BLANKS-STATE WELL FINALED FOR 183 BARRELS

Sun Oil Co. Central National Bank (Trustee W. C. Blanks Est.) State Unit 1-A, on the southwest side of the Jameson field at Silver, has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 182.86 barrels of 46.8 gravity oil, no water, with a gas-oil ratio of 1,305-1.

Production was through a 12/64th inch tubing choke from perforations in the Strawn sand between 5,940-6,042 feet. Tubing pressure was 800 pounds with packer on casing. Location is in 530-C. Weisheit and State River Tract, on the south side of the Colorado River at Silver.

Sun 31 Mathers was drilling in shale at 6,110 feet.

Sun D-4 Tubb was drilling Tuesday at 3,214 feet in shale.

Sun 22 Homer Jameson was running electrical survey Tuesday and will cement 5 1/2-inch casing to 6,153 feet, the total depth.

Sun B-1 J. B. Walker was drilling at 2,235 feet in shale and lime. Surface casing was seated at 505 feet.

Sun 1 Mattie Jacobs was drilling at 6,224 feet and will explore the Caddo at an estimated depth of 6,700 feet. It failed to pick up the Strawn sand section. Location is two miles east of production on the east side of the Jameson field.

Sun 2 Victor McCabe, 2 miles north of Silver in Mitchell county, had good sand shows and will run 5 1/2 inch casing to 6,000 feet, the total depth.

Sun A-Q Beatrice Anderson in the same area was drilling at 3,380 feet in shale.

Sun 4 Eunice Parramore, in southwestern Nolan county, drilling in sand and shale at 6,716 feet. It is projected to 7,100 for an Ellenburger test.

BLACK PANTHER AT LARGE

O. E. Kresta reports seeing a black panther Saturday at his place 2 miles west of Robert Lee. The animal was being chased by a herd of cattle and escaped to the adjoining farm of Mrs. Ed Roane. Mr. Kresta remembers hearing panther howls a year or two ago, but this is the first time one of the animals had been seen.

Geo. W. Hale underwent major surgery Tuesday at a San Angelo hospital, and his condition is considered critical. A well known Robert Lee resident, Mr. Hale is advanced in years and has been cared for the past few weeks at a San Angelo nursing home. His son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Joy Blalok, of Baytown are at his bedside this week.

Special Election Called to Decide City Proposal

The question of adding a monthly assessment of 75 cents on each water meter to provide funds to carry on a city-wide clean-up and health program, will be decided at an official election to be held May 2.

A resolution providing for the election was passed at Tuesday night's regular meeting of the Robert Lee City Commission.

The matter was discussed at a public meeting at the court house Monday night, but only a small number of people attended.

Some time ago water users voted 3 to 2 in favor of the special meter assessment, but city officials wish to have a more definite expression.

Funds would be used in a city-wide clean-up campaign, an established plan of garbage and trash removal, weed cutting, fly spraying, etc., in addition to paying insurance premiums for volunteer firemen.

PHELAN WELL IS HIGH PRODUCER

Laan-Tex Oil Co. 1-A Pallie Phelan, on the northwest side of the Jameson field at Silver, has been completed for a calculated daily flowing potential of 390.76 barrels of 43.8 gravity oil, based on a flow of 187.42 barrels of oil in 11 1/2 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 1,225-1.

Production was through 1/2-inch choke from perforations between 5,994-6,010 in Strawn sand. Location is 2,210 feet from the southwest and 1,850 feet from the southeast lines of 6 Snyder and Von Rosenberg Survey.

Laan-Tex has moved west across the Colorado River where its new location is No. 3 Phelan. Lawless Drilling Co. is the contractor. Laan-Tex obtained the Phelan lease on a farmout from Skinny Adams.

Laan-Tex is preparing to complete its No. 1 State well bottomed at 6,130 feet. The hole was drilled with whipstock under the Colorado River bed. The state owned river tract of 52.3 acres lies between Stagner and Blanks properties. Empire Drilling Co. has the contract.

