3 RIGS DRILLING WEST OF SUN'S JAMESON FIELD

Three rotary rigs are working in northwest Coke county, just outside Sun's block of leases.

Chester Hunter's No. 1 J. B. Walker, Jr. was flowing 8 barrels of oil an hour and some water on Wednesday after swabbing. Production is from the reef.

Hunter is now drilling his No. A-1 E. E. Stagner, projected to the lime reef. It is a 50-foot offset to Hunter No. 1 Stagner which was plugged back after failing to get production in the reef. It is making 65 barrels daily from a sand section around 6,000 feet.

Hunter has also completed his No. 2 Stagner as a reef producer. Hunter A-1 Stagner topped the reef at 6,358 feet and was drilling at 6,392 feet Wednesday. Its proposed depth is 6,463 feet.

DRILLING ON R. B. ALLEN

A. G. Hill is drilling his No. 1 R. B. Allen, an offset to No. 2 Stagner. Present depth is about 5,000 feet.

RUSS MATHERS TEST

Lex-Tex Oil Co. last week spudded its No. 1 Russ Mathers and was drilling Wednesday at 2,480 feet. Lomax Bros. Drilling Co. is the contractor.

COMMISSIONERS COURT

Regular meeting of the Coke County Commissioners Court took place Monday. Routine matters were taken up and bills were allowed. The Commissioners signed an oil lease on 177 acres of Cochran County school land, receiving a bonus of \$25 per acre. The money goes into the county Permanent School Fund. Coke County sold the Cochran County land a few years ago, but retained the right to lease it one more time.

Judge Jeff Dean said the Commissioners will be called into session June 23 as a Board of Equalization to go over 1952 assessments.

Demo Committee Meets Monday

R. B. Allen of Silver, Coke County Democratic Chairman, announces that the County Democratic Executive Committee will meet here Monday to make assessments against the candidates and draw for places on the coming primary election ballot.

Assessments must be paid by Saturday, June 21, and Mr. Allen and a committee will meet again June 23 to make up the ballot.

Ballots must be printed and ready for absentee voting by July 6. The election date is July 26.

CITY BUSINESS IS IMPORTANT

Attention is called to the City of Robert Lee's Financial Statement which appears on Page 2 of this newspaper. Figures were obtained from a recent check completed by the Neimair Audit Co. of Lubbock.

In addition to the balance shown the city on March 31 had the sum of \$1,600.92 in its reserve account with the Mercantile National Bank of Dallas. A reserve is being built up to retire Water Works Improvement Bonds.

Mrs. Sam Jay, city secretary, points out that the \$25,000 old city refunding bonds must be retired by 1961. Payments of \$2,000 principal and accruing interest will continue until 1955, when the amount increases to \$3,000. The final payment is \$4,000. These bonds are paid off from tax money.

The financial report indicates that the city business is in good shape. We owe a huge sum, but we have secured wonderful improvements and a program of paying off our debts is being rigidly followed.

DISTRICT COURT BRIEF SESSION

Two indictments were returned by the Grand Jury in District Court here Monday. The true bills were against Robert A. Clark and Odell Kirk.

After disposing of one of the state cases and hearing several civil matters, Judge John F. Sutton announced that a petit jury panel would not be called. From all appearances the court wound up all its business during the opening day Monday.

Clark was indicted for burglarizing the McCabe home on the Divide several months ago. He stole considerable clothing belonging to Fred McCabe, Jr., who is serving in Japan. The man was later apprehended. All stolen property was recovered and he has since been in the county jail.

He entered a plea of guilty before Judge Suttof Monday afternoon and received a sentence of 2 years. E. B. Fuller appeared as counsel for the young prisoner. Clark had a bad criminal record. He was taken to Huntsville Thursday by Sheriff Good and Deputy Chilly Tinkler.

Odell Kirk was indicted for having a part in a robbery at the highway equipment shed at Bronte early this year. He is now serving time for another crime and may not be brought back to Coke county.

