#### God and Life

Lesson for May 25, 1952

IF THERE IS any one commandment which Jesus not only did not abolish but made far clearer and sharper, it is the commandment, Thou shalt not kill.

By word and act, the Master showed that life is sacred. It is

sacred because we are God's children; and whatever injures life, whatever makes it less worth living, whatever tempts men to do way with their own lives, whatever shortens life and makes it wretched and unbearable, this violates the

will of God, this is a form of killing. Jesus's attitude to disease is a case in point. We do not read of a single case where he came in contact with a sick person and urged the patient just to be patient. He always restored the sick to health; sickness in his eyes, is a thing that ought not to be.

Blunt Instruments

MURDER MYSTERIES are always solved in the detective stories. In real life we are not always so fortunate. Many a murder mystery remains a mystery after long years. All the police could ever be sure of was that "some person or persons unknown" hit the victim with a "blunt instrument."

Now you would think that a murderer would pick out something more efficient. Why not a sharp instrument? However, the blunt instrument, whatever it was-a sashweight, a brick or whatever,-did the work. A man can be just as dead from being hit with a sandbag as from being shot with a rifle.

As Simeon Stylites pointed out some time ago in the "Christian Century," there are all kinds of blunt instruments besides crowbars, sash-weights and bricks. Whatever tends to shorten life is a kind of blunt instrument; it may take a long time to have its effect but if it is deadly in the long run, then

it is deadly, perfod.

Any sort of habit that cuts down one's good health; and carelessness or neglect; any stupidity or foolishness such as driving too fast on a wet night; giving way to worries and getting indigestion from them; these are not un-heard-of ways of shortening life. They are, in plain language, murderous.

#### Alcohol the Killer

AS THIS IS the temperance lesson, this is a good place to recall the fact that alcoholic liquor is a too popular deadly weapon.

You have heard of the so-called antibodies or phagocytes which are in a healthy blocd-stream. These are the little fighting cells which gather around invading germs and kill them. Without these in our blood we could scarcely survive a single day, the air is so full of germs which we cannot help taking into our throats and lungs.

But alcohol taken internally will paralyze these phagocytes to such an extent that they are no use. This is not to say that a single bottle or drink of liquor kills all a man's phagocytes at

But still, as David Starr Jordan, president of Leland Stanford University, once said, if a man were telling the whole truth he would not say, Let us have a drink together. He would say, Come, let us paralyze our phagacytes together!

Insurance companies which insure only ministers and religious workers, that is to say, which insure mostly non-drinkers, can and do offer insurance for much lower premiums than companies that have to insure all sorts of people including "moderate" drinkers.

#### A. J. Bishop In Race for State Representative

A. J. Bishop, 27-year-old farmer and Quarter Horse man, of Winters, announced his candidacy for the office of State Representative from the 77th District, made up of Coke, Runnels, Coleman and Concho counties.

Bishop states "After serious consideration of the many important issues that face the people of our district and our State, I have decided to file as a candidate for the office of representative, believing that our people deserve and need public servants that understand their problems and will represent them."

"I eanestly solicit the support and the votes of the people of this district, and so that all may know me, I will carry this campaign to all voters of this area."

"Altho this is a new field in which I am entering, it is my sincere purpose to serve the people of this district in which I was born and reared."

Bishop, a gaduate of Winters High School and Texas Tech College, is a veteran of World War II. He served with the 42nd (Rainbow) Infantry Division in Europe. After being discharged from the army, he entered Texas Tech College and obtained a Bachelor of Science Degree in Agriculture in 1950. While he was a student at Texas Tech, he was a very active leader and outstanding man on the campus. Upon graduation he returned to the farm and became an associate in farming and the Quarter Horse business with his father.

In 1951 Governor Alan Shivers appointed him to serve as a member of the Texas Pasture Improvement Committee.

"I have no selfish interest to serve," Bishop said, "but to represent all the people living within the four counties of this district."



#### Fish of Aliases **Lead Commercial** Catch in U.S. Nets

WASHINGTON, D.C.-Menhaden -what are they?

Most inlanders and even some of the salty mariners who helped catch a billion and a half menhaden in U.S. coastal waters of the Atlantic in 1951 might fail to answer that question in a quiz program.

