## Preserving Foliage

The beauty of autumn foliage quets. If you want to preserve a fresh spray of colorful leaves, lay hem flat as possible on an old newspaper and apply a thin coat
of fresh white shellac, making sure to cover the stems where they join the heavier twig. Allow to dry horoughly and then repeat the process on the opposite side. A
