Robert Lee Independent School Trustees held an important session Monday night, when teaching contracts were considered and applicants interviewed.

Carter Dibrell was elected Vocational Ag instructor to succeed Carl Maddoux, who resigned to accept a position at Odessa at a considerable increase in salary.

Maddoux, who made an outstanding record here the past two years, will remain with the local school until Sept. 1. Dibrell, at present instructor of the Robert Lee Veterans Ag class, will take over his duties with the opening of the new school term.

Supt. B. C. Goodwin says there are several applicants for the position of high school principal, made vacant by the resignation of M. E. Petross. Jack Brock has been hired as high school science teacher, but a band instructor is yet commission of Second Lieutenant. to be secured.

Brock, husband of the former Nelda Ann Sheppard, will obtain his college degree this summer at Abilene.

Finis Harmon was hired as bus mechanic and bus driver from Edith.



The Coke County Co-operative cold storage locker plant in Robert Lee is out of debt. A mortgage of nearly \$3,500 against the property, held by the First National Bank of Bronte, has been paid off. Banker L. T. Youngblood

Within a short time the concern was in debt more than \$2,000. Later the bank furnished money to pay off other claims and no interest on the loan had been paid in several years.

The locker plant is estimated to be worth \$15,000. All bills have now been paid and the co-op concern belongs to the people.

Cattle Testing Set For July 27

July 27 has been set as the date to test milk cows in Coke County. The test will be for tuberculosis and Bang's disease and the cost will be \$2.00 per cow. This is the same price as charged when someone takes a cow to the veterinarian to be tested.

The fact that some cows may have a tag in the ear does not guarantee the animal free of Bang's or tuberculosis. It simply shows that the animal was clear when tested, however long ago that may have been.

All farmers who have turned in their names for cows to be tested will be notified direct. Any others who wish to take advantage of having the veterinarian come to your place may still file your names to the county agent's office. --- Travis B. Hicks, County Agent.

LOOK OUT FOR SNAKES

The following warning has been issued this week by the State Fish and Game Commission:

Right now plans are being developed to stage a Coke county turkey show just prior to the Dallas and Abiilene shows. This will be a one day show and will give Coke county folk an opportunity to see what the youngsters are doing. Last year, the average net profit per turkey was \$6.50. Prospects look good for a strong market this fall.

From each flock five toms and five hens were weighed. These are the total weights of the toms and hens from each flock at 14 weeks of age: Tommy Hood, 59 and 45.5; Jim Cox, 65 and 45; Kenneth and Leslie Nell Wink, 62.5 and 45.5; Jerry Hurley, 52.5 and 41; Byron and Morgan Russell, 64.5 and 48; Jerrel C. Harmon, 51.5 and 39; Lynn Davidson, 54 and 47; Robert and Sue Skipworth, 56 and 41; Norman Roberts, 56 and 46; Mrs. C. E. Arrott, adult demonstrator, 61 and 48.5.

The average weight per turkey for all groups was 11.84 for the toms and 8.95 for the hens. Toms weighing up to 14 pounds were found in ti.ree flocks, while ten pound hens were found in five flocks.


