## Oil Progress Has **Been Great Boost For Coke County**

Coke county citizens join the state and nation in observing Oil Progress Week, October 14 to 20.

Texans know the oil story well. As home folks in the oil country they share the oil industry's pride in supplying the resource that powers a major share of the country's industries, all its airplanes and automobiles, most of its ships and trains.

Texans realize, moreover, that oil's progress means more to them than it does to many other Americans. For example, the value of the crude oil produced in West Texas in 1950 was approximately a billion dollars. This is not "boom mon-

West Texas uses it to pay taxes, salaries and wages; it buys homes, groceries, light and heat; doctors collect a portion of it; landowners received royalty and lease payments; a sizable portion of it is reinvested in the further development of the region's oil resources.

Here in Coke county everyone has benefited directly or indirectly from the wonderful oil development. Jobs have been available for hundreds of families and all lines of business have been stimulated.

The greatest benefit to the public as a whole is the enormous increase in taxes. This year oil properties have a taxing valuation which is two-thirds the county total. Coke county's combined assessed value is \$14,991,010, and oil pays on \$10,002,230of hat amount.

Sun is by far the biggest of the oil concerns. Its taxing valuation this year is \$6,451,350, and it will pay the Coke county tax collector the enormous sum of \$178,550.60.

## **Handles 22 Million** Feet of Gas Daily

Sun's gasoline plant at Silver is processing about 22 million cubic feet of gas daily. Under the present high pressure system only onefourth gallon of liquid petroleum is extracted from 1,000 cubic feet of gas. This amounts to approximately 25,000 gallons of liquid manufactured in the Silver plant every 24

Most of the liquid is processed into butane which finds a ready market over West Texas. A smaller amount of gasoline is shipped to refineries for blending purposes.

After the liquid has been taken out the dry gas is injected back into the formation from which it came. This conserves the gas supply for future years and insures a longer life of the oil field.

Work is progressing on Sun's new but gas now being flared will be forced back into the ground.

Two 350 h. p. compressors have been installed. The capacity will probably be enlarged next year.
