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DEATH CLAIMS

MRS. LOFTON, 82

Death came early last Saturday morning to Mrs. J. K. Lofton, Sr., highly respected and well known Robert Lee woman.

She had been in declining health the past couple of years and became steadily worse after breaking her hip three months ago. During her illness she was cared for in the Coke County Memorial Hospital.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon from the Robert Lee Baptist Church by the pastor, the Rev. J. C. Shipman. Burial was in the Robert Lee Cemetery beside the remains of her late husband. Clift Funeral Home was in charge.

Grandsons, who served as pallbearers were Gene Williams of Brady, Weldon Priest of Santa Anna, Leslie and Keith Lofton of Snyder, Norris Lofton of Midland, Weldon Lofton of Robert Lee and Paul Owen Lofton of Odessa.

Julia Neal Smith was born Aug. 19, 1869, in North Carolina, and her parents moved to Lee County, Texas, when she was two months old. She married James K. Lofton in Bell County Sept. 20, 1885. They moved to Coke County in 1904, after buying a place in the Wildcat community, southwest of Robert Lee.

Mr. and Mrs. Lofton took a leading part in building up the community and county and they raised a family of ten children. Mr. Lofton passed away 21 years ago. His widow continued to operate their farm and ranch until 1944 when she moved to Robert Lee.

Three daughters and six sons survive. They are Mrs. H. A. Williams of Brady, Mrs. Ada Hambrick of Chowshilla, Calif., Mrs. J. H. Stovall of Santa Anna, Tex., W. E., J. K. and Glenn Lofton of Blythe Calif., Alfred and Manson Lofton of Robert Lee and Link Lofton of Lovington, N. Mex. A daughter, Evelyn, died 33 years ago.

All the children were present for the funeral except J. K., Glenn and Link.

S-Sgt. Preston Ross Home From Year's Service In Europe

Back home in Robert Lee after a year of duty in Europe is Staff Sgt. Roy P. (Preston) Ross, Jr., who is looking ahead to July 1 when he will be discharged after completing a 4-year enlistment in the Air Force.

Preston has been stationed in the European Headquarters of the U. S. Air Force at Wiesbaden, Germany, a highly important and interesting assignment. During the year he made trips to London and Rome.

He was stationed 60 miles from his older brother, Sgt. Mike Ross, who is with an infantry outfit, and they got to see each other occasionally. Preston also visited Sgt. Charles Bessent at Manheim and Cpl. Gerald Ivey at Munich.

Ross reached New York May 14 and was sent to Chanute Field in Illinois. He is enjoying a 30-day leave and will report back to Chanute a week before his discharge becomes effective.

He enlisted July 1, 1948, with L. C. Day and Jimmie Rabb. The latter is at Westover Field, Mass., and Day is stationed at Keesler Field in Mississippi.

Sun Oil Company's No. 9 Willie I. Tubb, west of Silver, has been completed for a daily flow of 113.55 barrels of oil through a quarter-inch tubing choke. Pressures were 340 pounds on the tubing and 525 pounds on the casing. Gas-oil ratio was 2,200-1. Production is from a sand section 6,002-14 feet.