HUMBLE WEAVER FINALED

Humble Oil & Refining Co. 1 Mrs. Helen Harris Weaver has been completed for a daily pumping potential of 104 barrels of 42 gravity oil plus 113 barrels of salt water. Production is from the Palo Pinto topped at 5,271 feet. The discovery is located near the south end of the Weaver Ranch, 11 miles south of Robert Lee.

School Trustees Name Sheppard New President

A. V. Sheppard is the new president of the Robert Lee Independent School Board, his election having occurred at a special meeting of the trustees Monday night. Bryan Gartman was selected vice president, and Wilson Bryan will succeed himself as secretary.

Bob Godwin and Raymond Schooler, newly elected trustees, were present and qualified for their positions. Jack Cowley was re-elected a trustee last Saturday. The other holdover board member is Chester Harwell.

Regular meeting of the school board is scheduled for Thursday night of this week when the election of teachers will be taken up. At that time at east two applicants for athletic coach will be interviewed.

2 NEW MEMBERS ON ROBERT LEE SCHOOL BOARD

Annual school trustee elections Saturday brought out good votes in Robert Lee, Bronte and Silver.

Nearly 100 persons went to the polls in the Robert Lee Independent District to re-elect Jack Cowley and select Bob Godwin and Raymond Schooler as new trustees. The vote received by the seven candidates was as follows:

Both Godwin and Schooler reside in the old Green Mountain district which was consolidated with Robert Lee last year. Voters felt that locality was entitled to representation on the board.

SILVER ELECTS TWO

Voters at Silver re-elected Homer Jameson and named Raymond Bloodworth as a new trustee. Jameson received 36 votes and Bloodworth 29. J. A. Fuller and T. W. Lyle each received 26 write-in votes.

The Silver trustees held a special meeting the night before the election and re-elected the present teaching staff. J. B. Walker, Jr. earlier in the week had been appointed a trustee to succeed H. P. Pew, who resigned.

TWO ELECTED AT BRONTE

M. D. Stephenson and Bill Looney were elected to two vacancies on the Bronte school board. The vote was: Stephenson 76, Looney 66, Clark Glenn 52, Marvin Corley 52, and Cullen Luttrell 19.

Official canvass of the school vote will be made by the Commissioners Court next Monday.

Here's Pointers On THE DRAFT LAW

(First of a series of 10 brief articles.)

The draft law requires every man registered with a local board to report any change in personal status to his board.

"Young men have asked us just what changes they should report," Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, says. "Generally anything which has a bearing on classification should be reported."

The state director pointed to the following things which should be regarded as change of personal status:

1. Current change of mail address should always be sent to the board.
2. Marriage should always be reported at once.
3. If a wife becomes pregnant with a couple's first child, a physician's certificate must be sent to the board immediately after the fact is known.
4. All additions to the family must be reported.
5. Any and all deaths in a man's family should be reported.
6. If a man and wife are divorced or they no longer live together, this must be reported.
7. Permanent change of job should be reported.
8. Serious injury or physical defect should be reported.
9. If a man becomes a student in a college or university, this fact should be reported.
10. If a man enters the Reserves or National Guard, he should ask his commanding officer to notify his board. He should assure himself that it is done.
11. If a man has attempted to volunteer for armed forces service and has been rejected, he should advise his local board.