Yet more menhaden have been taken from American waters than any other fish species. The 1951 catch, when finally tabulated, will run just about one-fourth of the year's total of 4.4 billion pounds of U.S. commercial fishery product, Fish and Wildlife Service estimates

Oily, mealy, and bony, the menhaden has never been popular on American dining tables-a good reason why it is little known back from the Atlantic coast. More people come into contact with it, however, than with any other fish, since it yields oil widely used in making soap, paint, linoleum, and waterproofing compounds, and in tempering steels. The residue after oil farm animal and poultry feed. A small part of it is used as fertilizer.

Numerous aliases make menhaden unfamiliar by that name to some of the men who live by catching them. Along the Maryland and Virginia coasts they are known as bughead, bugfish, oldwife, alewife, greentail, and chebog.

Delaware adds mossbunker to the list. Connecticut's fishermen talk about whitefish, bonyfish, and bunker. Southward, Carolinians refer to menhaden as fatback and pogy.

The menhaden is one of the many members of the herring family. Full grown, it weighs about three-fourths of a pound and measures a foot long. Its name is derived from a Narragansett Indian word, meaning "enricher of the earth." The Indians well knew its value as fertilizer placing a fish in each hill of corn as they planted.

#### Recuperating Polio Victim Aids in Rescue of Skater

NORTH HAVEN, Conn.-A 13year-old polio victim, still wearing leg braces, crawled out on the ice in a pond here to help rescue a young skater who had broken through.

Danny Holt, a newspaper delivery boy who is recuperating from polio, was the first to reach Edard Ashby, 11, struggling in the

Stretching himself on the ice. Danny seized the younger boy by the arms and supported him until three other boys could pull him to safety.

Danny, stricken in 1944, is not able to skate himself.

#### Professor Says More Honey Used if Food Value Known

STATE COLLEGE, Pa.-An increased number of consumers would use more honey if they knew its true food value, says Prof. E. J. Anderson, in charge of apiculture research at the Pennsylvania State College.

Clear, attractive honey on the market usually is filtered honey, yet tests conducted recently show that the filtering process sometimes removes certain ingredients and lowers the food value of the product, he explains. If consumers were fully aware of the situation, they would use more natural honey with its adundance of such elements as sugars, proteins, vitamins, and minerals, Professor Anderson believes.

For many years beekeepers have been trying to improve the appearance of market honey, and in most cases, the beekeeping scientist says, the heating and filtering operations needed for such steps actually reduce the nutritive quality of honey. In special experiments now under way, a new B complex vitamin was recently discovered in honey.

#### Mobile Armed Forces Radio Stations Entertain Troops

TOKYO-Two mobile Armed Forces Radio Stations now are operating north of the 38th parallel in Korea, transmitting information and entertainment to frontline soldiers.

Master programming for the two 400-wat stations-known as Troubador and Gypsy-is done at Taegu, Korea. The local programming comes from record libraries and tape recordings.

Operating 23 and one-half hours daily, the two stations have their own power units as well as shortwave receivers which pick up programs from Japan and the United States for re-broadcast to nearby troops.

#### **Humble Coke Test** Has Penn Sand Oil

Humble No. 1 M. A. Rawlings, Coke county wildcat that showed oil promisingly in the Palo Pinto and Goens, has prospects of another pay, a Pennsylvanian sand.

Recovery on a test last week was 3,870 feet of pipeline oil testing 46.2 gravity and 500 feet of oil-cut mud during a 35-minute drillstem test from 5,165-80 feet. Gas surfaced in four minutes but was not gauged and no estimate was reported.

Three drillstem tests in the Palo Pinto between 4,446 and 4,589 feet, returned oil and gas, with a small amount of water on the third test A one-hour drillstem test from 5,046 -60 'eet in the Goens lime yielded 2,000 feet of 46 gravity oil, 350 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 90 feet of salty sulphur water.

No. 1 Rawlings took a second test in the Pennsylvanian sand late last week and recovered salt water. On a one hour drillstem test from 5,180 extraction is ground into meal for to 5,200 feet, the test recovered 900 feet of sa't water and 50 feet of gascut mud. Contract depth is 6,100 feet or the Ellenburger.



### **COLLEGE MEN** FOR TRAINING

Single men between 18 and 27 who have completed at least two years of college are needed immediately to apply for the Navy's Flight Training Program, it was announced today by Captain H. R. Nieman, Jr., USN, Commanding Officer of the U.S. Naval Air Station at Dallas.

After having been closed for nearly a year, the Naval Aviation Cadet Program is again "wide open." Captain Nieman's command in Dallas is charged with the responsibility of enlisting Naval Aviation Cadets-or "NavCads," as they are termed, from the State of Texas.

