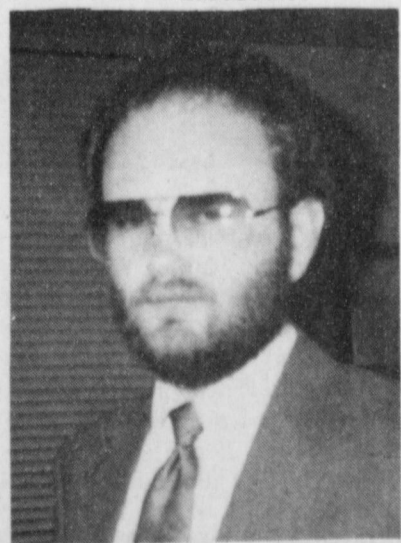
Dwayne Dale has been promoted to the position of Assistant Cashier of the Muleshoe State Bank by the board of directors.

to \$10 per year, payable in September of each year.

Also, Article V, on Meetings was amended to read. "The meetings of the Mule-Plex Production Company shall be held as determined by the By-Laws of said organization. The annual meeting shall be held in August of each year. The board shall elect its officers at the board's annual meeting directly following the general membership annual meeting in August. The board secretary will report the board's actions and progress to the membership.

Under "Appointed Offices" the word "chairmen" was changed to read "chairpersons."

Section Three was amended as follows:

#### BOARD OF DIRECTORS

A meeting of the Board of Directors may be called at anytime by the President of the board.

Section 4: QUORUM  
A. Ten percent (10%) of the members in good standing shall constitute a quorum for all general membership meetings.

B. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of 2/3rds of its membership.

#### ARTICLE XI

#### AUDIT AND DISSOLUTION

Section 3: No appropriation of money shall be made, no contract shall be signed or any obligation entered into by the Mule-Plex Production Company, its committees, or its officers, except upon approval of the Board of Directors. The Board will establish guidelines for purchases and paying bills.

Three members were elected to the Board of Directors. Their terms will expire in one, two or three years, according to the guidelines. Elected were Arlene Phelps, Darla Rhodes and Roger Clarkson.

#### For MAHD Board

#### Thursday Night

After four and a half years, the sign that reads "West Plains Medical Center" is to be removed from the front of the hospital.

During a Thursday night meeting, the board of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District approved removal of the sign and replacing it with one that reads "Muleshoe Area Medical Center."

In other action, the board approved two new policy manuals for employees.

One policy deals with contagious diseases, primarily Hepatitis B and the HIV virus, which is the virus that causes AIDS.

Outlined in the other policy is providing a Drug Free Workplace. This policy will be affecting all hospital employees, regardless of what position they hold as an employee.

Richard Murphy, administrator, told board members that he had talked with FmHA earlier in the day, and FmHA representatives were to call IRS regarding the release of an IRS lien, which has not as yet been sent to the hospital.

Board members heard the financial report, and patient status. They were told that during the month of March, the in-patient load at the hospital had increased considerably, as more people are now using the local hospital.

Rachel Snider, administrator of Muleshoe Area Health Care Center also gave a report on the nursing home.

Lazbuddie ISD has been at the forefront among schools that incorporate proven new programs which promise improvement in academics. One such new program is called HOTS, which is short for *Higher Order Thinking Skills*.

According to school officials, HOTS is proving to be very effective not only in student academic success, but also in building self-esteem and competence in critical thinking skills.

Lazbuddie was selected to be a pilot school for the program, which was developed by Dr. Stanley Pogrow from the University of Arizona. HOTS replaces drill and practice activities. It is a general thinking program designed so that HOTS students receive training four times a week for thirty-five minutes. Students must meet certain criteria before being included in the program.

Lazbuddie's HOTS program serves twelve students in grades 4, 5 and 7.

Lazbuddie's HOTS program is taught by Miss Debra Hall. She received special recognition in the national HOTS newsletter for outstanding contribution to the program. The HOTS creator, Dr. Pogrow, stated that HOTS requires a special kind of teacher in order to make the most effective use of the program.