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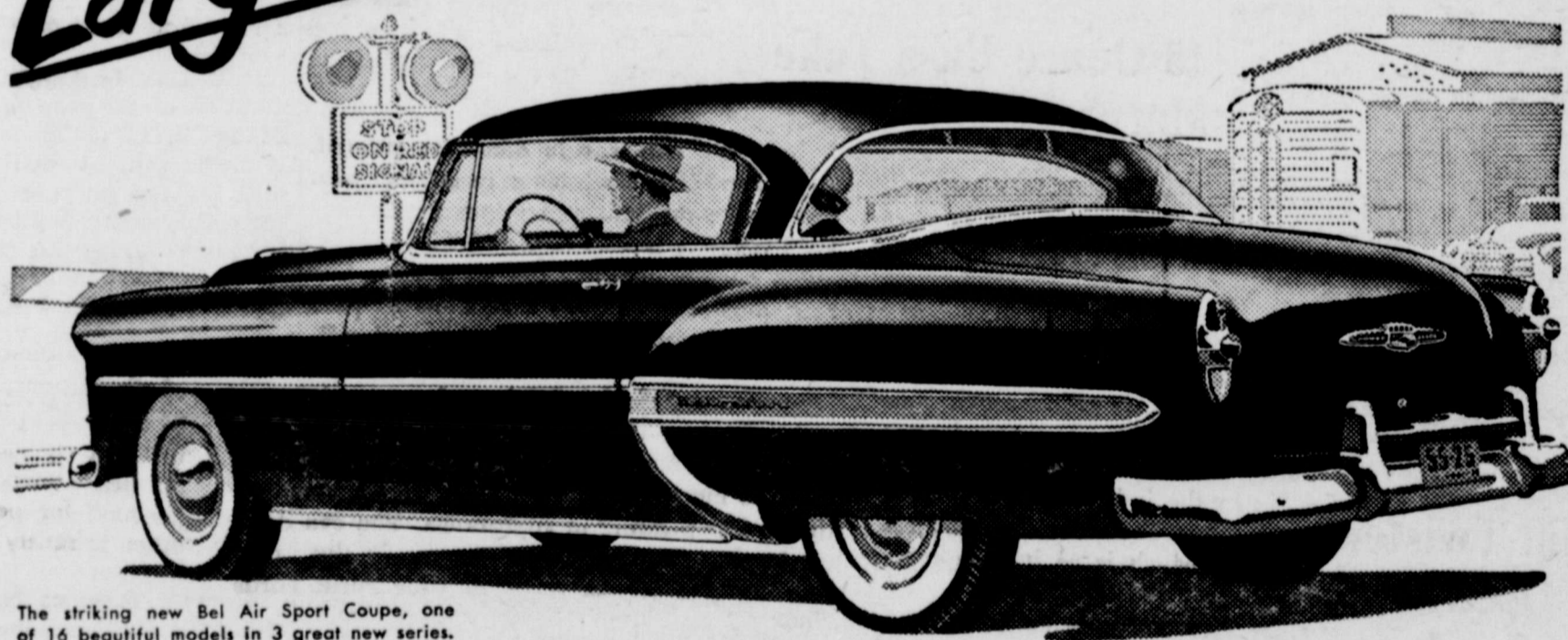

No Will? Then Law Says Who Inherits Your Property

Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it—but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

Where there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

Other statutory provisions for the distribution of estates of deceased persons will be explained in succeeding columns.

Later columns will also show how drawn wills may save expense and litigation, in addition to distributing your property exactly according to your wishes.

Here's Boost For Commercial Type Cattle Feeding

Fort Worth — F. F. A. youths had the top cattle at Fort Worth Monday at \$23. The top was earned by the Burnet County F. F. A. group and the Frisco group from Collin County. The "commercial" type of feeding project is taking hold and we have seen better than a dozen such climaxed here this year, while a couple of years ago no more than a couple or three existed.

The "commercial" feeding tests teach youngsters how to fit cattle for market, instead of the showing. It teaches how to make a profit, or how to make a loss. This year has been bitter for many young folk because of adverse price trends, high feed costs, and in many cases, feeders that cost too much. These lessons, while hard, are teaching the boys and girls the facts of economics — profit and loss — and may save them from much costlier mistakes in the years ahead.

We simply cannot fail to add our bit in this matter. We think commercial feeding projects are the answer to the farm youth livestock feeding program. A tiny percentage of livestock producers in adult life fit livestock for shows. Yet every livestock producer fits cattle for market whether on grass or in the feedlot.

It seems to this writer that every town, county and district can solve the headaches of show sales which in many cases were getting burdensome to merchants and local business men. It's certainly worth looking into.
