand for at least one planting.

Thursday night's rain added two more feet of water to the Mountain Creek reservoir, Robert Lee's new city water supply.

## Valuations Fixed On Oil Properties, Public Utilities

Coke County Commissioners Court was in session Monday as a Board of Equalization, at which time a hearing was held on assessments of oil properties and public utilities.

Judge Jeff Dean says there were no objections filed and the hearing was entirely harmonious. REA lines in the county will be assessed at \$25 per mile instead of the previous figure of \$10, the raise being made voluntarily by Carroll Land, REA executive secretary.

Sun Oil Company will continue by far the biggest taxpayer in Coke county, but the exact amount of their assessment this year has not been worked out. Assessments of oil properties and utility concerns are handled for the county by Thos. Y. Pickett Company, valuation engineers of Dallas. Attending the hearing Monday were Harry Pickett, Frank Eudy and Bob Johnson.

Following the next Commissioners regular meeting June 11, real estate and personal property assessments will be checked by the board, and a date set for hearing.

Pan American No. 1 Lucille March Stone, wildcat 10 miles south of Robert Lee, was drilling at 6,410 feet in chert and quartz. No oil shows have been reported.

There is no indication of any further drilling at present in the McCutchen field, a few miles east of Robert Lee. Margan Drilling Company's rig has been dismantled and part of the equipment was moved to Andrews. Two San Angelo Negroes, Johnny Cook, 21, and Raymond Harris, 28, were jailed here this week after their arrest for a number of ranch house robberies west of Robert Lee.

Sheriff Paul Good says the men signed statements admitting their guilt. They will be held to the grand jury which convenes June 11.

On May 12 the pair drove from Water Valley to Robert Lee and stopped at a number of places enroute. Among thefts reported to officers were James Counts, Fred McCabe and Leon Byrne.

Two Negroes were seen on the road that day and Sheriff Good received fine cooperation from Roy Jackson, city detective at San Angelo, in making the arrest. Much of the stolen property has been recovered and returned to its owners. Leon Byrne easily identified a tire, tube and rim that taken from his place.

## Sun Co. Has Several Coke County Tests Nearing Completion

Sun Oil Company is hoping to complete several new Coke county wells within the coming week. Six rotary rigs are now drilling for Sun in the Silver area, and two are working west of Edith.

Sun Jewell Brannan No. 16 is being deepened 100 feet from the previous bottom of 6,332 feet. The tight formation was treated unsuccessfully with 6,000 gallons of acid.

Sun No. J. S. Walker is swabbing after drilling to a total depth of 6,380 feet.

Sun No. 7 Willie I. Tubb is running tubing for completion bottomed at 6,531 feet. It topped the reef at 6,310 feet, with casing seated at 6,334 feet.

South of the river at Silver Sun No. 2 Ralph Harris Estate was taking a drillstem test Thursday after a 10-foot core at 6,787 feet showed good odor and porosity. A drillstem test May 27 from 6,600 to 6,618 feet recovered 125 feet of clean oil, 100 feet of oil and gas cut mud and 120 feet of salt water.

Sun A-2 Mathers was drilling in sand and shale at 5,975 feet.

Sun No. 16 C. E. Mathers was at 4,426 feet in shale and lime.

West of Edith in the Millican field Sun No. 10 Davidson was running tubing for completion with a total depth of 6,027 feet. It topped the reef at 5,930 feet, and casing was set at 5,944.

Sun No. 6 Annie L. Cummings was drilling at 1,150 feet in shale and lime.

In Nolan county Sun No. 3 Paramore was in shale at 1,545 feet.