Lazbuddie administrators expressed their appreciation of Debra Hall and her hard work in getting the program off to a good start at Lazbuddie. Hall attended special HOTS training workshops during the summer. Other school personnel who received training are: Mrs. Diane Hernandez, Mrs. Becky Jones and Mrs. Teresa Vera.

Lazbuddie is very proud to be one of only a few pilot schools in the state that were granted official permission to establish the HOTS program this year. Lazbuddie's HOTS is being closely monitored by the Region XVI Service Center.

HOTS instruction requires very little teacher assistance and instruction. Instead, the teacher introduces the concept, then sends students to the computers, where they must work through the problems independently.

In this way, the students are allowed to develop their thinking skills and gain the bonus of self-esteem and excitement

about learning. Learning to use contextual information to deal with uncertainty is one of the key skills that HOTS develops.

Debra Hall stated that her HOTS students recently had a special day on which they invited their favorite teachers to a HOTS challenge. Hall said that they were very proud of the fact that they out-performed every teacher. They have had similar peer challenges with equal success.

Lazbuddie Elementary School principal, Mrs. Anne Farris, displays projects that demonstrate HOTS students' prowess on the walls of the school's halls, and encourages the students' continued success. She also encourages the regular classroom teachers to reinforce the HOTS instruction in their classrooms.

She stated that developing critical thinking skills is vital to a well-rounded education, and that "Lazbuddie ISD strives to Cont. Page 7, Col. 3