DIVORCE GRANTED

Patsy Lucas was granted a divorce from Jack Alvis Lucas. The divorce suit of Elsie Corene Moorman vs. James Dudley Moorman was dismissed for want of prosecution.

ADOPTION

LAWSUIT DISMISSED

A damage suit brought by O. Z. Littlefield against Commissioner Otis Smith was dismissed with prejudice on motion of both parties. Plaintiff alleged Smith had his men take gravel from the Littlefield farm without permission of the owner. He asked damages of \$700.

TUBB REEF WELL RATES 49 BBLs

Sun D-1 Tubb pumped 48.97 barrels of oil and 139 barrels of water during its official 24-hour potential test. Pressures were 50 pounds on the tubing and 1,100 pounds on the casing. Gas-oil ratio was 1,872-1.

It topped the reef at 6,414 feet and casing was seated at 6,564 feet. Production is from perforations at 6,455-72 and 6,485-6,504 feet.

Sun No. 26 Homer Jameson recovered only a slight blow and no oil in a drillstem test Wednesday in the top of the sand formation 5,898-5,929 feet. It will drill deeper.

Sun Mathers No. 36 was drilling at 5,171 feet in shale.

Sun Tubb C-1 was waiting on workover rig because of plugged tubing.

Robert Lee's Rabbit Twisters will be going after their third Concho Basin victory when they entertain Sonora here next Sunday at 3 p. m. Sonora has Lord Byron Stuart of Ozona and other hotshots and are pretty tough, although they were defeated last Sunday by the young and hustling Bryan Electric club.

The Twisters will journey to Ballinger next Tuesday night to make up a league contest postponed May 31 because of rain. June 22 is an open date for the locals and Robert Lee plays in Forsan June 29. So the Sonora battle here Sunday will be the last home game for some time.

It took 11 innings for the Twisters to defeat Miles here last Sunday. It was the third extra inning game in a row for Robert Lee, they having licked Big 2-1 in 12 innings May 25 and then lost to the same club 5 to 4 here the following Sunday after 10 innings of play.

Robert Lee got off to a good start against Miles, scoring 2 runs in the third and adding 4 more in the next inning. Johnny Stewart, who was safe on an error, scored on Chilly Tinkler's triple, for the home club's first marker. Tinkler tallied on Pete Hickman's single.

A walk to Lew Heuvel and hits by John Conley, Royce Smith, Barnell Malish and Stewart accounted for four scores in the fourth, and the locals had a nice lead of 6-0 until the first of the 8th.

A triple by Angeley, Miles catcher, a base on balls, a hit batter and a single by Jim Arrington resulted in two tallies for the visitors. They kept up their rally in the ninth inning. With the bases loaded and nobody out, Conley relieved Stewart on the mound for Robert Lee. Before the side was retired Miles had out over four runs and the score was evened at 6-6.

In the last half of the 11th Malish led off with a single to left. Stewart was safe on a fielder's choice, when the catcher took his bunt and overthrew second. Malish went to third and Stewart to second. J. L. Dupuissey, who relieved Chilly Tinkler at first, bunted safely. Malish was thrown out at home on Roy Tinkler's grounder, but the catcher threw badly to first trying to make a double play and Stewart came in with the winning run.

Both sides got eleven hits. Conley, Malish and Stewart each got two safe blows for the Twisters. Stewart allowed but three scattered hits during his first seven innings, and not a Miles player got on base until J. C. Gotcher hit safely thru the box in the fifth.

