Sun Reports Two New Producers In Coke County Fields

Sun Oil Company this week filed official reports on two more Coke county producers, and two more are about to be finished.

Sun Jameson Reef Unit 19 (Homer Jameson 19) flowed 221.8 barrels of oil and 12 barrels of wash water during 24 hours. Guage was through 1/4-inch choke. Pressures were 515 pounds on tubing and 1,100 pounds on the casing. Gas-oil ratio 1,524-1.

On the northwest side of the Millican field west and north of Edith, Sun's No. 6-A Foster Sims Price was completed for a 24-hour flow of 261.7 barrels of 45.5 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,624-1. Production was through a 1/4-inch tubing

Sun Jameson Reef Unit 13 (Fred Jameson 13) was testing after installing a gas lift unit.

Sun No. 1 Blanks-Perkins, southwest outpost to the Lygay field south of the river at Silver, flowed 94 barrels of oil and no water during a 15-hour test. Production was through a 14-64ths inch choke. Gasoil ratio was 783-1.

Sun Central Nat'l Bank Unit A-1, south of the river, was drilling at 2,115 feet in shale.

Jameson Reef Unit 6-G (Allen Jameson 6) was drilling Wednesday in shale and anhydrite at 1,720 feet. Gross Near \$800 5 MATHERS LOCATIONS

Sun is now drilling on five Mathers locations on the west side of the Jameson field at Silver.

Steers Defeat Coahoma 25 to 12; Cling to Loop Lead

The Robert Lee Steers utilized a forward pass play that clicked off four touchdowns here Friday night to subdue the Coahoma Bulldogs 25-12. It was a 5-B conference game and kept the Steers tied with Hermleigh for the district No. 1

Robert Lee's touchdowns resulted from the marksmanship of passer Donny Duncan at quarterback. On the receiving end were Bill Carwile, who snagged three touchdown passes, and Norman Robers, for one.

The Steers held a 7-0 edge at half time, and roared back in the second half for three more counters.

Coahoma scored in the third and fourth quarters, with Fullback Jack | Knight accounting for both touchdowns. The husky speedster broke through the line for a 65-yard run to the goal, and later was on the receiving end of a 28-yard pass play.

It was a chilly night for the fans, but perfect football weather, and a big crowd was on hand to enjoy one of the most thrilling games of the season. The gridiron was spongy but in good condition.

The first Steer score was made in the middle of the second period. The Bulldogs had been doing well offensively, but their drive ended when Roberts intercepted a long pass on the Robert Lee 16. Three first downs were then reeled off by the Steers, and Carwile gained 8 yards on an end around play, stopping on the Coahoma 19. Duncan then shot a pass to Carwile who was in the clear. 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
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This Is National 4-H **Achievement Week**
