## Sun Cummings 11 Flows 359 Barrels During 24 Hours

Sun No. 11 Annie L. Cummings, in the Millican field west of Edith, has been finished for a 24-hour flow of 359 barrels of oil and no water. Gauge was through a quarter inch choke. Tubing pressure was 900 pounds and casing pressure 1,700 pounds. Gas-oil ratio 1,340—1.

No. 11 Cummings was completed in open hole from 5,908 to 6,003 feet and was treated with 9,000 gallons of acid.

Sun No. 4 F. S. Price flowed 225 barrels of oil and no water during a 22 3-4ths hour test through quarter inch choke. Pressures were 650 pounds on casing and 1,175 pounds on the tubing. Gas-oil ratio 1,970—1. It topped the reef at 5,895 feet and was completed naturally in open hole bottomed at 6,001 feet.

Rutledge Drilling Co. was the contractor and moved rotary to Sun No. 13 Annie L. Cummings where they were drilling at 400 feet Tuesday morning. Location is in the north-east corner of Section 187.

Sun No. 12 G. W. Davidson flowed 177 barrels of oil and no water during 22 3-4th hours through 5-16th inch choke, after acidizing with 5,000 gallons. It topped the reef at 5,887 feet and drilled to a total depth of 6,005 feet.

Baker-Taylor had the contract and their new location is Sun Price A—5. It is 1,320 feet east of Price A—1, and 660 feet north of the south line of section 151. It is a north offset to Sun No. 2 Davidson.

Sun Cummings No. 12 was drilling Tuesday at 4,027 feet in shale and lime.

### JAMESON FIELD

In the Jameson field southwest of Silver, Sun No. 18 C. E. Mathers flowed 85 barrels of oil through a quarter inch choke during 6 1/2 hours. Tubing pressure was 975 pounds and 1,325 casing pressure. It was completed naturally in open hole from 6,273 feet to 6,443 feet, the total depth.

Baker-Taylor was the contractor and moved rotary to Sun No. 20 Homer Jameson. Location is 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west line of Section 316.

Sun No. 18 Homer Jameson flowed 77 barrels of oil and no water during a 9 and 1-4 hour test. Pressures were 1,100 pounds on the casing and 515 pounds on the tubing. The well is being completed naturally in open hole from 6,232 feet to 6,478 feet, the total depth.

Morris & Hamilton were the contractors. Their new location is Sun No. 13 Fred Jameson in the north-east corner of Section 315.

Sun Willie I. Tubb B—2 cemented casing at 6,417 feet and drilled to a total depth of 6,493 feet. Operators planned to drill in Tuesday for a completion.

Sun No. 10 J. B. Walker, south of the river, was setting pumping unit. It topped the lime reef at 6,292 and was bottomed at 6,349 feet. The hole has been treated with 5,000 gallons

Sun Central National Bank Unit No. 4 flowed 27 barrels of oil through 5-16th inch choke during a 20 hour test. The flow then died. There was no water. Casing pressure was 605 pounds and tubing pressure 0. The hole was bottomed at 6,316 feet and had been acidized with 5,000 gallons.

Sun No. 3 H. L. Bloodworth topped the reef at 6,335 feet and was bottomed at 6,446 feet. It was making a slight oil show after treatment with 5,000 gallons and was to be re-acidized with 10,000 gallons Tuesday.

Sun J. S. Walker No. 4 was plugged and abandoned with a total depth of 6,448 feet. A west offset to the Bloodworth producer in the Strawn sand, it failed to pick up the sand section. Dual Drilling Co. had the contract. Their rig was released and dismissed.

Sun No. 17 C. E. Mathers was drilling Tuesday in shale at 1,075 feet. Duncan Drilling Co. has the contract.

Sun Blanks-Perkins Unit No. 1 set Surface pipe at 501 feet. It is a southwest diagonal to A. G. Hill Harris Estate No. 8, new Caddo lime producer at 6,771-5 feet. Location is in the southeast corner of the NE quarter of Section 72, blk 2, H&TC. Empire Drilling Co. has the contract.

On July 15 at Goodfellow diamond the Twisters went down to defeat 18 to 6. So things are pretty even, and scores of the next two games are expected to be close. John Conley is scheduled to hurl Friday night, and Sam Mabry will likely be on the mound Sunday for Robert Lee.

Jack Webb and his M-System team suffered its second defeat here last Sunday, the final score being 20 to 2. Webb had hoped to bring a better group of players, but was unable to round them up at the last minute.

Conley and Ronnie Baker divided pitching duties and allowed only six hits between them. Eddie Armstrong, visiting hurler, was not as effective as in his previous start here when his team lost by a 7-1 score.

Conley kept up his terrific batting rampage, getting five hits out of six trips to the plate. Donald Roe also had a big day with five blows in six times at bat.

