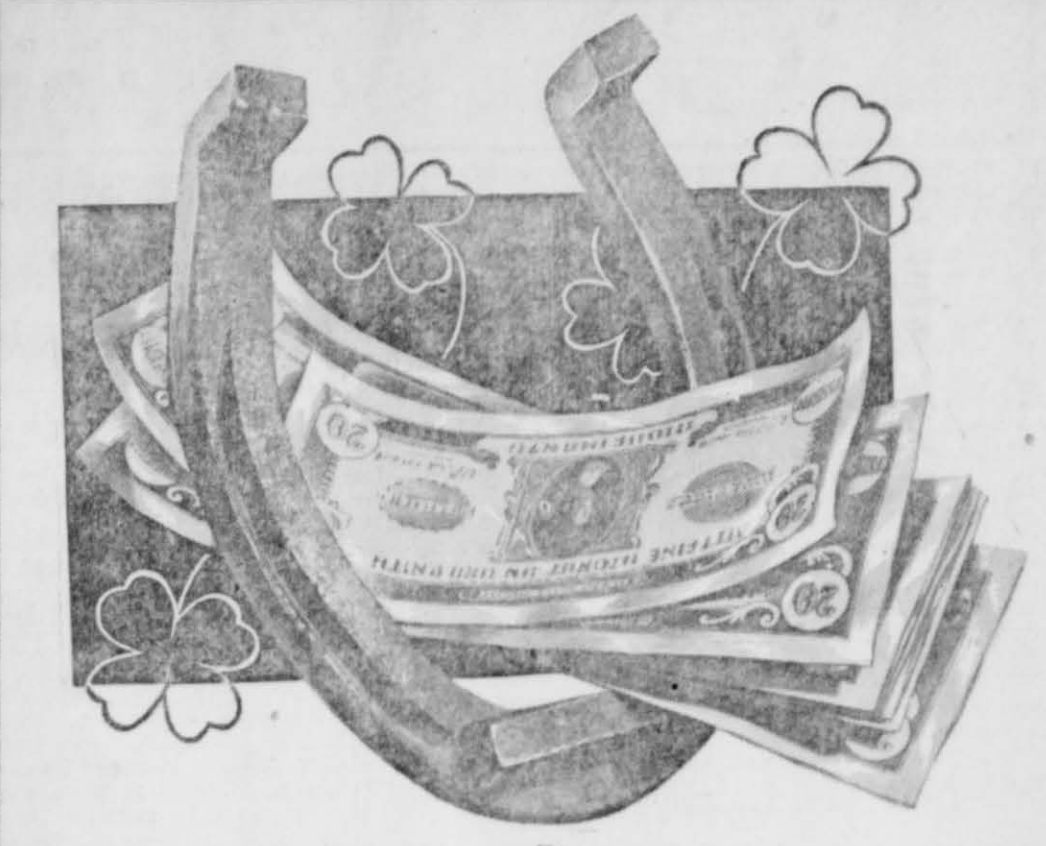

Unemployment Compensation Act Now Includes Smaller Businesses

Several additional employers in Castro County became liable under the amended Texas Unemployment Compensation Act January 1.

J. D. Jordan, Texas Employment Commission office manager, advises these employers that establishing payroll reporting accounts with the state office of the Texas Employment Commission, Brown Building Austin, will help avoid penalties and assessments of back taxes.

An amendment to the state's unemployment compensation laws extended coverage to all employers with as many as four employees on 20 days in 20 different weeks, Jordan said. Prior to January 1, 1956, only firms who hired eight or more were affected.

"The expanded program also covers a small business which has four people working only Saturdays, or one which regularly has two employees during the day and two others at night."

The state program was extended by the 1955 legislature to conform with Federal statutes already enacted. "Otherwise," said Jordan, "Castro County employers of four to eight people would not have the advantage of the Texas system of possibly reduced taxes because of employer experience ratings.
