## New Regulation

To Draft Fathers
After Aug. 25th
AUSTIN, Aug. 10-Any young
raarried man registered with a draft married man registered with a draft board had better be on the alert family or expected birth of a child.
On August 25 and thereafter, fathers are not deferrable because of their children. Draft boards have this new regulation following an enhower.
Those who now have children, and those who are expecting birth
of a child, are deferrable; likewise, those who become fathers or expec-
tant fathers before midnight, Augtant fathers before midnight, Aug-
24 . But these men who are fathers and expectant fathers before Aug-
ust 25 must act at once to advise they fail to perform this important duty required by draft regulation,
they will be liable fo: the draft simply because they failed to advise their boards of the facts.
In the case of expectant fathers, certificate from a licensed physiian must be secured stating that able date of delivery, and evidence upon which positive diagnosis of pregnancy is based.
Brigadier General Paui L. Wakeeld, state draft director, urges all married men who come under the act at once if they

Here's Suggestions When Mother Sews For Her Children

When mother sews for the chil-
dren, she has certain decisions to dren, she has certain decisions to
make. Is it more ecoaomical to make garments or buy them readymade? Does she sew well enough to satisfy herself and the child with the garment she makes? Is the time
spent sewing justified, or is it necessary to neglect some responsibility to the family? Each mother must answer these questions for herself. Comfort and freedom of action is more essential than dollars and cents. Therefore, mothers may both boys and girls rather than to sew them at home. But getting sew them at home. But getting
self-help features for child development, the mother may find it possible to obtain these by making the sun suit or other play garment ${ }^{a^{*}}$ home. Another advantage is that clothing made atong the same style during the training period might (If the mother does n.t sew well, certain suggestions will be helpful. Probably the most important one is to select a pattern with as few pieces as practicable, ar.d buy only
the amount of mater:al actually needed. The approximate amount is specified on the pattern envelope.
By multiple cutting the mother can cut two or more garments by the same pattern. This would be especitily good for play clothes,
such as shorts and overalls, using different fabries with the same basic pattern. The garments can be styled differently by adding or omiting certain decorative details. Be sure the fabrics are the same
width to simplify cutting, and are width to simplify cutting,
guaranteed not to shrink. guaranteed not to shrink.
Save shopping time by all bindings when pattern and fabric are purchased. Regulate the tensions and check the length of the stitch on the sewing machine as you prepare for sewing. Twelve to fcurteen stitches to the inch for are used for gathering or machine basting.
Certain helps such as a seam gauge on your machine for stitchirg all seams, a cutting table of comfortable height, bent handle shears for cutting with big strokes, and planning the method of stitching so simmar processes sewing. Both hunting and fishing licenses must be renewed for the new fiscal year which begins at midnight, August 31.
First size First sizeable demard for the hunting licenses will center around on beginning September on beginning September 1.
The 28 different kinds of licenses cover all phases of hunting and fishing, ranging in cost from fifty cents for a duplicate license to $\$ 200$
wholesale fish dealer's license. The License Clerk said a new ad dition to the hunting licenses, which is expected to prove popular in the
coastal areas, calls for a $\$ 5$ five-day non-resident license to hunt migra non-resident license to hunt migra
