DISTRICT COURT WINDS UP TERM

The October term of District Court for Coke County wound up its business this week and adjourned Wednesday. It was the final session for Judge John Sutton, who has served many years on the bench in this district.

Sutton was not a candidate for re-election this year. Joe L. Mays, present Tom Green County Judge, won the nomination in a spirited three-cornered race and will take the office Jan. 1.

A panel of 48 petit jurymen called to appear Monday morning was dismissed later in the day when no cases came up for trial. Several of the lawsuits were settled out of court, and in all the docket was pretty well cleaned up according to District Clerk Weldon Fikes.

One of the suits was a damage case of H. F. Saunders, Sr. against Harry Campbell. In the stipulated agreement the plaintiff received \$1,500 for damages resulting to his house during the construction activities on the Oak Creek Dam project. Campbell was the contractor.

After recessing last Monday until Wednesday of this week the Grand Jury completed its investigations. No indictments were brought in, but it is understood warnings were issued to persons whose handling of narcotics has been too flagrant.

Only 24 applications for absentee ballots had been registered Wednesday in the office of County Clerk Weldon Fikes. Thirteen of them were from Precinct 1 (Robert Lee.) Absentee voting either in person or by mail will end Nov. 1, three days before the General Election.

\$7500 DAMAGES FOR CAR CRASH

Settlement of an automobile damage case of \$7,500 was affected in district court here last week. Plaintiffs in the litigation were Fred McDonald, Jr., his wife, Thelma Jo, their children, Jo Alice and Freddie, and Mrs. McDonald's mother, Mrs. O. V. Looney.

The case resulted from a highway crash on the afternoon of last May 15, when Myron E. Ice, Abilene oil well drilling contractor, smashed into the McDonald auto at Bronte.

Mrs. McDonald and children and Mrs. Looney attempted to turn into the hospital near the south part of Bronte, when their machine was hit by Ice coming into town from south. He was alleged to be traveling at a high speed.

Mrs. McDonald and Jo Alice and Mrs. Looney sustained fractures and were hospitalized. The McDonald Chrysler limosine was badly wrecked.

The settlement awards \$25 to Freddie, \$100 to Jo Alice and \$7,375 collectively to Mr. McDonald, his wife and Mrs. Looney. A criminal charge against Ice was dismissed.

Smith & Foy were attorneys for the plaintiffs, while Runge & Hardeman were the defense lawyers.

Production was through 14-64 choke with packer on casing and 1,000 pounds on tubing from 120 perforations at 6,006-36 feet. Total depth was 6,438 feet, and casing was set at 6,130. GOR as 1,390-1.

Seaboard No. 1 Marvin Simpson, wildcat 4 miles northwest of Robert Lee, was drilling Wednesday at 900 feet. R-H-K Drilling Co. has the contract and a serious delay resulted when circulation was lost at 200 feet. They plan to cement a string of 1,600 feet of 8½ inch surface casing.

Union No. 1 G. C. Bell, wildcat 2½ miles east of Bronte, drilled out plugs Sunday after setting 459 feet of surface pipe.

150 PRIZE BIRDS IN TURKEY SHOW

Coke County's annual Junior Market Turkey Show is scheduled for the latter part of the week. A total of 150 prize birds will be shown, while there were only 100 entries in last year's show.

The event takes place in the building formerly occupied by David Key's feed store. Steel pens were borrowed from the State Fair and were brought here this week. Each of the big toms will have a separate pen, while three hens will be exhibited together.

Judging will take place Friday and the show will be open to the public all day Saturday, Nov. 1. There will be no admission charge.

County Agent Travis Hicks says all the turkeys in the show will be sold. The champion and reserve champion birds will go to the highest bidders, while all others will sell at a standard price to be announced. The figure will be 4 cents above the market price.

Mr. Hicks advises that persons buying turkeys can also include arrangements to have them processed and placed in the locker.

Another setback occurred last week when the Steers took a 19-7 licking at Loraine. While Duncan and Roberts were still out, the latter got into the fight in the second quarter and performed in grand style. He ran for a touchdown the first time he got his hands on the ball, but officials called the play back because of an off-side penalty.

Norman, who had an injured foot, is looking great this week and can be depended on for a top exhibition. Duncan's knee is not well, but he is limbering up and says he'll start Friday night's game against Hermleigh. Wallace Farris, gritty halfback, has a chipped shoulder blade and has not been in uniform this week and Wilton Robertson has been sidelined by illness.

As things shape up the Cardinals have quite an edge. But if Duncan and Roberts are not handicapped by their hurts, and the team is not beset by other items of misfortune, it might be a whale of a ball game. Nothing would suit the Steers better than to knock Hermleigh off its high perch.

A big crowd of fans accompanied Robert Lee to Loraine last Friday night. The Bulldogs scored in the second period soon after recovering a fumble on the Steer 30. A short time later a pass interception set up the second TD on the Robert Lee 23. Before the half ended a completed forward pass scored Loraine's third touchdown to give them a lead of 19-0.

The Bulldogs failed to count during the second half and the Steer line put up a great fight. Robert Lee scored its lone touchdown in the fourth period. Roberts hit Milburn Wink for 13 yards and Bill Havins tossed to Roberts for a 20-yard scoring play. A pass from Havins to Garland Davis was good for the extra point and left the final score 19-7.

BRONTE TIES HOBBS

Hobbs Panthers came from behind to tie the Longhorns at Bronte Friday night. Lyndon Waldrop, plucky Bronte quarterback, gathered in a Hobbs punt and raced 100 yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter. Hobbs garnered two TDs in the final period to gain a tie score.

Loraine plays in Bronte Friday of this week, and Hobbs entertains Coahoma.

Robert Lee is now tied with Trent for fifth place in the district standing. Hermleigh is on top with 4 wins and no losses, and Coahoma and Loraine are tied for second, each having 3 victories and one defeat. Hobbs is in fourth place with two wins, one loss and one tie.