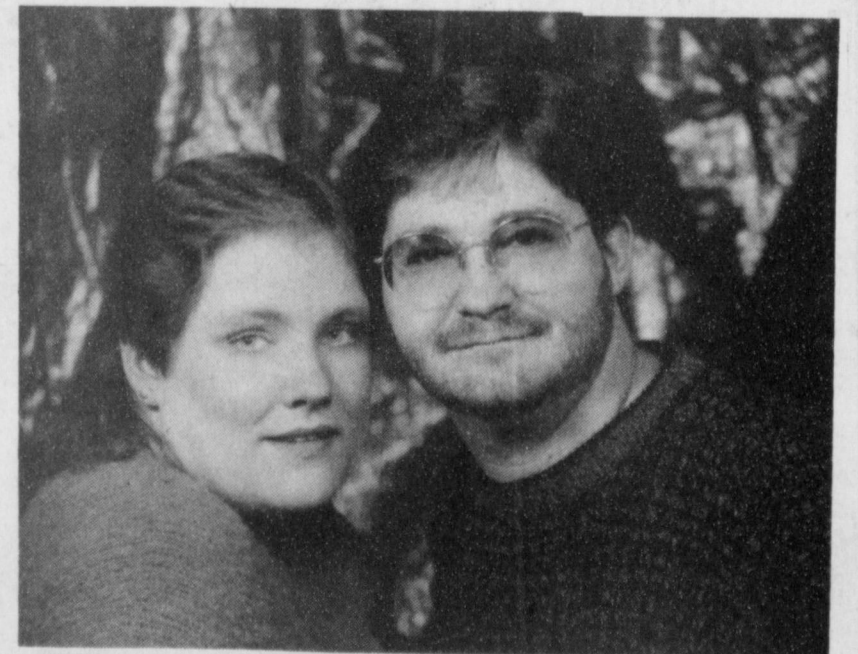

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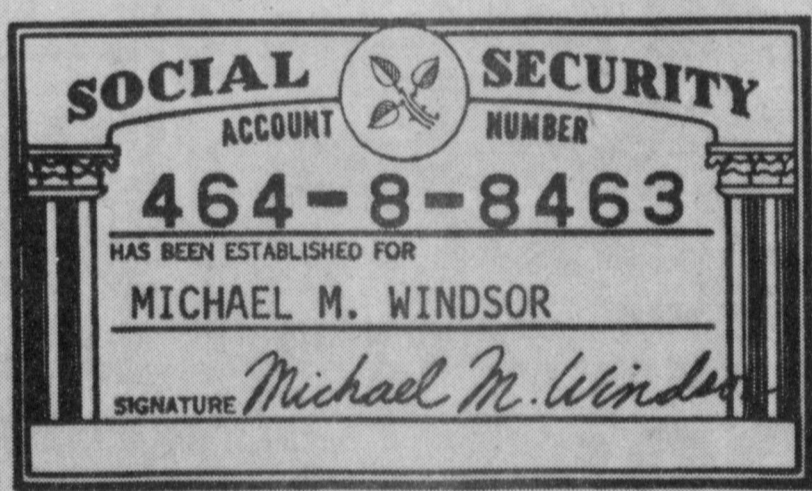
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# Miss Jennifer Michael, Kirby United In Marriage

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## Lazbuddie School Reports TAAS Results

Final results are in statewide on the TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) standardized tests. Lazbuddie I.S.D. reports that once again, they have exceeded expectations on all levels.

For the past four years, students across Texas took the TEAMS (Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills) test, which tested only basic skills. The TAAS measures higher-level thinking and problem-solving skills. TEA officials had warned school districts that the test scores would be lower.

However, Lazbuddie administrators and teachers were pleasantly surprised by the high scores of all grades on most sections of the test. Lazbuddie has stood out with high TEAMS scores in comparison after the TAAS is a reaffirmation that Lazbuddie's academic programs do, indeed, spell success.

Quality academic programs and quality teachers make their mark early in Lazbuddie Elementary. Instructional needs are assessed, and goals are implemented, with the help of proven programs that address a variety of needs. Programs like Project READ, HOTS, special education, Gifted and Talented, ESL, along with adequate individualized instruction, all work toward helping each student achieve his or her academic potential.

The same emphasis on academic excellence carries on into junior high and high school, with yearly monitoring of needs and the setting of campus goals.

Lazbuddie juniors have, for the past two years, achieved one-hundred percent mastery on all sections of the exit-level TEAMS, an accomplishment reached by very few schools in the state. Again, this year, Lazbuddie juniors exceeded the state average on the TAAS, receiving 92 percent mastery on the writing, 100 percent on the reading, and 86 percent on the math, as compared to state averages of 81 percent, 88 percent and 74 percent.

Other results were: Grade three achieved 93 percent mastery on the writing, 100 percent on reading, and 100 percent on the math sections of the test, as compared to state

averages of 70 percent, 84 percent, and 86 percent.

Grade five received 90 percent mastery of the writing, 79 percent of reading, and 75 percent on the math sections, as compared to state averages of 80 percent, 68 percent and 60 percent.

Grade seven had 85 percent mastery on writing, 70 percent on the reading and 79 percent on the math, compared to state averages of 72 percent, 59 percent and 61 percent.

Lazbuddie ninth graders achieved 89 percent mastery on the reading and 89 percent on the math. State averages were

76 percent and 57 percent.

In the third grade, 57 percent received academic recognition in reading and 21 percent earned academic recognition in math. Fifth grade had 42 percent to achieve academic recognition in reading, and 30 percent had academic recognition in math. Lazbuddie seventh graders won academic recognition for 35 percent of their class in reading, and 21 percent in math.

Ninth grade had 50 percent to receive academic recognition in reading, and the eleventh grade had 57 percent in reading. To have such large percentages of each class to achieve this is

outstanding. Academic recognition means that those students mastered 100 percent of the objectives on their individual test sections. Lazbuddie had academic recognition in somewhat smaller percentages on the writing and math sections, as well.

Like other Texas schools, Lazbuddie will now look at the tests to determine weaknesses and will adjust campus goals to meet individual student needs. Lazbuddie school administrators expressed pride in their students' performance on the much harder test and look forward to climbing scores in the future. "Lazbuddie's academic strength lies in effective programs, a total-school effort, outstanding teachers, parental support, and more individualized attention. The school's emphasis on academic excellence has been clearly demonstrated by scores on both the TEAMS and the TAAS," stated Lazbuddie school officials.