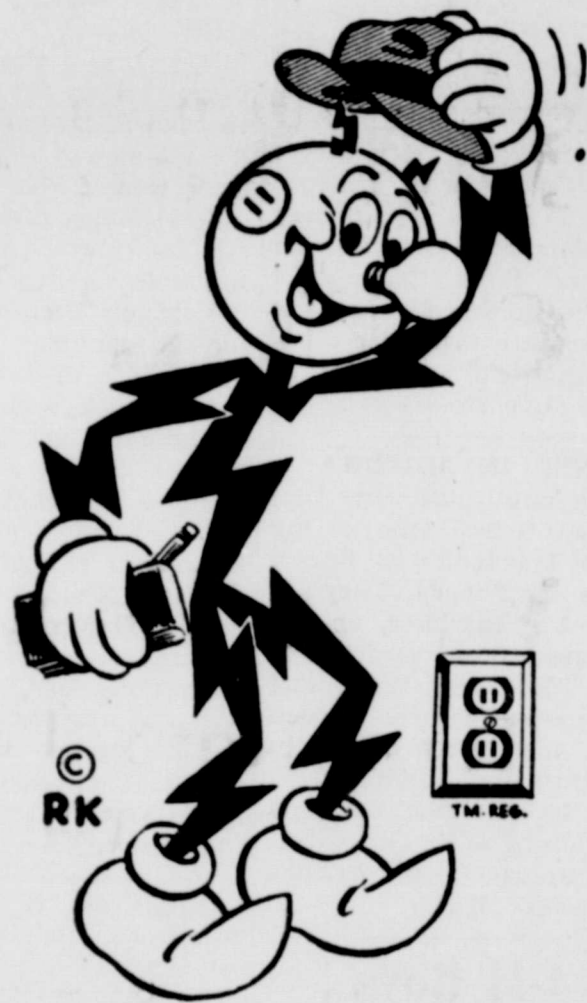

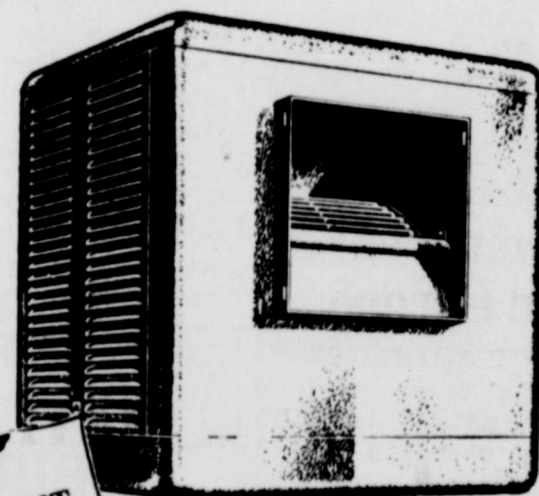

Report Veteran Families Own More Life Insurance

NEW YORK—While 75 per cent of all U.S. families own life insurance, 86 per cent of the families which include veterans of World War II are life insurance owners, the Institute of Life Insurance reports.

In the case of the families with veterans of World War I, a 79 per cent ownership is reported.

The veterans family is inclined to own a greater amount of life insurance, too. While 43 per cent of the non-veteran insured families put \$100 or more annually into life insurance premiums, 53 per cent of World War veteran families and 54 per cent of World War I families owning policies put that much into life insurance.

These facts on life insurance ownership are specially compiled from the 1951 survey on consumer buying habits made by the Survey Research Center of the University of Michigan for the Federal Reserve Board.

Heart Attacks Claim Lives Of Devoted Kentucky Pair

LIBERTY, Ky.—Mrs. Clara Belle Wilkinson, 71, had often told her husband that her only fear of death was that it would separate them.

On a recent morning, the husband, Shell, 75, died of a heart attack at their Brush Creek home, near Liberty.

Distraught, Mrs. Wilkinson called her son, Ralph, of Liberty.

While describing her husband's death to the son, she collapsed, suffering a heart attack.

She died in her son's arms within an hour after the death of her husband.

Robot-Controlled Weather Station Saves on Manpower

FORT MONMOUTH, N.J. — A robot controlled weather station in operation the past six months from a bleak deserted Aleutian island was exhibited at the annual American Meteorological Society convention in New York City.

The weather station runs itself, doing the work previously performed by at least seven men. It was developed by the Signal Corps Engineering Laboratories at Fort Monmouth.

Designed to operate without manpower for at least a year before re-checking, the station clicks its Morse code weather message at fixed times day and night to an Air Force Station 250 miles away giving the Air Weather Service of the Air Force measurements on rainfall, sunshine, wind speed and direction, pressure, humidity and temperature.

The unattended weather station is located on an island, where thick fogs prevail in the summer and gusty 100 mile per hour winds dominate during the winter. The station can operate in 60 degree below zero temperatures and colder if needed.

Transportable by air, the station consists of an insulated metal shelter and a small instrument section atop the shelter. There are built-in automatic heating and fire extinguisher controls.

Skeleton Problem Solved With Identification Made

HARLAN, Ky. — Local officials began an investigation soon after several skeletons were found by a workman in a shallow grave at nearby Cumberland. It was thought they might be the remains of moonshiners or "revenuers." The rugged mountain area once was used by moonshine-still operators, who looked with disfavor upon visits of "revenuers" during prohibition.

The Smithsonian Institution came to the assistance of County Attorney Hiram Brock, Jr., saying the skeletons were prehistoric Indians—one brave, three squaws and a papoose.

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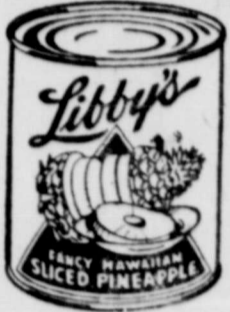
