

CITY ORDINANCE Rules and Regulations Pertaining To NEW CITY LAKE

An Ordinance Creating a Code of Rules and Regulations Governing the New Lake on Mountain Creek As to Sanitation and Recreation. Passed by the City Commission of the City of Robert Lee, Texas, and Approved by the Upper Colorado River Authority.

1. No person shall navigate the lake either for sport or fishing without a life preserver.

2. All acts or stunts for show while driving a motor boat are prohibited.

3. No motor boat shall be driven at an excessive speed. 4. No. motor boat shall navigate within 1/8 mile of intake tower.

5. Positively no fishing in lake until a published notice is given.

6. There shall no swimming or bathing in lake at any time.

7. Picnickers shall be required to dispose of garbage in receptacles provided.

8. Any person or persons caught seining any part of the lake shall be prosecuted.

9. Any person or persons guilty of causing damage to dam or any part of water works system either by vehicle or any other means will be prosecuted.

10. Any tragedy at lake shall be reported at once to Robert Lee Fire Department.

11. Rules and regulations for fishermen will be published prior to the opening of the lake for fishing.

12. The lake will be posted with signs according to law and any violator will be taken before the Justice of the Peace who will assess the fines.

These rules and regulations are passed for the purpose of protecting the life and health of the Community. The City Commission of Robert Lee and the Officials of the Upper Colorado River Authority ask for your full cooperation.




