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Directors for District Precincts numbers 1, 3 and 4 will be elected for two-year terms. Precinct No. 1 is made up of Lubbock and Lynn Counties, Precinct Number 3 includes Bally, Castro and Farmer Counties, Precinct No. 4 consists of Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Potter and Randall Counties.

One committeeman for each of the thirteen counties within the Water District will be elected to serve a three-year term on the respective committee.

Both ballots will have provisions for write-in candidates. There are four balloting places in Castro County for the election. 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1956, among other things, proved to be the driest on record. Only 8.25 inches of moisture fell during the year, according to the rain gauge of Mr. Edwin (Goose) Ramey. Nearby areas fared little better as Amarillo reported 9.94 and Plainview 9.02. About a third of this moisture was accounted for by the heavy snows of January and February of 1956. Average rainfall for Castro County is considered to be 19 inches. The longest period of drought in this area is believed to be 24 years in duration during the 19th century.

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General Superintendent of the Junior show will be Mr. Edd C. McLeroy, farm representative of the First State Bank.

Entry deadline for the show was December 15. Last year 120 animals were entered and this year's 133 promises one of the best junior stock shows yet.

Several general rules governing the show have been set forth by the County Chamber of Commerce. Some of the more important of these are that all live-

stock must be in place by 5 p. m. Friday, January 11; that all animals must be weighed at the time of entry by the official weigher; that all animals must be tagged at the time they are weighed; that all livestock (calves, hogs and sheep) will be sifted for conditions, quality, grooming, and training; and that all sifted animals will be the responsibility of the owner.

Other pertinent division rules include: Beef Calves—only steers are eligible to show; all calves entered in this show must weigh between 650 and 1,100 pounds; calves will be weighed upon arrival at the show and divided according to weights, so as to have an equal number of calves in the lightweight and the heavyweight classes; no feed calf will be allowed in the show that has not

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In the Lamb division, lambs must weigh between 85 and 125 pounds; decision as to how sheep will be classified will be left up to the Department superintendent; the first and second place winners in each of the single classes will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Champion of the Show. For awards ribbons will be awarded the first five places; a banner to the grand champion and a rosette to the reserve champion.

Swearing in county officials elected in the November elections took place Tuesday at 10:00 a. m. in the Courthouse.

Administering the oath of office was Judge Robert Estes. Only one official new to the roll of county elected officers was among the four sworn in. He was T. C. Ray, newly elected commissioner of Precinct Number 1. Others, all incumbents, were county Sheriff Jack Cartwright, county attorney Russel Moran and Olin Rice, commissioner of Precinct Number 3.

Other county elected officials are entering the third year of their four year terms.

Vincent Braddock Owns Texas' Top Milk Producing Brown Swiss Cow

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The cow is "Hazel-Mar Day-break's Carlotta" who has made for herself an official record of 21,980 pounds of milk and 857 pounds of butterfat in 305 days of being milked twice daily (she averaged about 9 gallons per day and almost 3 pounds of butterfat). Cloverlake Creamery paid \$1,215.49 for her milk last year.

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According to the Texas Brown Swiss Association, Braddock has a Brown Swiss-Guernsey grade

cow that may make history. She is "Diamond" who is entered on provisional registry. If her daughter and in turn her daughter (Diamond's granddaughter) can keep up their good production and conformation, the granddaughter will become eligible for full registration as a Brown Swiss, which is outstanding for this type animal. "Diamond" has produced 11,499 pounds of milk and 598 pounds of butterfat in 305 days. She has an official classification of "Very Good" and an udder that classifies "Excellent."

