tures from $\$ 2,900$ to $\$ 3,700$. Each
precinct will receive $\$ 200$ additionprecinct will receive $\$ 200$ additional. Commissioner J. W. Service ob-
jected to the $\$ 800$ increase being distributed on an equal basis. He pointed out that a year ago
the commissioners had set plan of limiting road and bridge explan of limiting road and bridge ex-
penditures, and it was his contention that the increase should also was out-voted 3 to 1 During the past year road and bridge funds were allocated to the various pre-
