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## "Rock and Roll" Is Theme Of Lions Club Minstrel Show

The third annual edition of Dimmitt Lions Club Minstrel Show will stage its production in Dimmitt High School Auditorium July 12 and 13.

This year's program will take its name from the loose-jointed rhythmic bop music now current throughout the nation, the "Rock and Roll." In an abstract original setting of pink and black, the minstrel begins at 8:30 p.m. on July 12.

Rehearsals for the all-new extravaganza began Monday night and the first full-dress rehearsal is scheduled about four days before actual production.

A feature attraction of this

year's minstrel, according to director Rosie Bates, will be the Rock and Roll Cuties. "This number will do a dance with fans that will put Sally Rand to shame," Mr. Bates enthusiastically reported.

The cast will be made up mostly of Lions Club members and their wives. Serving as interlocutors again this year will be Dr. Charles Vandiver, Fred Mearns; be Scumbo, Don Gladman; Mamie, Dr. James Wohlgemuth; Liver Lips, Bruce Woodell; and Moonshine, Joe Benson.

Several hit songs will be rendered by the cast. They include "There's No Business Like Show Business," "Rock and Roll Waltz," and "Hot Diggity."

The original script will be made up by members of the Lions Club and will feature all new songs, gags, and faces. Young dancing talent from Dimmitt and surrounding communities has been recruited for the program and a barbershop quartet group will sing. A total of 25 Lions and their wives will be in the chorus, with fourteen specialty numbers and other local talent presentations. The show will last about one and one-half hours.

Music will be furnished by Judith Cleavinger and Jo Ann Elder, with choreography by Keith Taylor.

## There's Nothing Strange About 1,000 Eggs Daily Production

(This is the first in a series of articles on Castro County's growing poultry industry.—Ed.)

Consider the chicken:

This is a noble bird—kingdom animal, plenum chordata, class aves—which may be found in small flocks, on any farm in the country.

But chickens aren't just for Sunday dinner on Tom and Thelma Wethington's farm at Nazareth. They have three barns full of cockers.

Mr. Wethington began raising chickens commercially two and a half years ago, with 13,000 barrel-breasted Northwesterns. He raised Northwesterns until last year, and still speaks highly of the bird. But, the Northwestern, being a hybrid chicken, produced no eggs—and Mr. Wethington realized what he might be missing.

So as he sold his Northwesterns he began restocking with Aims and Cross white leghorns. He was satisfied with the results, so nine weeks ago he filled a 4,000-sq. ft. poultry barn with day-old white leghorn chicks, transferring his laying hens to two smaller laying barns.

He now has 1,210 laying hens and 3,000 nine-week-old fryers and pullets averaging 2½ pounds.

## Two-Barn Fire on Maxwell Farm Causes \$4,000 in Equipment Damage

A fire on the Troy Maxwell farm six miles north of Dimmitt Friday afternoon destroyed a workshop, a chicken house with 138 chickens inside, and about \$4,000 worth of equipment and power tools.

Heaviest loss was in the workshop-storage room building. Inside the workshop room were an acetylene welder, farm equipment, a dozen stored motors, an air compressor, a power grinder, an electric drill, and other workshop equipment.

In the storage room were two butane stoves, household fixtures, furniture, and dinnerware. Mrs. Erwin Bartels, whose husband rents the Maxwell farm, had stored many of her wedding gifts, including a full set of dishes, inside the storage room. All were destroyed.

Most of Mr. Bartels' 138 chickens were killed. Mr. Maxwell said Friday evening it was doubtful if those carried from the building would live.

Mrs. Bartels noticed and reported the blaze at 2 p.m. Friday.

By 2:10 p.m. members of the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Department had covered the six miles

and were attacking the blaze.

They had the blaze extinguished

by 2:25 p.m. but because of an acetylene tank explosion everything inside had already been destroyed.

The fire is believed to have

been started by an electrical short

in the workshop and was carried

by an easterly wind to the chicken house.

Flames were instantly spread

throughout the workshop

when the safety valve on the acetylene tank melted, literally shooting fire throughout the building and causing total destruction inside almost before the fire could be spotted from the outside.

Dimmitt volunteer firemen alternated between manning fire hoses and carrying out half-dead chickens, chicken feeders, and equipment. The fire was confined to the two small buildings; no other farm buildings were near enough to be endangered.

## Unemployment Compensation Act Now Includes Smaller Businesses

Several additional employers in will mean earlier eligibility for reduced tax rates. Castro County became liable under the amended Texas Unemployment Compensation Act January 1.

J. D. Jordan, Texas Employment Commission office manager, advises these employers that establishing payroll reporting accounts with the state office of the Texas Employment Commission, Brown Building, Austin, will help avoid penalties and assessments of back taxes.

An amendment to the state's unemployment compensation laws extended coverage to all employers with as many as four employees on 20 days in 20 different weeks, Jordan said. Prior to January 1, 1956, only firms who hired eight or more were affected.

The expanded program also covers a small business which has four people working only Saturdays, or one which regularly has two employees during the day and two others at night.

The state program was extended by the 1955 legislature to conform with Federal statutes already enacted. 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