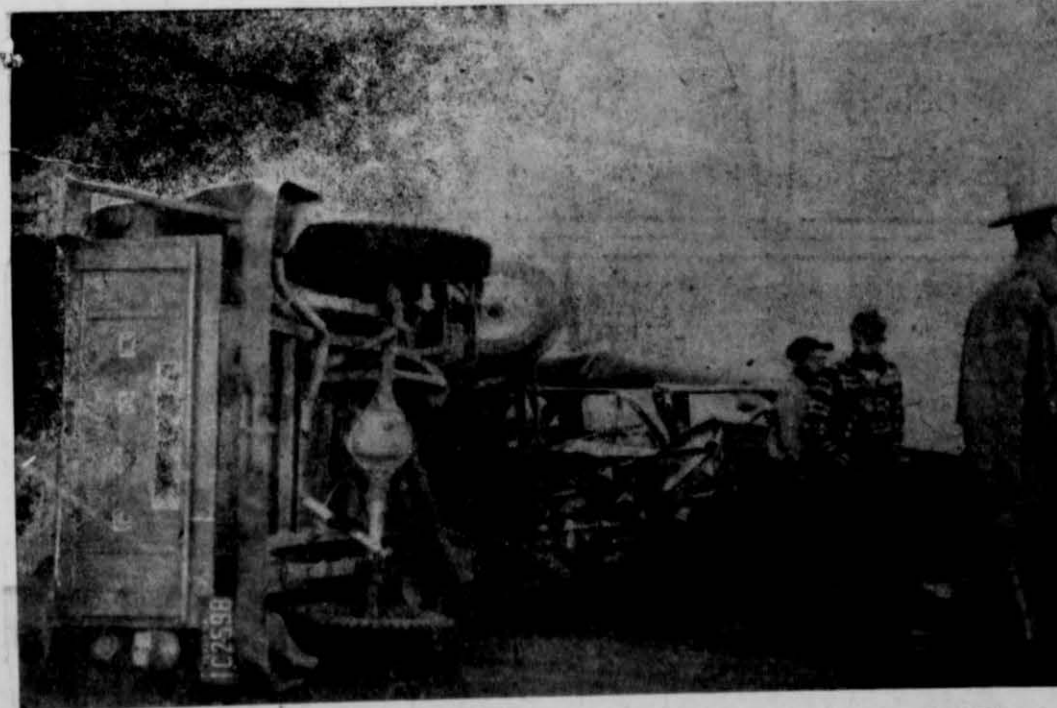
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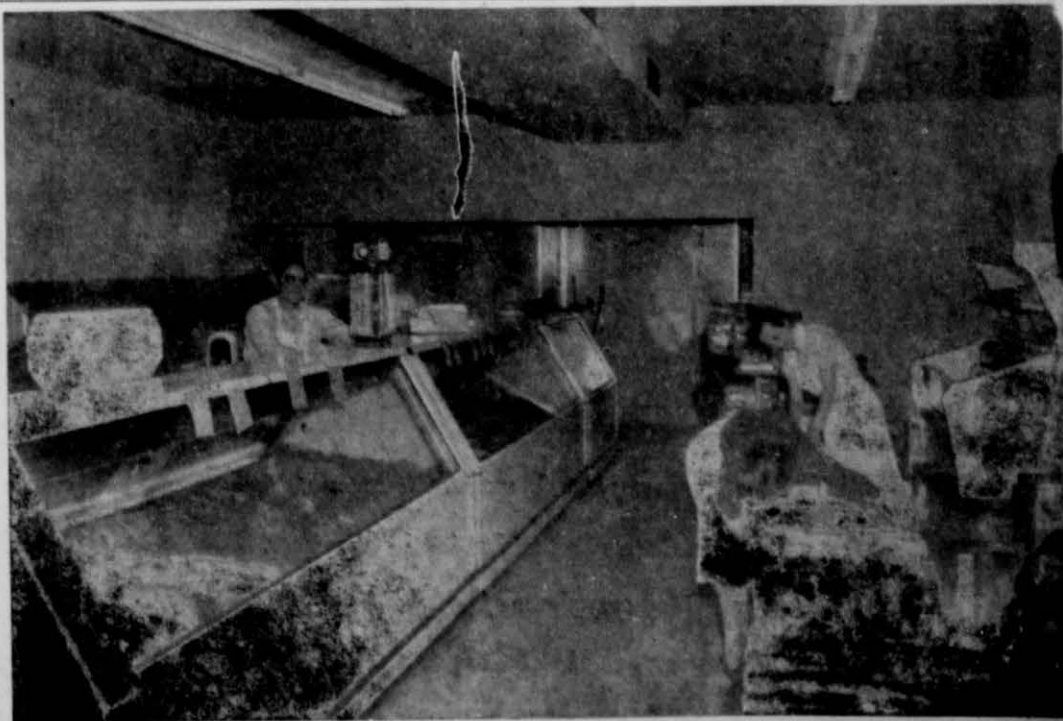