CHOCOLATE CLAY  
10-ounces chocolate, finely chopped

1/2 cup light corn syrup  
1. Melt chocolate in top of double boiler over hot, but not boiling water. Remove from water bath and add corn syrup; mix gently and thoroughly, but only until blended. Do not over mix or mixture will separate. (Be especially careful with "white" chocolate.)

2. Deposit mixture on sheet of waxed paper; flatten into 6-inch square. Set at room temperature until dry and firm. Dark chocolate clay may be dry in two or three hours. Milk chocolate clay usually takes a little longer to dry. "White" chocolate clay may take 1-2 days or longer to dry, especially in humid conditions.

3. Wrap well, when firm and dry, and store at room temperature for several weeks or until needed. NEVER store in refrigerator or freezer.

4. To restore to workable texture, knead small portions at a time only until malleable. If clay gets too soft, set it aside until it returns to room temperature or refrigerate only briefly.

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## Pesticide Applicator Training Slated Here

A Pesticide Applicator's Training meeting will be held on March 28, starting at 8:15 a.m. at the Bailey County Civic Center. The training program will be a three and one half hour training session by reviewing slides and hearing tapes. Testing will begin at 1 p.m. and will be conducted by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Completion of this training course will qualify the person for a Licensed Private Applicator Card which will allow them to supervise the application of restricted-use and/or state-limited-use pesticides for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity.

A second part (and advantage) to the meeting will be that local producers who need to obtain Continuing Education Units (CEU's) may receive two CEU's by attending this training meeting.

The Texas pesticide law, as amended during the 1989 regular session of the legislature, now provides that a person may not use a restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide unless the person is licensed as a commercial, non-commercial or private applicator or is an individual under the direct supervision of a licensed applicator.

Effective January 1, 1990, TDA could not issue an original Private Applicator License before the applicant had attended

a training course conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. By your participation in this meeting, you satisfy this requirement of the law.

To become a licensed private applicator, you must make a passing score on the Texas Department of Agriculture private applicator test and submit an application to TDA along with the required \$50 fee.

A private applicator is a person who uses or supervises the use of a restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity (1) on property owned or rented by the person or the person's employer or under the person's general control; or on the property of another person if applied without compensation other than the trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities.

The private applicator training program is available to those persons not previously certified and to those previously certified who will be supervising the application of restricted-use and/or state-limited-use pesticides and who wish to obtain a TDA private applicator license.

Anyone having questions about these two training opportunities should contact the County Extension Agent's office in Bailey County (272-4583). All Extension programs are open to the general public regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

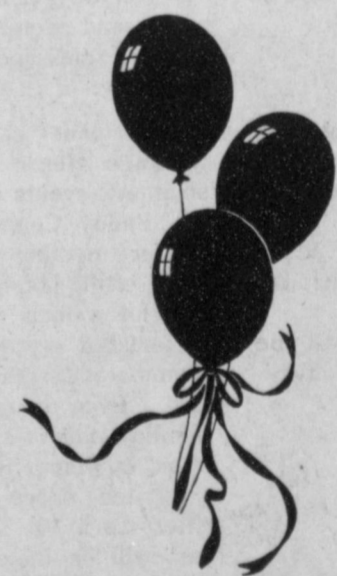

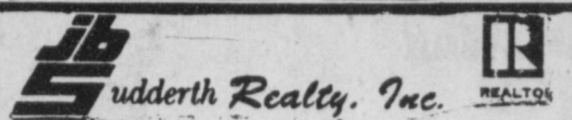

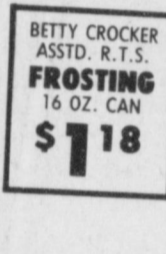