Captain Nieman said that a continuing need exists to interest college students, particularly graduating seniors, in Naval Aviation. For those who expect to have Selective Service obligations to fulfill, Navy flight training offers an alternative to ordinary enlisted service.

Pre-flight and basic training is conducted at the "Annapolis of the Air," Pensacola, Florida. Advanced training is carried out at Corpus Christi, Texas. NavCads who successfully complete the 18month period of training are designated Naval Aviators and are commissioned Ensigns, U. S. Naval Reserve, or 2nd Lieutenants, U. S. Marine Corps Reserve.

NavCads are paid \$105.00 per month, plus food, quarters and niforms. Pay and allowances upon commissioning amounts to \$355.75 per month without dependents, or \$430.75 with depen-

Men desiring further information on the program should write NAVCAD, U. S. Naval Air Station, Dallas, Texas. Transportation costs are paid for applicants who wish to take the qualifying physical and mental examinations.



#### Joe L. Mays In Dist. Judge Race

During World War II, he was on active duty 33 months as a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, stationed at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, and at Washington, D. C. ### Air Force Base Puts 'New Look' In Food Service

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE. Tex.-When Napoleon I conceived the idea of canning foodstuffs to meet the growing mobility of his French Imperial Army he was still a long way from today's United States Air Force's Operation "New

The Air Force is putting a lot of emphasis these days on Food Service, and typical of that emphasis is a new \$420,000 Consolidated Dining Hall at this B-29 combat crew training center. Don't call it a mess hall, son. The word is passe. So is K.P. Men on kitchen police are known as Food Service Attendants.

#### Mass Feeding

That's only part of the picture, however. Randolph's new dining hall, a two and one-half story structure, contains four cafeteria lines in a ground-floor area covering 31,-000 square feet. It serves an average of 4,200 meals per day in a homelike atmosphere featuring individual four-man tables and dishes instead

Consolidated dining halls is an Air Force innovation, a plan to consolidate food service, replacing an earlier arrangement of mess halls for e a c h squadron. By comparison, Randolph's Consolidated Dining Hall accommodates 1400 persons at a single meal, double the number that can be accommodated by a squadron mess hall. First Lt. Richard K. Brown, Food Services Officer at Randolph, figures the new dining hall could, in an emergency, accommodate 2,000 persons at a single meal. (About 1,700 persons were comfortably accommodated at a recent noontime meal.)

And GI joe of World War II might look with justifiable envy upon an approved dining hall arrangement whereby airmen and WAFS can be seated together at mealtime.

There are some strictly utilitarian aspects of the "New Look". Menu Planning Boards, which tried valiantly to cope with problems of nutrition in the burgeoning Air Force of 1942-45, now prepare dining hall menus that are vast improvements over the bill of fare which confronted the ex-serviceman.

#### Air Cooled

The new dining hall is air-cooled in summer, centrally-heated in winter. Garbage cans no longer are stacked outside the building but are placed in walk-in refrigerators until removal to a disposal area, thus eliminating disagreeable odors and the dangers of contamination.

Kitchen Police is still a job to be done but the much-maligned potatopeeler of World War II has been replaced by a Food Service attendant who can get the same job done in less time and with less effort by turning a switch on electrically-operated potato peelers. Other devices have been added to make the job easier and the results more effi-

Randolph's new dining hall operates on a 24-hour basis, offering midnight meals to airmen on night shifts, and meals for aircrewmen returning, in pre-dawn hours, from B-29 flights.

Of New Drugs Inadvisable

CHICAGO-Indiscriminate use of sulfa or antibiotic preparations may do more harm than good, according to Dr. William Bolton, of Chicago.

"The casual taking of this or that sulfa or antibiotic preparation for a cold, sore throat or cough may be worse than unwise," Dr. Bolton stated. "It may spell the difference between recovery and the reverse if some disease such as pneumonia, influenza meningitis, even an ordinary staphylococcal infection strikes at a later date.

"For, in taking driblets of the wonder drugs from time to time, the patient can teach his germs how to develop strong resistance to-even dependence upon-the very substance that otherwise would rapidly destroy them."

The commonest of the counter-attacks by which germs ward off the lethal punch of drugs is the development of specific resistance. Some bacteria always have been resistant to the new drugs, he stated.

"Many people have the mistaken impression that it is the body that develops a resistance to the drugs," he added. "The body may acquire increased tolerance for some medicines and require larger doses, but this does not happen with sulfa drugs or the antibiotics. The germs alone are responsible."