When the JayCee-Ettes, wives of members of the Dimmitt Junior Chamber of Commerce members, finished their welfare campaign shortly before Christmas they had brought food, toys and clothing into twelve underprivileged homes in the county.

About \$200 was expended by the organization and it was distributed in \$16 to \$25 amounts in staple foods. Toys donated to the JayCee-Ettes by people in Dimmitt furnished Christmas enjoyment to all the children on their list. Also among presents handed out to youngsters were a pick-up full of clothes collected during the drive.

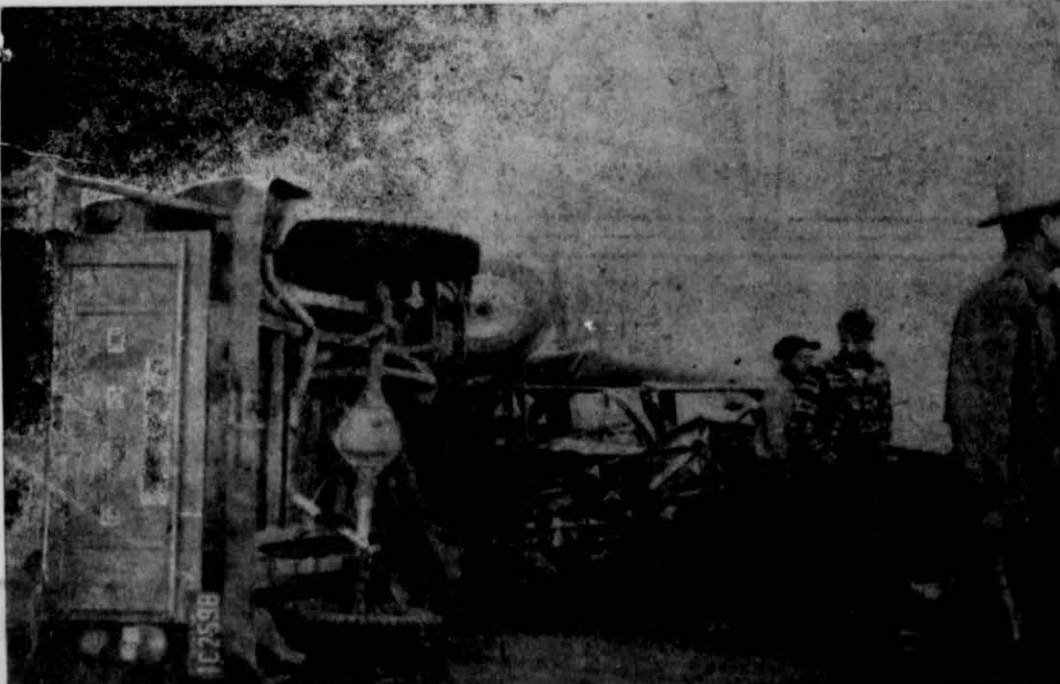
clothing and we were able to do what we felt was a really good job. Anyone who had a hand in helping us carry out our work has the deepest appreciation from every JayCee-Ette member."

Administrative Branches keep a watchful eye on each other and provide the safeguard intended by the Constitution. Otherwise, these two branches could become so intertwined that the very strength and purpose of the three branches of Government, so indispensable in maintaining a democratic form of government, could be lost.