Several Robert Lee regulars were absent from the lineup. In the absence of Barnell Malish and Frankie Percifull, Bobby Baker went behind the plate and did a wonderful job. It was the first time he had ever caught a game. Marvin Corley of Bronte filled in at first base, and delivered a couple of hits before he wore out. Norman Roberts and Lynn Davidson helped fill the vacant spots in the local lineup.

Members of the Robert Lee Baptist Church are happy to invite you to attend the Youth Revival scheduled for three days, Aug. 31-Sept. 2.

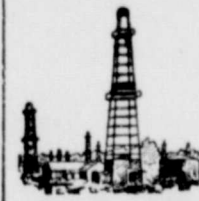
The Rev. Bob Bratcher will preach, Al Wilson will sing, and Freddie Hayashi, blind Hawaiian, will be the pianist.

## Notes From The Oil Field

George Callahan is rigging up rotary on Barron Kidd of Midland No. 1 A. N. Counts, 467 feet from north and west lines of the northeast quarter of section 15-X-D&SERR survey; 7,500 feet, wildcat 12 miles southwest of Robert Lee.

Union NO. 1-B T. W. Whiteside, 6 miles southwest of Blackwell, was drilling below 5,000 feet this week. Delaware Drillers have the contract.

Norfolk Petroleum Corp. of Midland No. 1 Mrs. Emma Percifull was drilling Wednesday at 1,275 feet. The wildcat, 5 miles southeast of Robert Lee, is being drilled with cable tools. Operators are looking a pay section just below 1,500 feet.

In Mitchell county, 4 miles north of Silver, Richardson & Bass No. 1 Frank McCabe was drilling below 3,500 feet.

The District Attorney said that they could, but they didn't. That is, the Coke County Commissioners wouldn't ask members of the Hospital Board to resign, after District Attorney Earl Smith told them they had every right to do so.

A special session of the Commissioners Court was held last Thursday to further consider petitions signed by 227 residents requesting that they ask the Hospital Board to resign. The petitions added that the request was not directed at any member of the Board in a personal manner, but it was felt such action was necessary to promote the best interests of the hospital and the community.

After a long drawn out discussion Thursday afternoon the commissioners voted 3 to 1 against taking action on the petitions. Commissioner J. W. Service of Precinct 1 cast the lone vote.

The petitions were first discussed on Monday of last week at which time action was deferred until an opinion had been secured from the district attorney. County Attorney Frank Dickey had advised the Commissioners Court that it "was neither required nor authorized to act upon the petitions."

Excerpts from the District Attorney's written opinion follow:

"It is my personal opinion that the Board of Managers of the hospital would be construed by the Courts to be county officers and that it would be necessary to have removal procedure started in the District Court. I notice that your letter inquires as to whether or not you can REQUEST the resignation of the Board. There is nothing in the statute that would prevent your REQUESTING the resignation of the Board members, and then if they did not resign, you could start this removal procedure."

"I would say again that (1) you are not required by law to act upon the petition which has been presented to you. (2) That in its discretion, the Commissioners Court may institute removal procedures. (3) That such procedures should be instituted in the District Court by your County Attorney and (4) that independent of the above, there is no reason why you could not ask for their resignation if you so desire, irrespective as to whether or not you would go so far as to start procedures to have the Board removed if they did not resign at your request."

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## What ACP Practices in 1952?

What soil and water conservation practices do you plan to carry out on your farm in 1952?

This question to the farmers of Coke county is raised by O. E. Kresta, chairman of the County PMA committee, as a means of encouraging more effective conservation in connection with meeting defense needs.

According to the chairman, all present indications are that farmers will be asked to continue production at high levels. This means continued heavy drain on the productive capacity of the soil, making conservation all the more essential. It also means that the conservation practices must fit into the pattern of increased production.

More than ever this calls for special planning and good judgment, the chairman said. By checking conservation needs while crops are growing or right after harvest, the farmer has a better opportunity to determine what practices are needed and to fit these practices into the production pattern.

In the chairman's opinion farmers who expect to use the Agricultural Conservation Program in their conservation efforts can make better use of the assistance provided if they plan ahead and set a goal of the improvements they expect to make in the next few years. Most farms have some particular conservation problem that is keeping the farm from producing as it should. Laying out the steps to be taken to meet this problem and then following through, makes for more efficient and effective use of program assistance and of the farmer's own labor and equipment.

### SECOND OIL CROP ON WAY

The Osage Indians who benefited from oil production on their Oklahoma reservation a quarter century ago, are about to see history repeat itself. Re-pressuring of old oil fields, by means of water-flooding, began in June when Chief Dee-Hee-Bee turned a valve that started water from the Arkansas River flowing toward abandoned wells.

In this type of re-pressuring, water is injected into the oil-bearing formation through wells drilled for the purpose. The water then forces the oil to flow to the existing well-holes. An engineer of the chief oil company operating the re-pressuring project estimates that almost as much oil as originally came from the Osage fields will be recovered.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3**  
proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws enacted by the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in the State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued, said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8**  
proposing an Amendment to Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts so as to provide that the Legislature may authorize an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37**  
proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