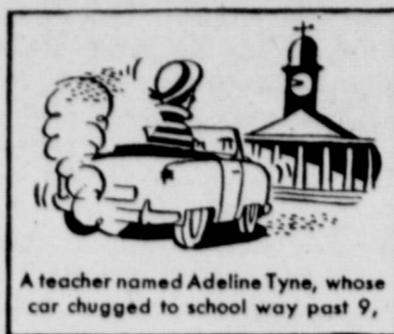

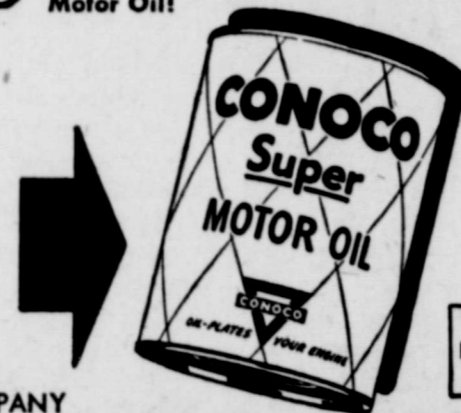

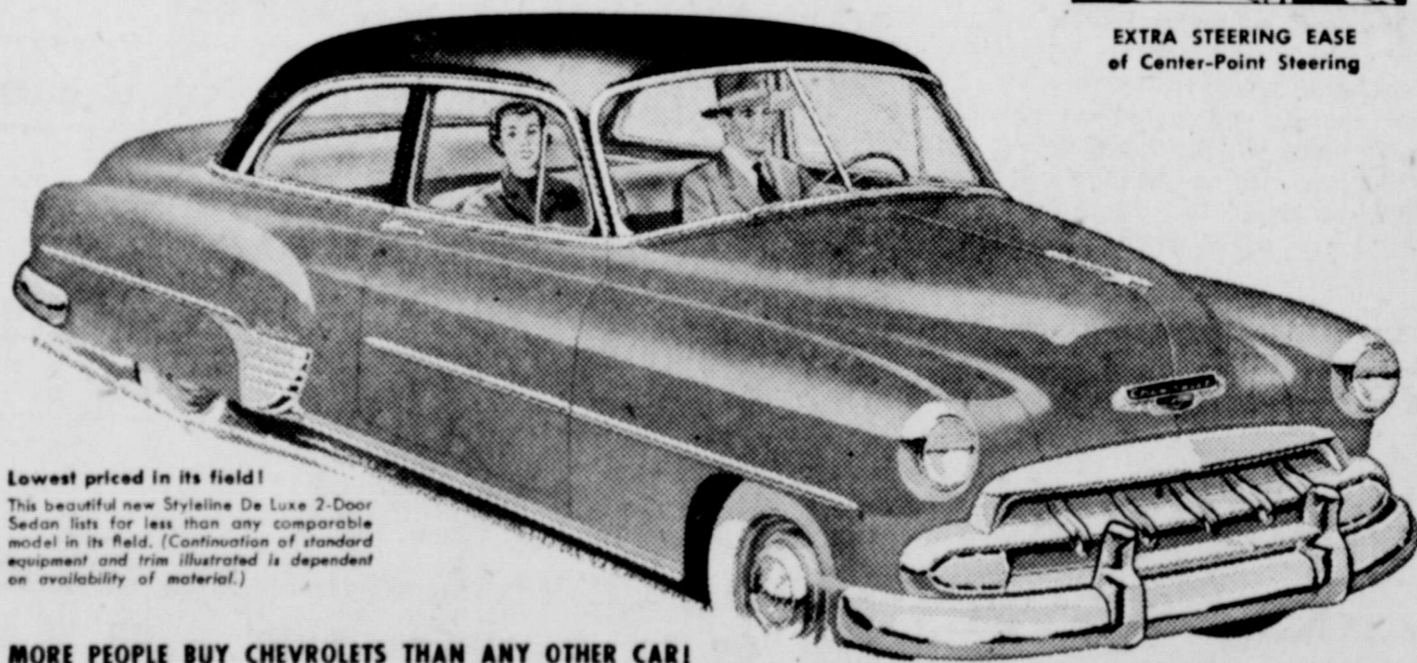