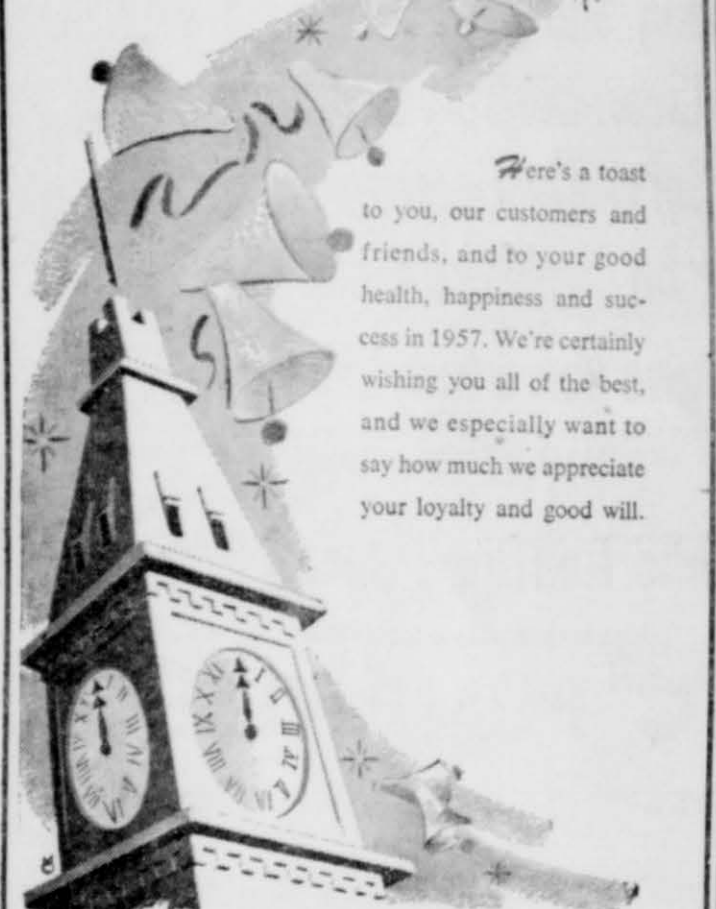

Two Sitton Triplets At Hart Gain Limited Eyesight Use for First Time

Two of the Sitton triplets at Hart have begun to gain their eyesight, according to an Olton Enterprise story this week.

The three children were born 2 1/2 years ago and were sightless at birth. They were the point of national interest two years ago when their blindness became apparent. They were suffering from what medical doctors term "retro-lental fibroplasia."

Of the three boys, Jon, Don and Lon, the latter is still blind according to doctors, although his colored nurse, Mrs. Mae Bell Stewart, says that Lon can distinguish light.

Ability of Don and Jon to see was a glimmer of hope when they were 14 months old and now has increased into a distinct reality. Jon and Don learned to walk by the time they were two years old and now make their way unaided around the spacious Sitton farm home near Hart. The triplets are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sitton.

Lon still hasn't learned to walk but is showing progress. All three of the boys are in good health, eyesight excepted.

The specialist attending the boys gives the family little or no encouragement that either Jon or Don will ever be able to read print and he holds no hope at all for Lon to ever see at all.

Retro-lental fibroplasia is a disease apparently of the blood vessels of the retina and found mostly in premature babies.

The triplets were born prematurely August 1, 1954, at Olton Memorial Hospital. Dr. B. J. Souders has been the family physician attending the boys since their birth. However, they have been taken to specialists in Lubbock and Amarillo.

The boys became famous when it was learned that they were the only known triplets in the world to have the relatively rare affliction which caused their blindness.

An Olton Enterprise story about the boys' blindness went to the Associated Press and thence to the newspapers of the world. The rural mail carrier was unable to get some day's mail into the Sitton mail box.

The Sitton triplets have shown remarkable intelligence. They were able to talk by the time they were nine months old and their health has been unusually good.

Mr. and Mrs. Sitton will move to Lubbock soon with their children. There they will enter the boys in a school for blind tots. Mr. Sitton hopes to farm near Lubbock.

People from over the county have built up a Sitton Triplet Fund which now amounts to about \$4,000.
